\$2,924.60 is Hico's Take **Of Sales** Tax

Hico City coffers were enriched by \$2,924.60 last week when a check for that amount was received from the State Comptroller, representing the first quarter payment of the City Sales Tax.

Hico voters approved the tax last year, and collections started on October 1. The check covered the months of October. November and December, three largest business months.

Collections are expected to be down for the first quarter of this year, but the tax should add around \$10,000 annually to city funds.
