COUNTY CENSUS FACTS

The Official Poop!

Hamilton County's official population in the 1970 Census was 11,196,730, up 16.9 percent from the 1960 figure of 9,579,677. The 1970 Census counted 7,151 white persons in Hamilton County, 99.3 percent of the total; Negroes, and 16 persons of other races. In 1960, 99.8 percent of the population was white. The Census showed 330 children under 5 years; 1,295 in ages 5 through 17; 3,664 people 18 through 64; and 1,909 who were 65 and older. The popula-

tion 14 years and over included 4,088 married people, 861 who were widowed, 138 divorced, and 957 never married. Hamilton County's 1970 population was classified as 38.3 percent urban, and 61.7 percent rural. There were 2,877 households, with 6,991 persons, including 679 one-person households. In addition 207 persons were living in group quarters. The 1970 Census counted 3,429 housing units in the county, 2,260 of them occupied by owners, 617 occupied by tenants, and 552 vacant. These included vacant units for seasonal use. The proportion occupied by owners in 1970 was 65.9 percent, compared with 63.4 percent in 1960.

Among year-round dwelling units there were 3,287 single family houses, 112 housing units in multi-unit buildings, and 10 mobile homes or trailers. The percentage of occupied units with more than one person per room was 4.1, compared with 6.4 in 1960. Of all the occupied housing units, 2,641 had piped water, toilet, and bath, while 236 lacked some or all plumbing. The median value of owner-occupied houses in Hamilton County was \$7,500, compared with \$5,300 in 1960. The median rent paid by tenants in 1970 was less than \$30 per month, compared with \$40 in 1960. Half were over and half below the median figures.

3,198 QUALIFY TO VOTE IN COUNTY

When the final deadline closed Feb. 28 in voter registration, 21 Hico people had taken advantage of the extension period. Five of these were under age 21. This number brought the Hamilton County total for February to 73. The final count of registered voters for the county is 3,198, which includes 117 youth under age 21. The 3,198 registrants represent 44.4 percent of the county's total population in the 1970 census.

She was a member of the Highland Park Presbyterian Church in Dallas. Survivors include one sister, Mrs. E. W. Harris of Walnut Springs; one brother, Wick Simpson of Iredell, and a host of nieces and nephews. Nephews served as pallbearers.

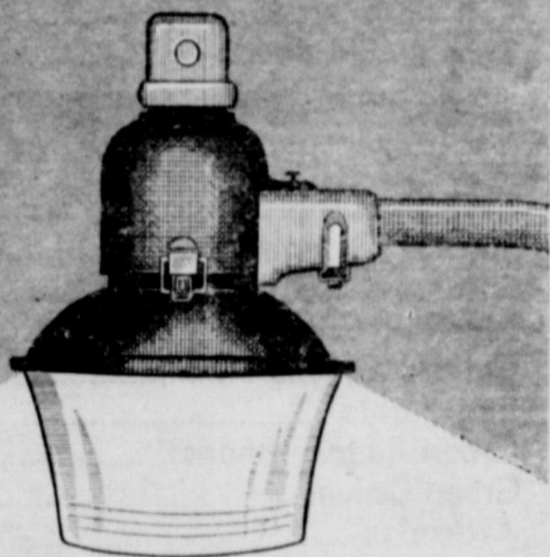

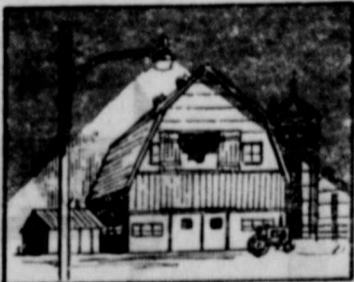

Science Fair Winners Named Following Tuesday Judging

The Chemistry Class of Hico High School exhibited science projects fast week to visitors during Public School Week. The 22 class members presented projects for judging Tuesday afternoon. Drs. Tom Hinkson and Lamar Johanson, Tarleton State College professors, interviewed the group and awarded prizes.

Canty, a senior, exhibited "Using Plant Lectins to Identify Blood Groups." The purpose of his project was to see what plant lectins agglutinate different types of blood. Canty stated that he was successful in agglutinating or clumping five different lectins with one type of blood. He added that he had learned that plants, as well as people, contain a chemical capable of

clumping blood cells.

Miss Putty's project, "Eneucleation," was the removal of a cat's eyeball. She explained that it was a simple surgery in which the simple continuous and subcuticular patterns are used. "Amateur Rocketry" was Alan Ross' project. He built and flew a rocket.

Charlotte Meek conducted her experiment to determine if heat or cold had any effect on the bounciness of various balls. Cindy Braune experimented with the effect of cigarette smoke on different types of plants. Jon Bonner collected and identified fossils from his family ranch.

Fourth place projects included "Vitamins for Better Health" by Ferguson. "Electrostatic Precipitators in Industry" by Miss Walker, and "River Analysis" by Miss Robinson.

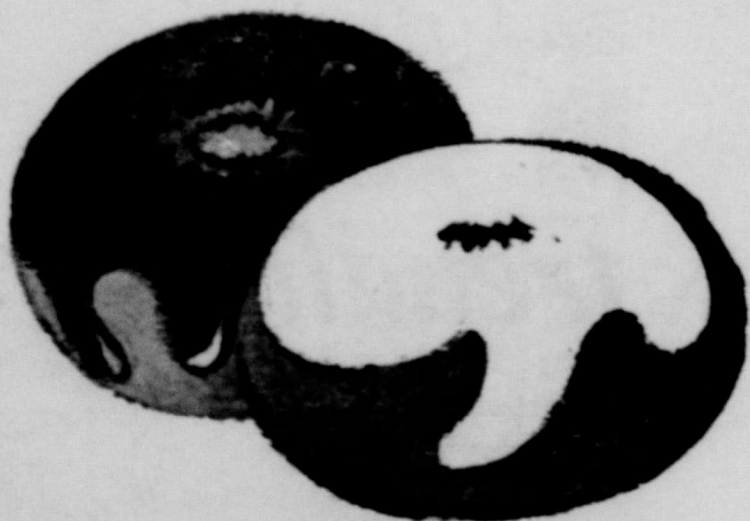
