





"There are three kinds of reading," she stated, "1. the quick reference type to obtain information; 2. the study type, or critical reading, and 3. the esthetic type, or recreational reading."

The quick reference type demands rapid skimming while looking for certain key words. The study type of reading requires various reading speeds from slow to fast. Generally the more rapidly one reads the more nearly he is able to approximate the writer's trend of thought.

In esthetic reading one should read intelligently and discriminatingly. In this area of reading it is essentially important to possess a cultivated literary taste.
