Question: I am writing this for my mother. She is 66 years old and doesn't get any kind of pension or benefit. My father died in 1952. He had a social security number, but we can't recall but one or the ladies with a 482, Marilynn Jo- two places he ever worked off the farm. Mother never checked on Social Security because she thought he hadn't paid in enough. Can she get anything? She has never worked for wages herself.

Answer: Your mother should check on her social security rights as soon as possible. She may be right in thinking her husband did not work enough to get checks as a widow, but there is no way she can be sure unless she has actually filed a claim for widow's benefits. She could be losing money due her this way. Tell her to get in touch with the Social Security office. It costs nothing.
