The improvement will consist of the reconstruction of grading, structures and surfacing. The contemplated location for the proposed project follows the existing highway

Additional right of way of 120 feet minimum width will be required throughout the project, but no re-locations will be involved.

Maps and other drawings showing the proposed location and geometric design and any other information about the proposed project are on file and available for inspection and copying at the Resident Engineer's office in Hamilton. Also, the drawings have been placed on file with the County Judge, and with the Central Texas Council of Governments in Belton.

Information about the State's Relocation Assistance Program, the and the relocation assistance office, as well as information about the tentative schedules for acquisition of right of way and construction can be obtained at the Resident Engineer's Office.




