Waxahachie Rites Held For John M. Lokey, 86 Former Hico Resident

John M. Lokey, 86, a resident of Waxahachie and former resident of Hico, passed away Tuesday, March 31 in a Waxahachie hos-pital.

Mr. Lokey made his home in Hico for 15 years until his retire-ment.

He was born September 26, 1883 in Collin County, Texas, and was of the Baptist faith. He was a World War I veteran, having served in the U.S. Navy.

Mr. Lokey's early employment was with the Western Union in Chicago, New York, Florida, Colo-rado and Cuba. For 18 years he operated the Casa Gazna Broker-age Company in Mexico City. He was also a representative of the Mc-Sadden Cotton Company in Houston and Mexico City for a period of 25 years.

Funeral services were held Thurs-day, April 2 in the Boz-Mitchell Funeral Chapel in Waxahachie with interment in Hillcrest Burial Park.

Survivors include three step sis-ters, one step brother and a niece, Mrs. Clovis P. Mitchell of Waxa-hachie.

Commander Cox Receives High U.S. Navy Appointment

Lieutenant Commander Joseph W. Cox, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ben F. Cox of Hico, was appointed Offi-cer-in-Charge of Detachment Nineteen, Carrier Airborne Early Warn-ing Squadron 111, recently.

The appointment went to Lt. Commander Cox after devoted and faithful service since he enlisted in the U.S. Navy in 1942 as an enlisted man.

He served during World War II and the Korean War as an enlisted man, receiving numerous awards which included the Purple Heart. His achievements during the 1940's and 1950's led to his commissioning in 1960 as a Limited Duty Officer. The next year he was awarded his wings and was designated a Naval Flight Officer.

Commander Cox has the distinc-tion of being the first Limited Duty Officer in the U.S. Navy to be ap-pointed as Officer-in-Charge of a detachment serving in the Vietnam conflict. Presently flying in the Navy's E-1B Tracer aboard the USS Hancock (CVA-19), his duties include providing airborne early warning coverage against hostile aircraft in the Gulf of Tonkin and control of U.S. fighter aircraft in this environment.

Social Security

Questions & Answers

QUESTION: I am a farmer, and have been most of my life. I have been told that I have an option to file income tax returns and report for social security. Please explain this.

ANSWER: A farmer or rancher must pay social security taxes on his net income from the farming or ranching operation if he nets \$400 or more in year. The option that was mentioned to you applies to your use of a special provision for farmers and ranchers to report two-thirds of their gross sales during a year, if they have a loss or if the use of the option would in-crease their reportable earnings for social security. This option is avail-able to any farmer or rancher who has gross sales of \$600 or more in a year. If your gross sales are between \$600 and up to \$2400, you can report two-thirds of your gross sales for social security. We have a free leaflet covering this. Leaf-let SSI 32.

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Clean aluminum pans with a solution of from one teaspoon to two tablespoons cream of tartar in one quart of water.

Never wash eggs before you store them. Washing removes the natural protective coating which keeps air and odors from entering the shell. Be sure to store eggs with the large end up.

Keep two plastic bags of bread crumbs in the refrigerator to speed preparation of main dishes. In one bag keep plain crumbs, in the other buttered ones.

Freeze liquids, such as soup, in coffee cans lined with plastic bags. When the liquid is frozen remove it from the can. It will have its own wrapping and the can may be reused.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Beautiful lawns don't happen. They are the product of good planning and management, including the use of proper grass, fertilizing, mowing, watering, in some instances drainage and disease and insect control.

A deadline is at hand and that is a spring application of a complete fertilizer. It should be made about the time the grass begins to grow. The fall application, again a complete fertilizer, should be made about 30 days before the average date of the first frost. Generally for this area, a fertilizer with a 1-1-0 or 2-1-0 ratio should be used and applied at the rate of 2 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn.

Bermuda and St. Augustine lawns should also receive one pound of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet every 30 to 40 days during the growing season to keep them green and vigorously growing.

Good soil moisture conditions over the county have already started a good growth of weeds on pastures and ranges and more will be coming along. Weeds are moisture robbers and unless controlled require much more water to produce a pound of plant material than do the better grasses.

Pastures should be deferred following chemical or mechanical brush or weed control. This practice will allow better forage species to increase, establish and produce seed and will reduce loss of livestock from consuming poisonous plants.

Livestock should be kept off the pastures until weeds are dry following spraying with herbicides. The palatability of plants change when they begin to wilt following control and plants normally not grazed by livestock often are taken readily during this wilting process. Most poisonous plants are not grazed unless animals are forced to graze them or plant growth changes make them acceptable to the animals.

Black spot is a spoiler in most rose gardens. This fungal disease can ruin the beauty of one of our most desired ornamental plants and can kill plants if left unchecked. This disease attacks the young tender foliage, causing black circular or irregular shaped spots on the developing leaves.

Black spot can be controlled by the use of preventive sprays or dusts. Such material as Folpet, Maneb, Polyram and Daconil 2787 can all be used on roses as preventive sprays.

Though the selection of fungicides is important, perhaps the regular application of the material at 7-day intervals is even more important. The rose gardener should set aside a time each week for spraying his plants. It might be each Saturday morning or another convenient time; however, the important thing is to see that all plants get a thorough fungicide application every seventh day.

Pruning out last years canes now will help reduce the amount of disease producing spores carried over from last year. Raking and burning old leaves will also help reduce the occurrence of black spot.

Roses take a lot of care, but their beauty both inside and outside the home can offset all other considerations.

I have received notice from Dr. James B. Henderson of the Texas Animal Health Commission that Hamilton County has been re-certified as a Modified-Certified Brucellosis free area for an additional three year period, ending Nov. 27, 1972. This came as a result of the black tag program and the testing in the county last fall. I certainly appreciate everyone who cooperated with this program.
