Good winter pastures don't just happen-they are planned.

The use of small grains for winpreparation should be underway

Because little, if any, forage is produced in late December, January and February, forage utilized during this period must be produced earlier. To do this the crop has to be seeded early and it must come up and grow vigorously. Therefore, the seedbed must be well prepared and moist. To accomplish this, land should be plowed early divorce decree and kept clean-tilled through the summer to conserve moisture. This allows early seedbed preparation and planting.

The type of plow used is not too important except that any compacted layer of soil must be broken up and vegetation must be controlled to stop moisture loss.

Final seedbed preparation and seeding should be planned for late August or early September.

Pastures containing stemmy, mature grasses and unsightly weeds should be mowed in order to give the better forage plants a chance for regrowth when and if we receive some moisture.

A heavy weed infestation can cut forage production by 50 percent or more. Mowing pastures is not only a good weed control practice but will help maintain the quality of grass by keeping new and tender growth coming on.

Some stockmen hesitate to mow their pastures during the summer because of the usual hot and dry weather. By mowing a part of the pasture and waiting until it recovers, then mowing the remainder, this problem can largely be elim-

The mowing height is important. Mowing above forage plants being noon saved for hay or later grazing will eliminate the tall weeds; however RETURN FROM HOUSTON pastures where grazing is continuous can be moved at heights of two or three inches.


