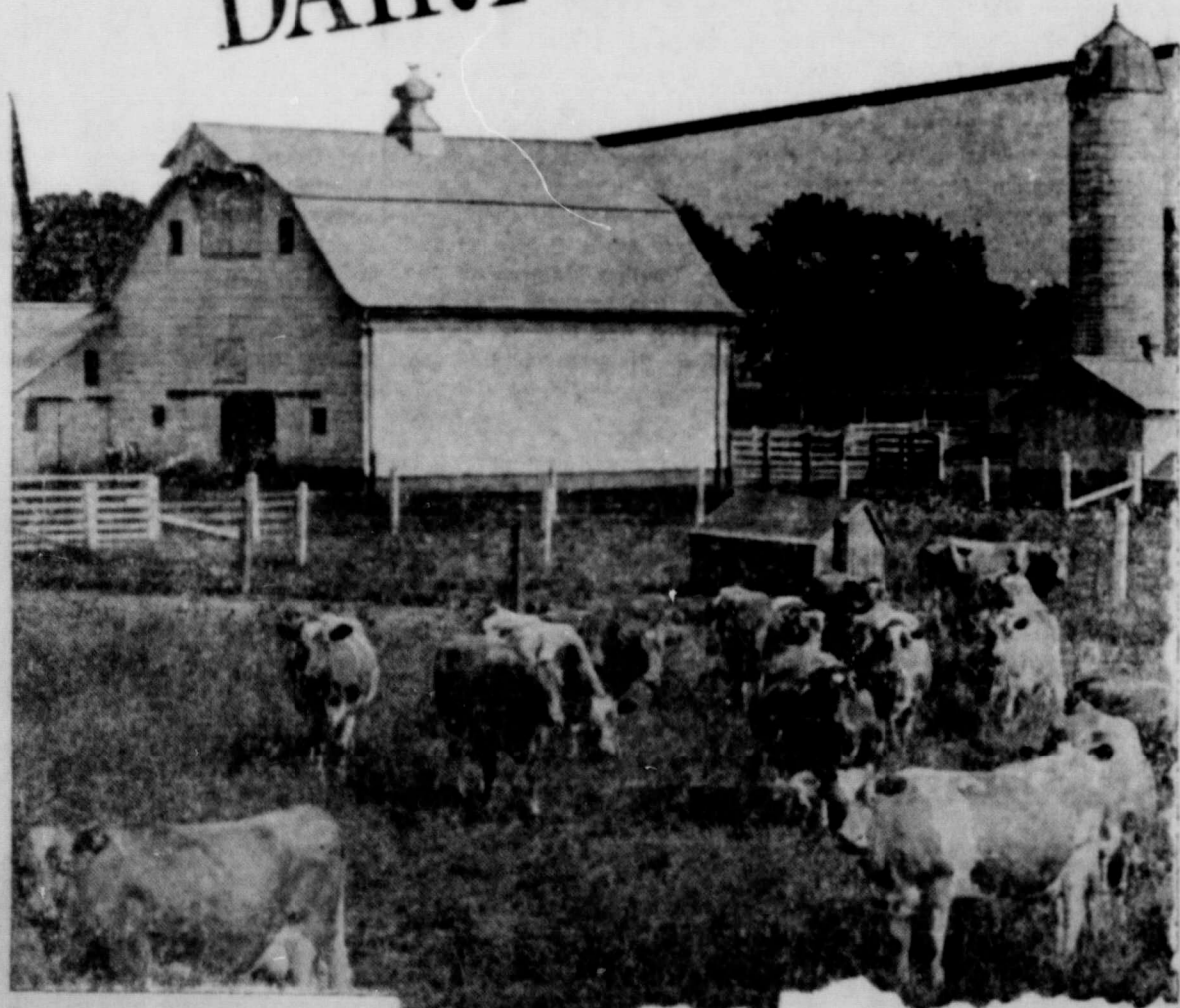

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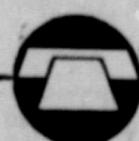
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Items of Interest From Iredell...

