Civic Club Adopts Little League Park Project For '71

A fund drive was started this week with which to construct long-needed Little League ball field for local and youngsters.

The Civic Club, in a recent meeting, adopted the proposal for a club project, and authorized Lou Carrington to proceed with planning of the facility. Carrington, a strong booster of the sport, is in charge of the project.

Plans call for construction of regulation Little League diamond to be built on City property near the Bosque River. The property was formerly used as a recreational area, including a baseball field and swimming pool. The proposed diamond will also be constructed

to make a regular softball field for youngsters and adults.

Preliminary planning calls for complete lighting of the facility for night play, one row of bleachers, and a 60-ft. backstop. Total estimated cost is around \$2,200.

Leveling dirt has already been hauled to the site, and work on lighting and other features will start shortly after the first of the year.

Completion is expected to be in time for Hico teams to use the facility in the spring Little League season, and for the summer softball season.

Contributions are now being accepted by Civic Club Secretary Roy Ellenburg, Carrington or by any member of the organization.

Hico Man Receives Third Commendation Medal at Alaska Base

Master Sergeant Clifford R. Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Johnson of Hico, was awarded his third Air Force Commendation Medal by Colonel Arthur Harris, his present Commander at the 602nd Military Airlift Support Squadron (MAC) at Elmendorf AFB, Alaska. The award was presented on November 20.

Since receiving the award, Johnson has been promoted to Senior Master Sergeant.

His latest citation read as follows: "Master Sergeant Clifford R. Johnson distinguished himself by meritorious services while assigned as Noncommissioned Officer in Charge and Chief Scheduler, Wing Flight Management, 1st Composite Wing, Andrews AFB, Maryland, from 23 August 1968 to 28 May 1970. During this period Sergeant Johnson provided the effective management required to conduct the successful operation of the largest and most complex non-scheduled airline system in the Air Force. New School Lunch Program Offers Reduced Fee for Needy

Hico School has long recognized the need for helping meet nutritional needs of its students. The school serves a well-planned nutritious lunch each day. For those in the fifth grade and above and 40c for students above fifth grade.

However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the Authorized Lunch Representative and committee to be unable to pay the full price for the lunches.

Families who feel that their children may be eligible for free or reduced price lunches are urged to apply. Copies of the application form were sent home in a letter to parents earlier this week. Additional copies may be obtained at the superintendent's office. The completed application, signed by an adult member of the family, should be returned to Supt. O. C. Cook. Such applications will be reviewed promptly and within two days the family will be notified in writing as to the decision made. All information provided on the application will be held in the strictest confidence. Decisions for approval will be based on the following income scales:

