Social Security Questions & Answers By JACK CALVERT CONTRACTOR OF THE OWNER OF WINTER AND INCOME. Question: I have been drawing Social Security about 8 years. I am over 73 years of age. I took a full time job last year and earned over \$6,000.00 in 1970. Will I lose my Social Security benefits? Answer: No, you will not. There is no earnings restriction for any months after you are age 72. Since you were over age 72 in all months of 1970, there can be no deductions from your Social Security checks. Those who work in the year they become age 72, and earn over \$1680 in the year, could lose some checks because of excess earnings in that year. However, they could only lose checks for months before they became age 72.