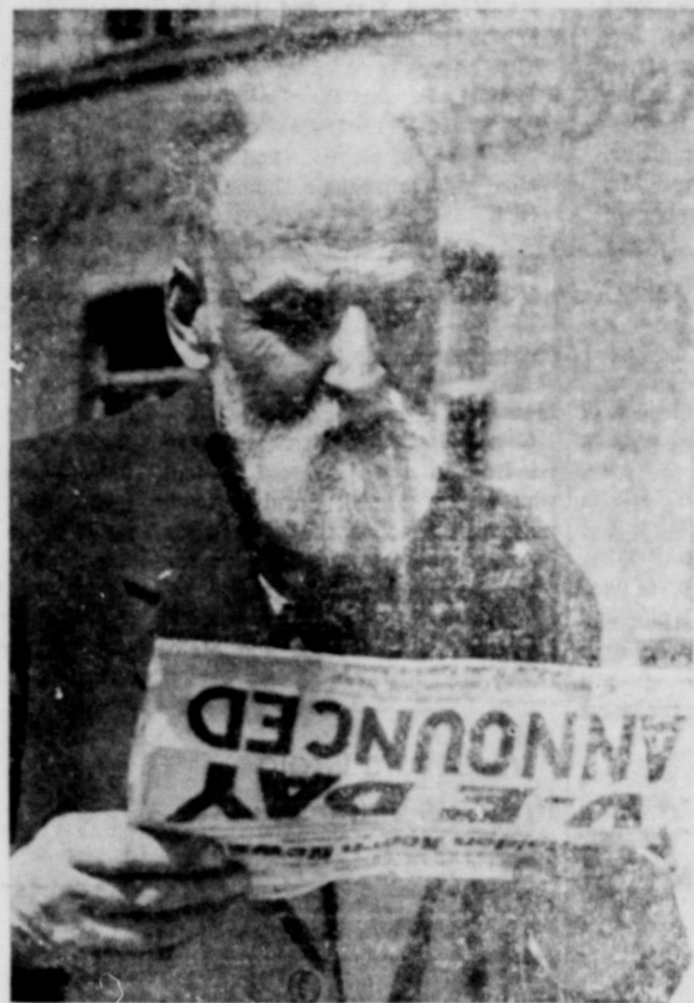

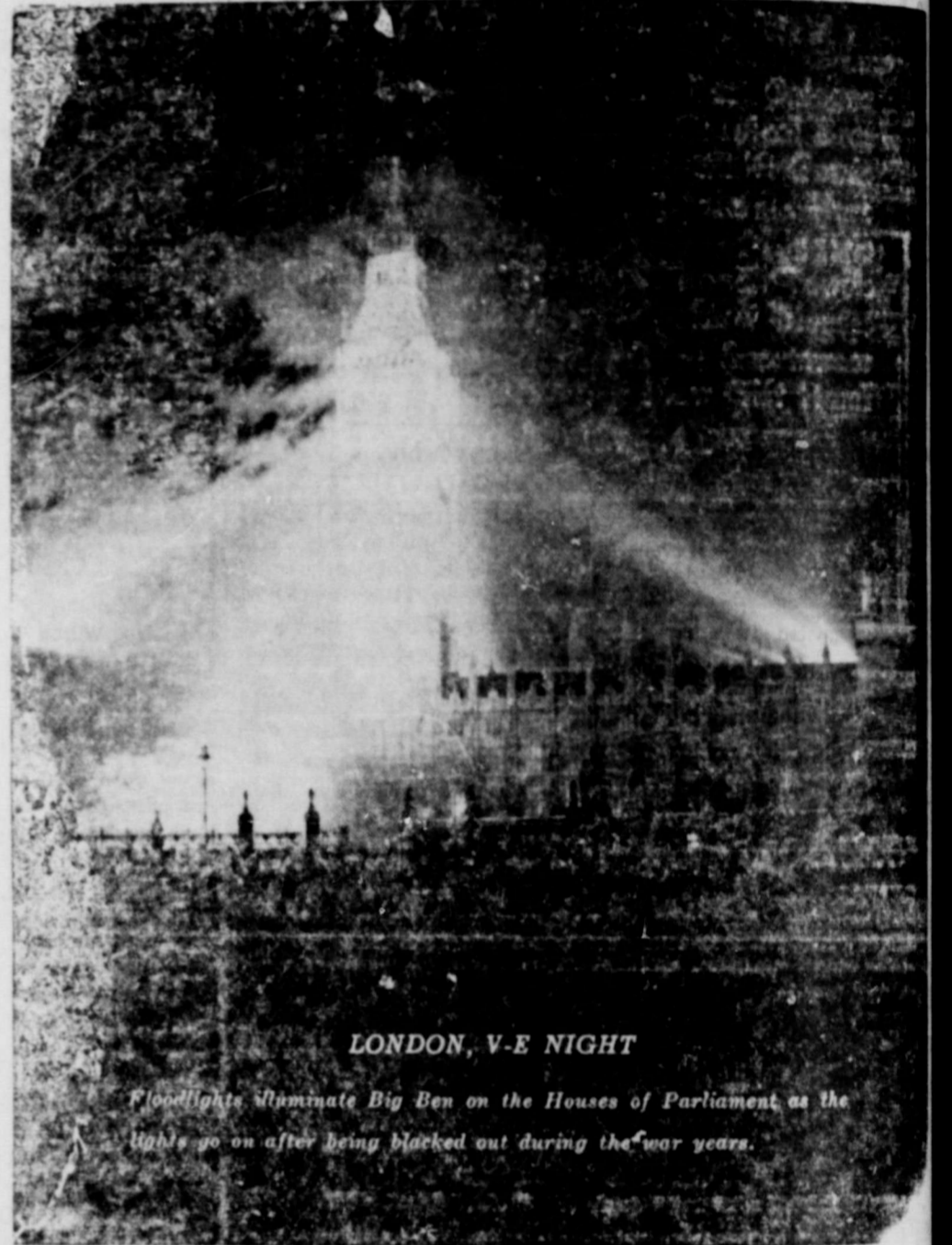

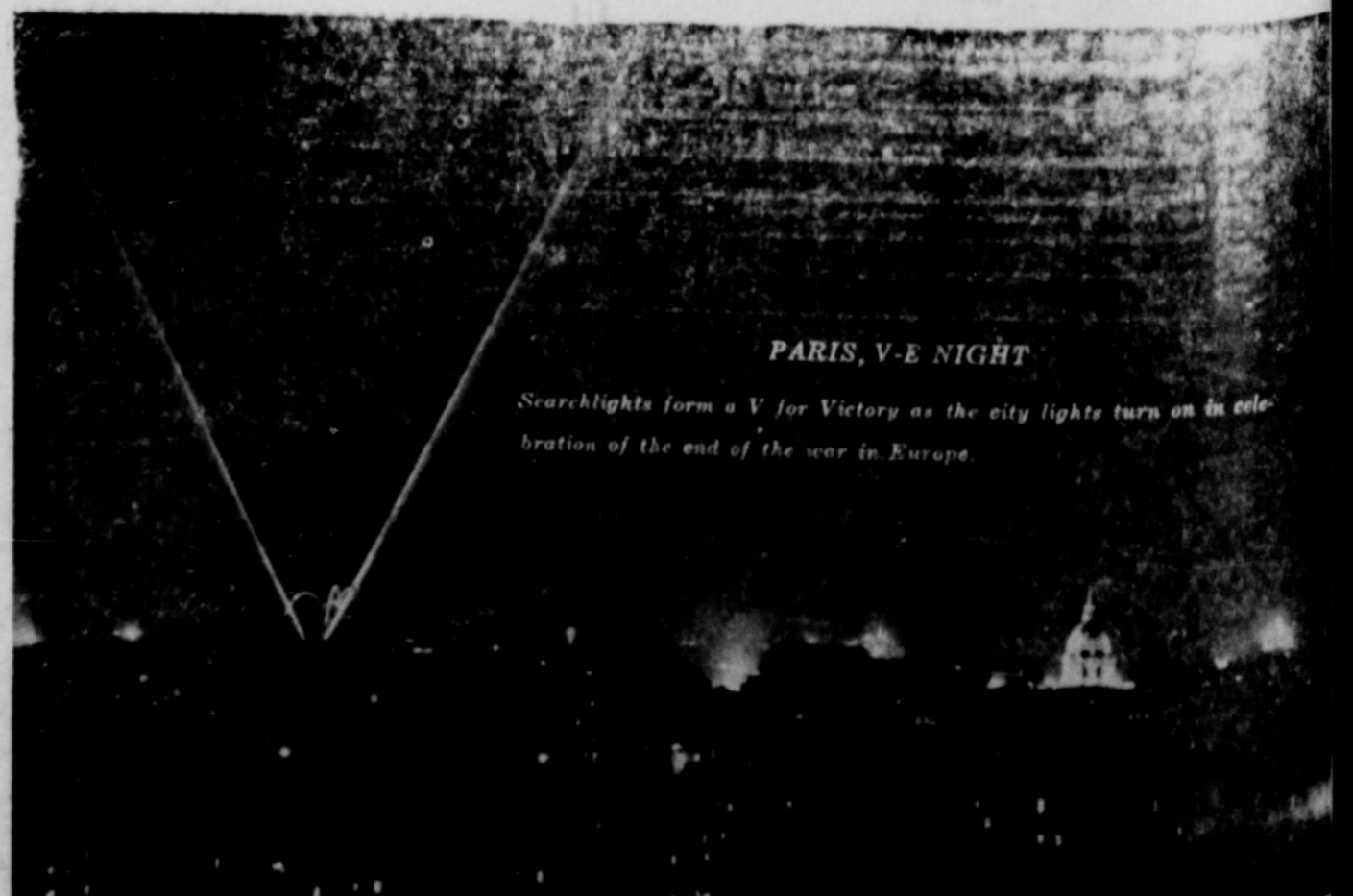

COUNTY AGENT By BILL McCUTCHEON

It seems that someone is protesting about something every day. These people continually criticize the efforts of others without offering any workable solutions to the problems. A case in point is pollution. Anything that can't readily be explained can always be blamed on agricultural chemicals.

I will readily admit that there are cases of misuse and I think controls are necessary. Some people think we should quit using these chemicals. It seems that most of the trend today is down with the establishment and in this case agricultural chemicals are part of the establishment. In this case as well as in many other cases these people are not considering the repercussions.

As I mentioned two weeks ago in this column, the American economy would collapse if American agriculture collapsed. This highly efficient agricultural machine we have that feeds much of the world was made possible through the development and use of these chemicals. Most