Hico Refrigeration, and a warehouse ment Store last Thursday night. Damage estimated at between \$25,0000 and \$30,000 was caused by the blaze.

Hico fireman Donald Warren, and Darrel Simons discovered the fire about 8:30 p.m. and turned in the alarm. Faulty wiring in the alarm system posed problems for a short time, but by using sirens on fire trucks, the two were able to get enough firemen on the scene to fight the blaze. The fire was snuffed out about midnight.

Aiding in the fight were two units from the Hamilton Volunteer Fire Dept. and one from Stephenville.

> the alley on the east. One fireman, Frankey Williams, received a severe arm laceration from falling glass, and was hospitalized after treatment at Hico Clinic. He was back on his job at Community Public Service Company Monday morning.

> Hico Refrigeration, owned by D. E. Bulloch, and operated by Raymond Cole, received the most extensive damage. Bulloch also owned the building. He estimated damage to the building and contents at around \$25,000.

Glenn Ross, partner in Salmon-Ross Dept. Store, said their damage would be around \$3,600. He said that they normally carried a larger inventory in the warehouse, and felt fortunate that their loss was as small as it was.

Neel Truck & Tractor, adjoining the burned building on the south, received no major damage, nor did warehouses to the north of the blaze site. Thick rock and masonry fire walls between the buildings were credited with containing the blaze, and preventing a major loss in the block. Partitioning walls between the buildings are more than 18 inches thick.

Approximately 50 firemen and many individuals aided in fighting the blaze, cause of which was undetermined.


Saturday, May 30, is Memorial Day, and will be observed by Hico merchants as the first official closing day on the 1970 calendar.

In cooking, "simmer" means to cook in liquid just below the boiling point, at temperatures of 185 to 210 degrees F. Bubbles form slowly at these temperatures and break below the surface.

If you like broiled meat well done, place it farther from the heat source than for medium or rare meat - to avoid burning on the outside before the center is cooked. Place thicker cuts farther from the heat source than thin ones for the same reason.



Social Security

Ouestions and Answers

Q - I am now receiving monthly social security payments. Recently I inherited some land and livestock. If I sell this inheritance, will it count as earned income and disqualify me from receiving my monthly benefits?

A - No, it will not. However, if you operate as a farmer and rancher by raising, fattening, grazing, and selling your livestock, you would be a self-employed farmer. Your net profit from this operation would affect your monthly social security benefits if you are under age 72 and your net profit for the year from your livestock operation is more than \$1680. But, if you sell off your entire herd of livestock and have not been operating as a self-employed person, it would not.

Q - I am 67 years old now and plan to retire on May 1, 1970. I applied for benefits back before I was 65 to get my Medicare insurance, but I haven't been getting any cash monthly benefits because of my earnings. When should I report that I have stopped work, and where do I do this?

A - Make this report to us just as soon as you stop working. You can do this by completing and mailing us the postcard form given to you when you filed your claim with us. If you can't find the card, see our representative when he next visits Hamilton. Your notice should be sent to your nearest social security district office. For this area, that's your Temple office.

Q - I get my monthly social security benefit check on the third day of every month. Is this check for the month in which I receive it, for the last month, or what?

A - All monthly social security benefit checks are dated the 3rd day of the month - unless the 3rd day of the month is a Sunday or national holiday, then they are dated the 2nd day of that month. These checks are for the month that just ended. For example, the social security benefit check dated April 3 is payment for the month of March,





Editor's Note: Below are questions now being asked at draft boards. The answers are by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director, 209 W. Ninth St., Austin, Texas 78701. He will welcome your questions. Q - I have been informed that

my appeal for an occupational deferment was denied. Is this final, or can I take other action to get the deferment?

A - Check the card you got, called a Notice of Classification (SSS Form 110). If the vote on your classification was not unanimous by the appeal board members, you have a right to appeal to the President. You take this action by filing a written request with your draft board within 30 days after the Form 110 was mailed to you.

Q - My classification is now I-A, and I want to appeal. I want to see the government appeal agent, but I work at night. I'd like his phone number and address so I can get in touch with him. What should I do?

A - See, write or phone the executive secretary of your draft board and request an interview with the government appeal agent. She will arrange a meeting. The name of your government appeal agent is posted at your board.

Q - I am a college student with a class II-S deferment for my activity in study. I have a chance to enlist in the Army Reserve. If I should do this, will I keep my student deferment?

A - No. You will be deferred on the basis of your activity as a member of a reserve component of the Army when your board receives evidence from you or the reserve unit that you have enlisted. This evidence is normally furnished on Department of Defense Form 44. You will be placed in class I-D. Q - I'm a farmer who's been ordered for induction. I'll suffer a big financial loss, as it's harvest time, and no labor's available. Can somebody give me time to gather the crops?

A - Yes. Your draft board can postpone your induction 60 days for this emergency, and if more time is needed, has authority to grant a second 60 days.


