Questions & Answers By JACK CALVERT

QUESTION: My wife and I are planning to leave on an extended vacation early in April. We will be traveling in several states. If either of us are injured or become ill while in another state and we require medical services or hospitalization, will our Medicare take care of these expenses for us?

ANSWER: Yes, your Medicare insurance is good any place in the United States. If you and your insurance protection, and the hospital is one that participates in Medicare, it does not matter where you are hospitalized. All hospitals that participate in the Medicare program operate under the same rules and regulations. The same deductible and co-insurance amounts apply equally well throughout the United States. For your medical insurance doctor bill coverage, just get itemized bills from the doctor or clinic, and you can file claims on these expenses yourself. If you have any question, get in touch with the nearest social security office. Be sure and take your Medicare cards with you when
