Officials Eye Weather After Last Years Blizzard

Talk to your weatherman, pull a few strings, pray a little, or do anything else that might bring fair weather to this year's stock show—the 24th—scheduled Friday at City Park. And a good Spring day wouldn't hamper the 4th Annual Homemaking Show scheduled the same day.

Those of you who might have had occasion to attend last year's show—and many of you did—will remember the very inclement weather featuring rain, sleet and snow, and a temperature that hovered near the freezing mark all day. So that's the reason for the urgent appeal. Do everything possible to bring about better conditions for this Friday.

The combined shows actually will be kicked off Thursday night at 7 o'clock when the annual style show will be held at the school auditorium. The show was changed from earlier format to enable officials to have more time to judge the many entries in the popular event.

Art, food and handwork will be on display at the Fred Jaggars Building (former post office) from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Friday.

Stock Show.

The stock show will get underway promptly at 9 a.m. at City Park, with the first event scheduled being the swine division.

Following swine judging, goats will take the ring at 10 a.m., sheep at 11, and the dairy show will be judged at 1:30 p.m.

Concluding event will be the beef division, scheduled to start at 3 p.m. Dogs will also be judged at 3 p.m.

Harold Walker, local FFA Advisor, said that three competent judges had been secured for this year's show, and one of the judges is a "first" for the popular event. Mrs. Sonny Reuland of Austin will judge the dog show, and becomes the first woman ever to judge here. Mrs. Reuland is active in a number of sports clubs, exhibits fine Arabian horses, designs native costumes for the Arabian riding events, and because of her canine interests is expected to serve well as the dog judge.

Livestock judge is Layton Black of Goldthwaite, an experienced critic of fine animals for the past few years. Mr. Black is a 1963 graduate of Texas A&M, where he participated with livestock judging teams. He taught Vocational Agriculture in Goldthwaite, and now operates a feedlot operation there. He was quite active in the FFA in high school and served as a State Vice-President of the organization. He is well known in livestock circles.

Mr. Joel M. Hillin, Assistant Professor of Dairy Science at Tarleton State College, will judge the dairy cattle. Mr. Hillin was reared on a livestock farm in Rusk County, and holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M. He served as Assistant County Agent at Carthage for two years and was Dairy Specialist in herd management and DHIA records with the Texas Extension Specialist Program from 1961-67. He is a member of American Dairy Science Association and Dairy Shrine Club, and is an approved judge of dairy cattle for Holstein, Jersey, Brown Swiss and Guernseys as recognized by the dairy breed associations.

Mr. Hillin has judged dairy cattle at previous Hico stock shows, and is recognized for the outstanding way he conducts showmanship contests.

trend toward over population and if everyone can be made aware of his responsibility in keeping clean air to breathe, clean water to drink, and uncontaminated food to eat.

The over-population problem is in the hands of scientists and world leaders who are striving for the reduction of birth rates and who must succeed in stabilizing the world population at or near its present level. People—no matter how careful they are—naturally pollute their surroundings, and too many can mean too much pollution to cope with.

The greater responsibility is on the shoulders of each individual. The atmosphere is becoming a floating dump ground due to the hydrocarbons dumped into it daily by automobiles, factories, and airplanes. Even though much research has been done on devices to prevent the escape of these hydrocarbons into the air, an effective one has not been developed at present. Just as our atmosphere is being fouled, our land and waterways are being literally drowned in litter, filth, and chemical poisons. Some of today's cities and factories are still dumping sewage, wastes, and poisonous chemicals into the waterways. These wastes cause bacteria to grow which eventually will kill all life in the waters, leaving stagnant pools behind. After looking at these two pollution problems, we turn and see people carelessly littering the countryside—using nature's beauty spots as dump grounds. Due to the pollution of the air, land, and water, Mother Nature's balance is being upset.

We must observe the standards set up on pollution and let nature take a course of re-constructing the land, water, and air that man has destroyed.

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Capt. McClure Gives Students First-Hand Look at Vietnam

"Summing up a year that is totally different from any other experience one has ever had, is quite difficult," stated Captain Mary Ann McClure when she returned to address her alma mater, Hico High School, last week.

Captain McClure, a Vietnam veteran, was an Army Nurse stationed with the 95th Evacuation Hospital in Da Nang. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd McClure, and is a 1966 graduate of Hico High School and was graduated in 1969 from Baylor University's School of Nursing.

Using slides to relate to her audience, Captain McClure discussed the country, climate and Vietnamese people. "Texas weather has nothing on South Vietnam weather," said the native Texan. "It was nothing unusual for the temperature to reach 116 to 120 degrees. From October to December the monsoon season set in, and the Americans were then greeted with rain that fell in sheets without ceasing. After December periods of hot days followed by cold days were experienced. The terrific heat occurred from February to October."

"The Vietnamese Army has been trained but they easily forget their training," continued Capt. McClure. She stated that the Vietnamese people are willing to just "slide along" and certainly didn't want to hurt anyone. She reminded the Hico students that the Vietnamese had as their main aim to survive and not starve to death, and they would gladly say they would follow American ideas one day and the next day fall right in line with the beliefs of the Viet Cong. She further emphasized that the Vietnamese people could not be trusted.

"The Vietnamese take everything that the Americans junk and put to use," explained the speaker. One of the slides used showed a small hut covered with tin can siding. The South Vietnamese orphanages are full of children of American fathers. Capt. McClure stated that she spent much of her free time visiting the orphanage located near the hospital where she worked.

When asked what impressed her most about her tour of duty, the Hicoan explained, "the red alerts, Vietnamese riots, and the Black Market." Again pointing out more about the character of the Vietnamese, she stated that as long as the Vietnamese people can not see you or an object which might harm them they assume everything is alright. "They never look behind them," the group was told, "and once a Vietnamese was hit by an American jeep. The whole town rioted and it took hours to restore order in the streets."

