Deer Hunters Expected to Converge on Area for Opening

Deer hunters from all sections of the state—especially from the Waco, Fort Worth and Dallas areas, will converge on Hico this weekend for the opening of the 1970 venison harvest, beginning Saturday morning.

And prospects are for a very successful season, with deer plentiful and in excellent condition. Bountiful rains and food supplies at the proper time have been major factors in the increased deer population in the area.

Most lands in this area have been leased, with only a few places remaining that are suitable for the sport.

Also opening Saturday is the ever-popular quail season, which will further add to the traffic in the area.

The deer season runs from Saturday morning, Nov. 14 through Sunday, January 3. The quail season is even longer, running through February 15.

Merchants Offer Prizes.

Two Hico businesses, Jackson's Superette and Blair's Hardware & Sporting Goods, are offering several hundred dollars worth of merchandise to lucky hunters in contests to run throughout the season.

Included in the list are two deer rifles, a pair of binoculars, and smaller items.

Louise Blair is offering a Sprinfield Model 840 30.30 deer rifle for

the heaviest deer killed in this area. The deer must be weighed at her store, field dressed. Winner and weights will be revealed at the end of the season.

C. R. Jackson, who with his son, Delbert, own the grocery, said that prizes were being increased this year from the rifle given away last season.

This year, the Jacksons will present a 243 Savage rifle to the best trophy head killed in this area (20-mile radius). In addition to the new rifle, a set of binoculars will be given to the person bagging the deer with the most points, and as another incentive, each 25th deer checked at Jackson's will be worth a box of shells.

Mr. Jackson listed the following rules which will apply in the trophy deer contest:

"Gun will be awarded for best trophy. Best trophy will be determined by measuring the widest point inside the horns and uniformity. In case of tie amount of points of one inch or over will be considered."

If horns have been sawed off the head, they will be disqualified. This offer is good only in this trade territory. (20-mile radius of Hico.) Measurements will be made at Jackson's Superette."

"Management's decision will be final. Winner will be notified at end of season."

Hico, Gorman In Friday Showdown

It's show-down time in District 17-B this week as Hico and Gorman clash in a 7:30 p.m. contest at Gorman, and Meridian travels to Lometa for a joust with the twice-beaten Hornets.

Gorman, the pre-season favorite to cop the district crown, has been established a solid favorite to put the skids to Hico and set up the championship game next week with Meridian. Gorman is 2-0 in district play, and the Tigers have their backs to the wall with a 1-1 record.

Gorman, featuring plenty of speed has had the Tigers' number the past two years, downing a favored Hico eleven 54-28 in 1968, and humiliating the locals 50-7 last year

in a game that was supposed to be close.

Hico will be even more crippled than in previous games, with the loss of senior tackle David Ashby. Ashby was felled in the Lometa game with torn ligaments, and is out for the season; He joins senior center Rickie Jaggars on the disabled list.

Coach Ed Pettitt said this week that he would move Wendell Bell to Ashby's strong tackle slot, and insert Leroy Grice at the weak tackle post.

This will be the next to last game of the year for the Tigers, with only Evant remaining on the schedule. The Tigers will host Evant next week in the season finale.

Tigers Dump Hornets 20-12

Hico's Tigers remembered the embarrassing 42-6 loss to Lometa last year which spoiled a previously unblemished slate, and would have no part of such a rout this year as the Bengals fought and clawed their way to a 20-12 win over the Hornets last Friday night at the local stadium.

But the Hornets proved a formidable foe, and a gallant Tiger goal-line stand early in the game could have been the turning point. Lometa marched 80 yards after the opening kickoff before the Tigers stiffened and took over on the one yard line. The Hornets failed to dent the end zone in four tries from the seven.

The momentum gained from the stout defensive play proved to be too much for the Hornets, even after the visitors lit up the scoreboard first early in the second quarter to take a 6-0 lead.

The Tigers struck right back with a 65 yard drive of their own to take a 7-6 lead at halftime. The Tiger drive was set up by a recovered fumble, and with the help of three penalties, marched the distance in eight plays. Eugene Lindsey scored the initial marker from the 3 on a pitchout. Galen Lindsey kicked the extra point.

