QUESTION: I am 75 years old, still working, and get \$94 social security monthly check. My wife is not vet age 62. We have four children under age 18. If I should retire, what benefits would the six of us receive? ANSWER: Since you are over age 72, all six of you should be receiving checks now. If your benefit is \$94 (before Medicare premium withholding), an additional \$47 a month is due your wife and children-that's \$9.50 each. You should get your children's birth certificates and see our representative to file claim for them. Your