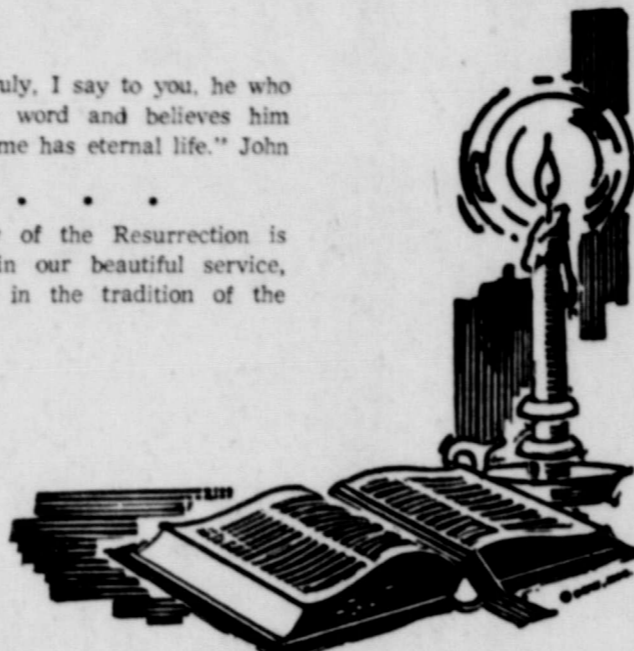

