



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

# Social Security

Questions & Answers By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: I would like to know if a person has to work right up to the time they reach retirement age to get social security benefits. What if I decide to retire at age 62. ANSWER: No, it is not necessary for a person to work right up to the time they retire and file for social security retirement benefits. If a person retires from social security jobs before they are 60 years of age, then the amount of their social security benefits will be reduced since the amount is based on the person's working lifetime. except for five years of no work, or low earnings, which can be dropped from the computation, Naturally, if a person works right up to age 65, then they may have some low years of earnings several years back that can be dropped and this

would increase their benefit. But the retiring person can retire at any age and still be eligible to

their social security benefits, just so they have the minimum amount of work-time on social security jobs.
