Captain McClure, a Vietnam veteran, was an Army Nurse stationed with the 95th Evacuation Hospital in Da Nang. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd McClure, and is a 1966 graduate of Hico High School and was graduated in 1969 from Baylor University's School of

Using slides to relate to her audience, Captain McClure discussed the country, climate and Vietnamese people. "Texas weather has nothing on South Vietnam weather," said the native Texan. "It was nothing unusual for the temperature to reach 116 to 120 degrees. From October to December the monsoon season set in, and the Americans were then greeted with rain that fell in sheets without ceasing. After December periods of hot days followed by cold days were experienced. The terrific heat occured from February to October."