Pfc. Tommy Murray Is Awarded Combat Infantryman Badge

An Khe, Vietnam (AHTNC)—Army Private First Class Tommy D. Murray, 21, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Murray of Hico, recently received the Combat Infantryman Badge near An Khe, Vietnam.

The badge is a unique and cherished award that is highly coveted by its recipients. The award was originated during World War II to recognize the role of the Infantryman. The CIB can be awarded only to a member of an infantry unit of brigade, regimental or smaller size unit who satisfactorily performed in active ground combat against a hostile force for a period of time.

In honor of its singular meaning, the badge is worn above all other awards and decorations, over the left breast. It is a blue rectangle with a silver rifle mounted on it, superimposed over a curved wreath. Subsequent awards are represented by stars at the top center of the wreath.

Pvt. Murray received the award while assigned as a mortar crewman in Company E, 1st Battalion of the 4th Infantry Division's 12th Infantry.

Murray entered the Army in March 1970, completed basic training at Ft. Lewis, Washington, and was last stationed at Ft. Knox, Kentucky.

His wife, Kathy, lives in Hico.

Great Plains Conservation Program to Be Explained

Thursday, Nov. 12 at 7 p.m. in the District Courtroom at Hamilton, the Great Plains Conservation Program (GPCP) will be explained.

There is a possibility that this program may be approved for this year. It provides enough producers to have an interest in the program. Under this program farmers who elect to undertake certain conservation practices can get part of their job done free. Under the program the government generally pays from 50 to 80 percent of total cost on certain practices.

The GPCP differs from the regular ACP program. Farmers and others must agree to adopt a conservation package in order to qualify for the GPCP. This involves a comprehensive plan for the entire farm unit and producers must agree on a contract with the government to perform prescribed practices within a period of 3 to 5 years.

Farmers may choose from one of several prescribed packages in making a conservation package, including: Conversion of cropland to permanent grass cover; Re-seeding pasture and rangeland; Live-stock water development; Fencing; Tracing; Windbreaks; and Irrigation system improvement.

The government will also pay part of cost for fishing and wildlife habitat to building recreation facilities and for abatement of agricultural related pollution. This provision was included for the first time in legislation of Nov. 1969 that extended the GPCP through 1975.

This law, "PL 91-118" also authorized the expenditure of \$300 million. Total payment in any one year shall not exceed \$25 million. To date more than 31,000 farmers have been enrolled in GPCP in over 420 counties in all 10 states of the Great Plains. Many other farmers have applications pending.

The GPCP is administered by the Conservation Service. Farmers and ranchers of Hamilton County are interested in ob-

taining the GPCP then they should be present at this meeting and voice their opinion as to whether or not they want the agencies of the Department of Agriculture to submit a request for the GPCP for Hamilton County.

In 1970 Mills, San Saba, Bosque and Comanche counties were made eligible to participate in the program.