of the fertilizers we use are chemical; the herbicides and insecticides are chemical. These materials have taken much of the gamble out of farming and livestock production and help us produce a dependable food supply.

Before man developed these chemicals there were many world wide famines, and at a period in history when the world population was relatively small. These famines were due to insects, diseases and drought.

There have been many predictions of world famines in the foreseeable future because of overpopulation. Without agricultural chemicals I believe that there would be a world famine in less than a year. Agricultural production would be set back 50 years. Most housewives complain about the price of food now. Can you imagine what the price of food would be if agricultural production was cut by 50 percent?

I like clean environment but I also like a full stomach. Through correct selection of chemicals and education of the general public I believe that this course of pollution can be controlled without over reaction.

I have mentioned TAM Wintergreen Hardinggrass in my column many times in the past two years and I think it is time that I put in another plug for this perennial Wintergreen.

There are at present some 600 acres I know of in Hamilton County and from what I have seen it ranges from good to excellent. It is not a wonder grass and takes good management starting with good seed bed preparation, good planting procedures, weed control and fertilization.

J. R. Hayes had the first TAM I know of in the county and it has certainly lived up to his expectations. J. R. has some 30 acres. Most of this is grass planted last fall.

The beauty of this grass is that it doesn't have to be replanted, and is about as productive as oats. The quality is good and on a dry year it will be much more productive than oats. Where livestock men in Hamilton County have always suffered in on winter pastures, I look for this grass to fill a need.

I will have to disagree with M. J. Norris, the developer of this grass, on one point. He says to plant in the spring in this area. Fall plantings have been a lot better because of less weed competition and better moisture.