"The Black Market," explained Capt. McClure, "is where the Vietnamese steal or buy American goods and sell them back to the G.I.'s for twice as much money. You really have to be on guard and careful if you even walk by the market square," said the speaker. She told of a personal experience of a Vietnamese trying to steal her camera and although her camera was not stolen she was nearly knocked down. All sorts of black market drugs were sold there also.

"One really appreciates the comforts of home," concluded Capt. McClure. "Who would have ever made me believe that I would go a whole year without driving a car," she continued. "Since being back home, I enjoy so much just walking through department stores and grocery stores," she explained. "And, oh yes, tub baths and running hot water are out of this world," she added.

"I met a multitude of friends and I would not take for the year's experience; however, I sometimes wish I were back so I could know just what is going on—you folks don't really know the true story."

FLOWER ARRANGING POINTERS GIVEN AT FRIDAY GARDEN CLUB MEETING

Mrs. Alvin Casey and Mrs. V. H. Jenkins judged arrangements made by members at Friday's Garden Club meeting.

Mrs. Casey gave an introduction of Garden Club work, which became an affiliated club in 1928. It was incorporated in 1945. Local clubs send delegates to the state center, which is the Botanic Garden in Fort Worth. The National Center is in St. Louis, Mo.

Local clubs have standing committees on garden therapy and civic beautification. Others are plant exchange, membership, telephone, yearbook, finance, and yard of the month.

Programs are on conservation, landscaping and flower arranging. The local club has a fall bazaar, September tea, Christmas party, tour of homes, Arbor Day observance, spring flower show, and tour of gardens. Officers are installed at this tour in May, which includes a sack lunch.

Mrs. Casey told the beginners in flower arranging the first thing that they should do is buy a pinpoint, florist clay, paper of pins, chewing gum, tape, and a container. Have the container dry when the pinpoint is put into it. Height,

balance are important. Spikes are used in numbers of 3, 5, 7, or 9.

Arrangements are made in a triangle, asymmetrical, vertical, and hogarth curve. A sardine can is used on wood base, and fine wire is used as a pin point. Scissors and a knife are needed. The two triangles mean the same on each side or mostly one side. Buttermilk dip is used to take shine off a container. Shoe polish and lipstick are used to change the color of a container. The triangle came from Japan and means heaven, earth and man. Height is 1 1/2 times the length of the container. The second height is two-thirds, and the third is one-third of the first one. Shells or little rocks can be used to cover a pin point. Aspirin can be used in water to keep flowers fresh.

A handbook can be obtained from the council, a library being at the Botanic Garden. A beginner will need to buy a book on fundamentals such as scale, harmony and rhythm. Placement means to put the flowers at the correct place. Leaves are pulled off at the top of shrub limbs.

Mrs. Jenkins and Mrs. Casey made arrangements and helped the ladies improve the ones they brought. Beginners were guided to make several arrangements. This program has received the most interest from local ladies of any this year. It is the best and most helpful workshop the club has ever held. The club takes pride in two of its own members being so capable. Their help is deeply appreciated.

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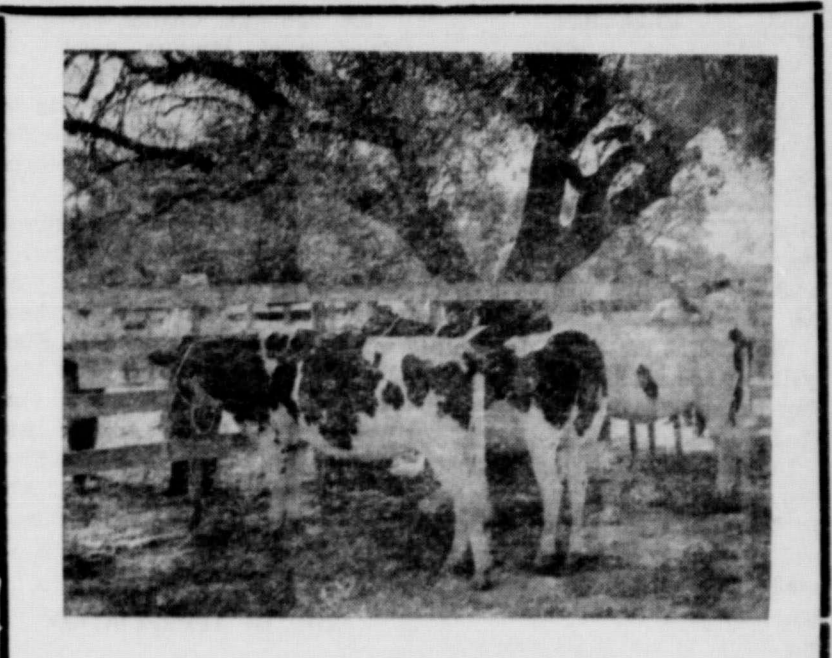

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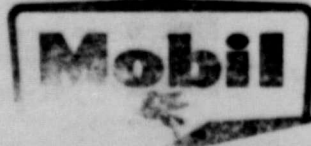

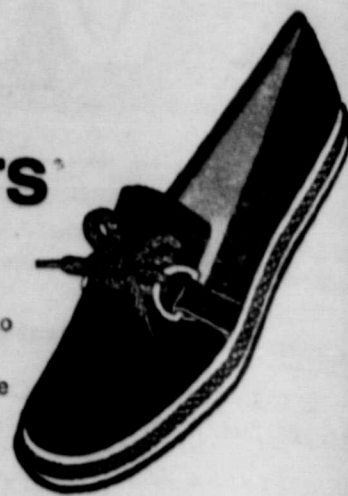