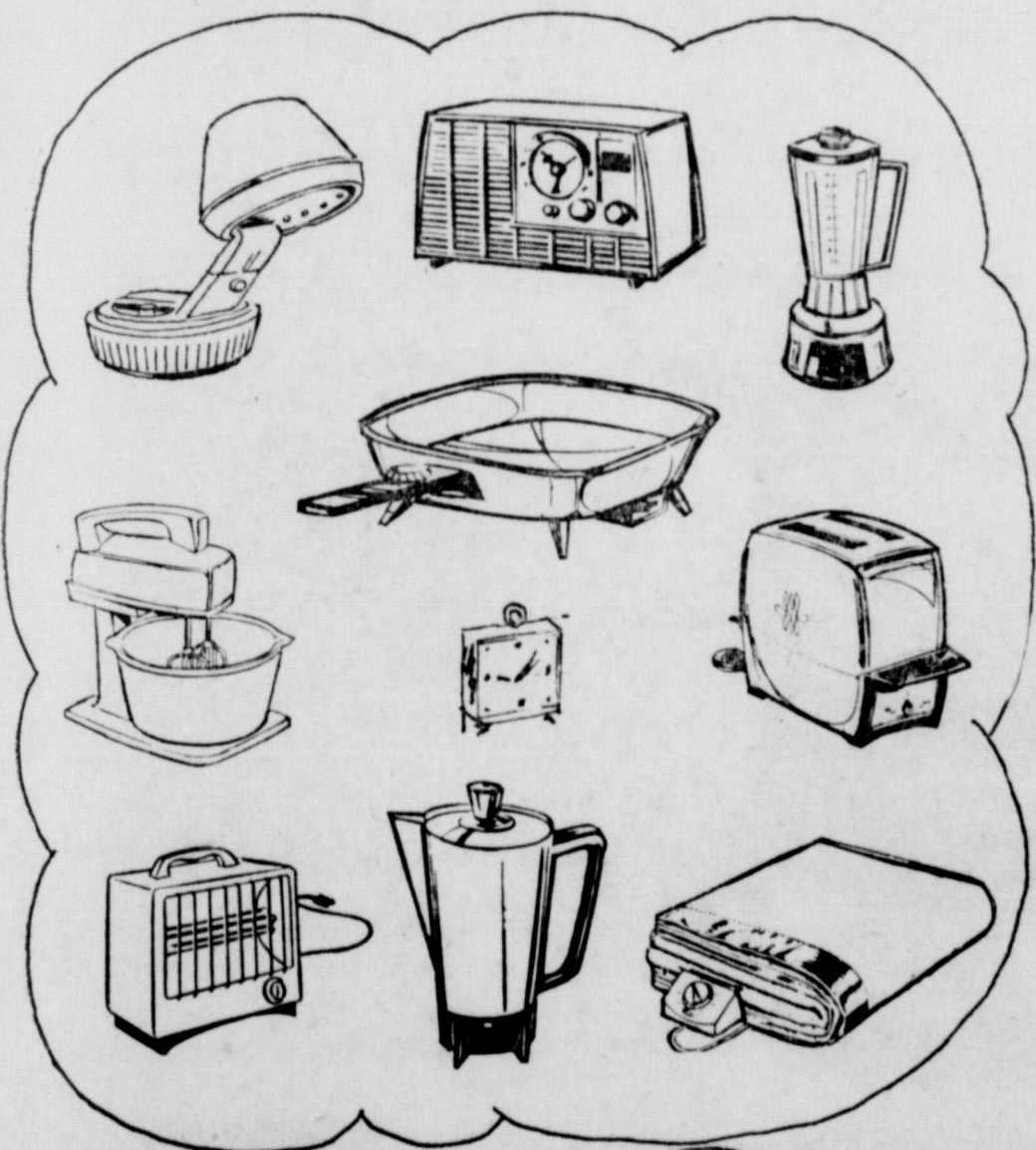

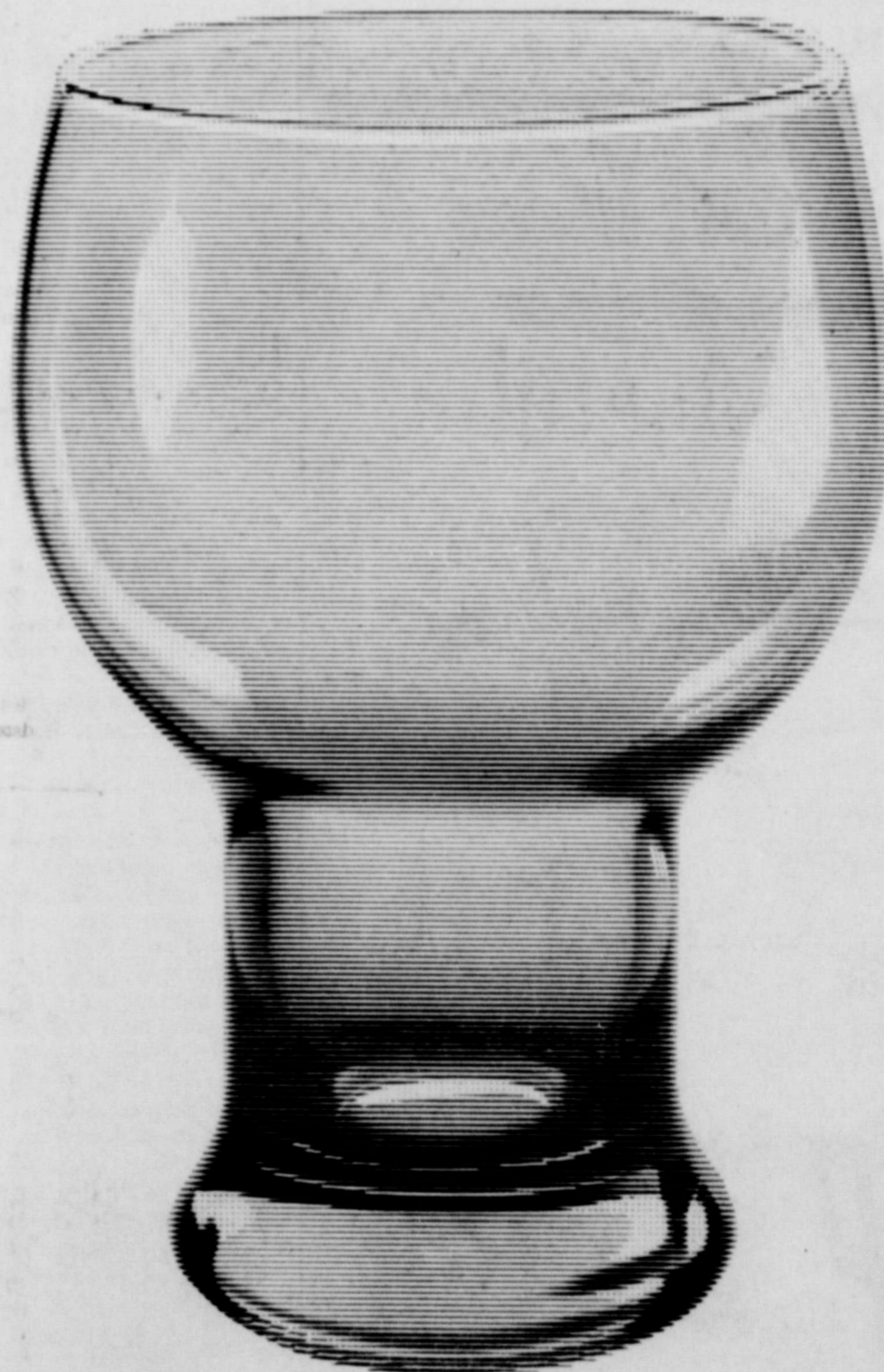