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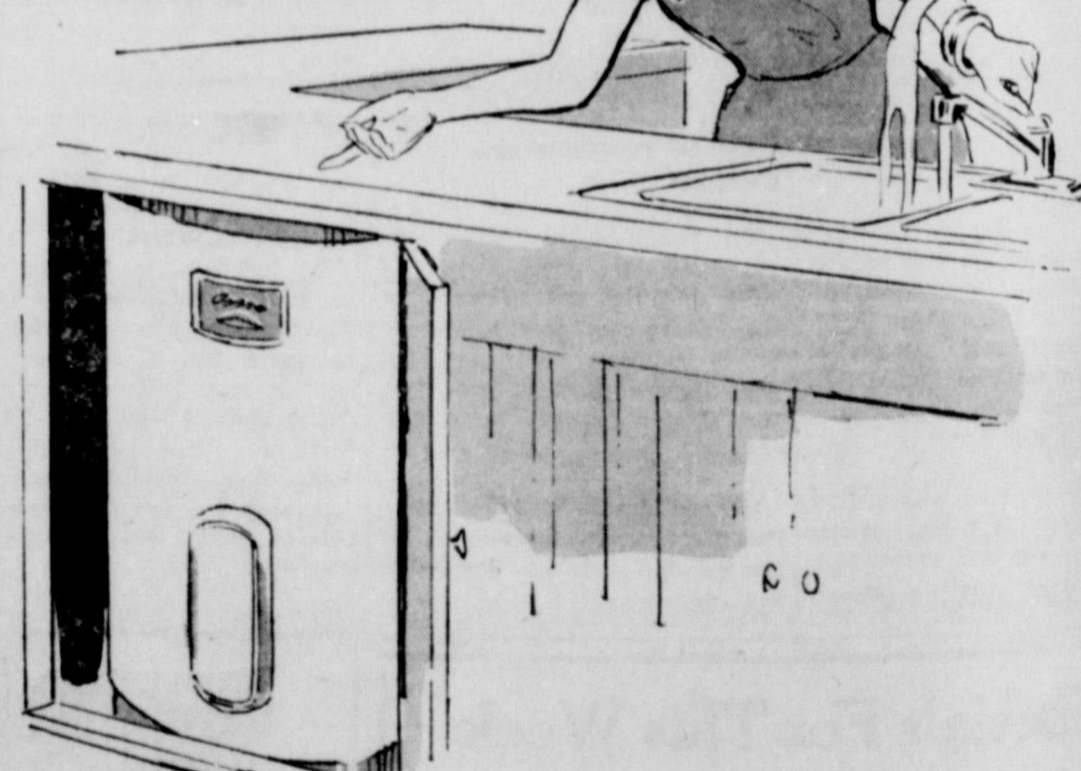

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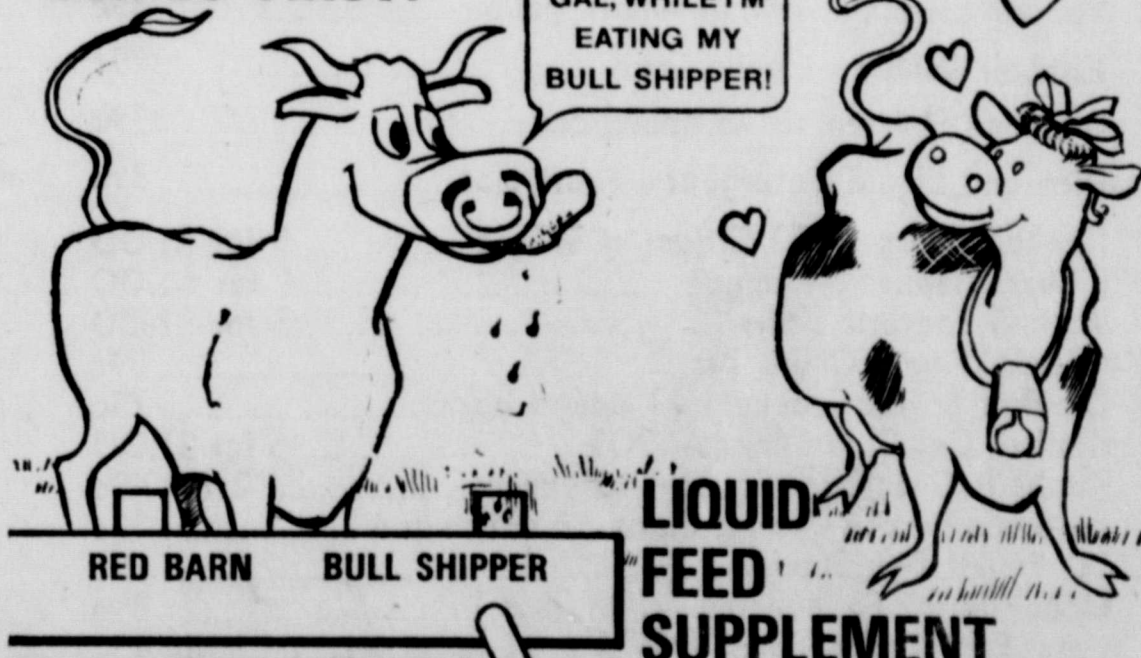
