

### Irrigation Well Pumping 1000 Gallons At Holladay Place

Cool, clear water is what you see gushing from the irrigation well shown in the accompanying picture, and a lot of it at that. The well is the second drilled on

the G. E. Holladay place west of

Drilled to a depth of 297 feet, the well has been gauged at 1,000 gallons per minute, which compares to the 600-gallon well drilled on the place in 1965. Average water

production from wells drilled in this area is around 650 gallons per minute, according to Mr. Holladay. Irrigation is nothing new to the Holladays, who formerly operated a dairy at their farm, as they first started watering crops 15 years ago using water pumped from the Bosque River. They have irrigated from the smaller well since 1965, and with addition of the new well, all of their cropland is now subject to irrigation.

All of their cropland is sprigged to coastal bermuda grass, and the Holladays have purchased two walking irrigation sprinkler systems to get over the land. They also have Hester Drilling Co. of Dublin

\* IT'S OFFICIAL-HICO INHABITED BY 975 SOULS!

Hico's official population is 975, according to figures released last week by the Federal sus Bureau. This is 13 less than the unofficial figure released last June, which was 988, and 35 less than the 1960 census. Hamilton's figures gained from the June release with a count now of 2760 as compared to the previous 2729, but is still the lowest since 1940 when the population was 2716.

Hamilton County has an official populaiton of 7198 for 1970. Stephenville's population increased more than 26 percent during the last 10 years. The 1970 population is 9,277 compared to 7,357 in 1960.