Be sure you know the source of the topsoil you put on lawns, gardens or flower beds. If you are not careful you might bring in unwanted weeds, insects and diseases. Be sure and investigate your soil source. Rich looking river bottom soils frequently are infested with nut grass, bermuda and other hard to kill weeds as well as nematode infestation.

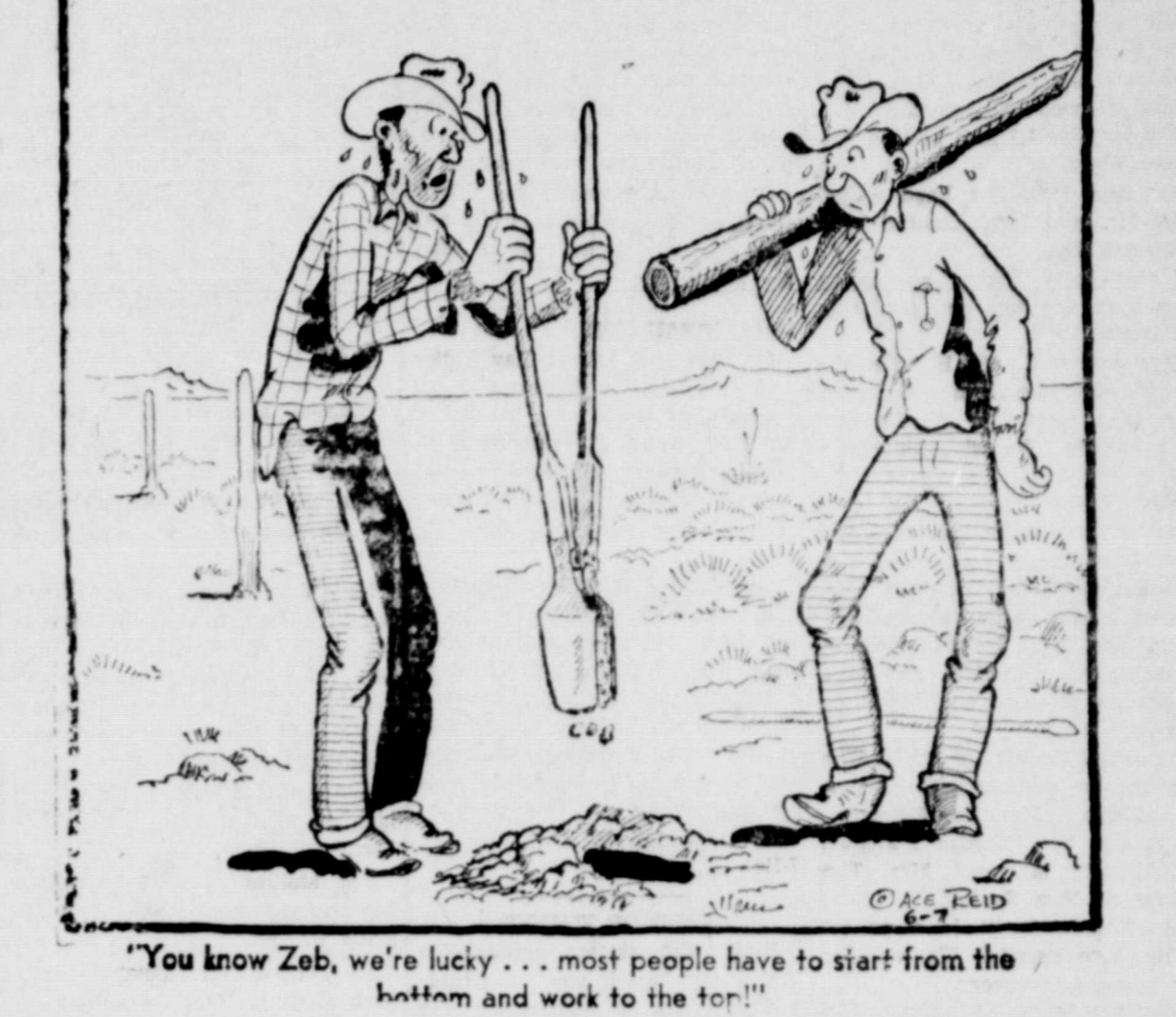
