

Marvin 'Cases Out' 50 Years With Postal Department

June 30th was retirement day for the Tom Powers, Louise Angell, op Ranch, Tee & Elbow Supcongenial mail carrier. He could have continued until Nov. 1 had

he so desired, but he chose to take his retirement at this time. "I've enjoyed every minute of of it (the postal service), but I'm ready to retire," was Mr. Marshall's only comment about his sudden unemployment.

Mr. Marshall's career with the postal department began Oct. 1, 1919 in the South Texas town of Runge. His service there lasted until Sept. 1, 1930, when his request to be transferred was granted. All of his eleven years at Runge were spent on a 28-mile rural route.

After transfer to Hico, Mr. Marshall went "inside", so to speak, and was clerk in the local office for 29 years-until July 11, 1959-when he transferred to the route carrier position that he has held until the present time.

There was one period, April 1943 until August 1945, that he wasn't working in the local office, but this 21/2-year span was credited to Hico service. During that absence he was Clerk in Charge of the North Installa-

During his service at Hico.

Marshall has served under only three postmasters, the late John Lackey, Mrs. R. L. Holford, and the present postmaster, Robert Jackson. He has also been in the postal service during the terms of 10 Presidents, beginning with Woodrow Wil-

The retiree has been an ac-

tive Mason for 48 years, is a member of the Eastern Star, is currently Lav Leader of First United Methodist Church, and has been chairman of the official board of the church, finance commission chairman, and has served in almost every capacity of the board. He is also a past member of the Chamber of Commerce, as well as cooperating in other movements for the general good of the town.

Mr. Marshall and his wife, Drusilla, have two children, Glenn, who is principal of the Indian school at White River Reservation in Cibecue, Ariz., and Maynard, who is a career Navy Master Chief Petty Officer, currently serving at Corpus Christi. And they have a number of grandchildren that they are equally proud of.

About retirement, Mr. Marshall says he isn't looking forward to any particular thing, but is anticipating a small amount of travel, a trip to visit his son and family in Corpus later in the summer, and an even later trip to Arizona to visit with the eldest son, Glenn and family. Other than that, he says he will probably settle down to the hog-raising business with his partner, James Cryer,



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Social Security

Questions & Answers By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: I have been off from work for three months. I plan to return to my job August 1. If I find that I can't work because of my disability when I return to work can I collect social security disability benefits for these past three

ANSWER: No. Under the social security disability law, a person has to be disabled for a full sixmonth period before cash benefits can be paid. The fact that you return to work on August 1 and then find that you can't hold your job because of your disability would not prevent us from using that three months in the six-month period to determine your eligibility. If, when you cannot work after trying to. see our representative right away to file for disability. All the facts will be taken into consideration a the time your claim is filed.
