Tornado, Hail Storm Rips Southern Erath County

Damage is Extensive in Wide Area Near Duffau

A devastating hail and wind storm swept down upon southern Erath County late last Wednesday afternoon, leaving in its wake untold thousands of dollars in damages. A tornado dipped down at the J. B. Woodard farm six miles north of Hico, unroofing part of a large turkey house and killing about 600 range-ready turkeys. The funnel made shambles of the west

end of the turkey house, and uprooted and twisted several large trees in the area.

The tornado dipped again at the Ralph Jaggars farm, southeast of the Woodard place, doing extensive damage there.

The hail storm, one of the worst in history in this area, left thousands of dollars in damages in the Duffau area. The community of Duffau was hard hit, and not a home or building was left undamaged. For the most part, roofs were totally destroyed, and paint and windows heavily damaged.

The hail storm cut a peculiar path, as it appeared to have started northwest of Duffau, headed on into the community, then turned and went northeast toward Chalk Mountain. Heaviest hit in the area was that section near Highway 220 where the Alvin Flowers, Mike and Lee Flowers, John B. Fouts, Sam Kash, Dan Robinsons and Raymond Addisons places are located. Homes, barns, trailer houses and anything else in the path of the hail was destroyed or heavily damaged. Windows were smashed by the large stones, and roof tops were made shambles by great chunks of ice.

The hail continued on toward the Jimmie Ramage place in Black Stump Valley, and on toward Walnut Springs where damage was expected to run into the thousands of dollars.

Many many automobiles and pickups were damaged severely by the melting chunks of ice, and some livestock was reported injured.

Elsewhere, high winds raked the Clairette area, taking the roof off the Clairette store and breaking windows at many homes. About 50 feet of a board fence at the Mize Ranch was blown away.

High winds were also noted in the Hico area, but little damage was reported.

Rains which accompanied the turbulent weather measured around three-quarters of inch in Hico, but in one spot near the A. L. Flowers place north of Duffau, a deluge of water fell in a short time, washing fields, fences and roadways. No estimate of rainfall in that area was available, but it was heavy.

Residents of the hard-hit area to the north were busy all weekend replacing broken windows and repairing or re-roofing homes and other buildings.

Survivors include a daughter, Mrs. John L. Stover of Corsicana; a sister, Mrs. W. C. Sellman of Hico; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Loot Stolen From J. B. Pitts Home

Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Pitts of Fort Worth, who own a farm about four miles southwest of Hico and reside there parttime, discovered that their home had been burglarized upon arriving there Saturday.

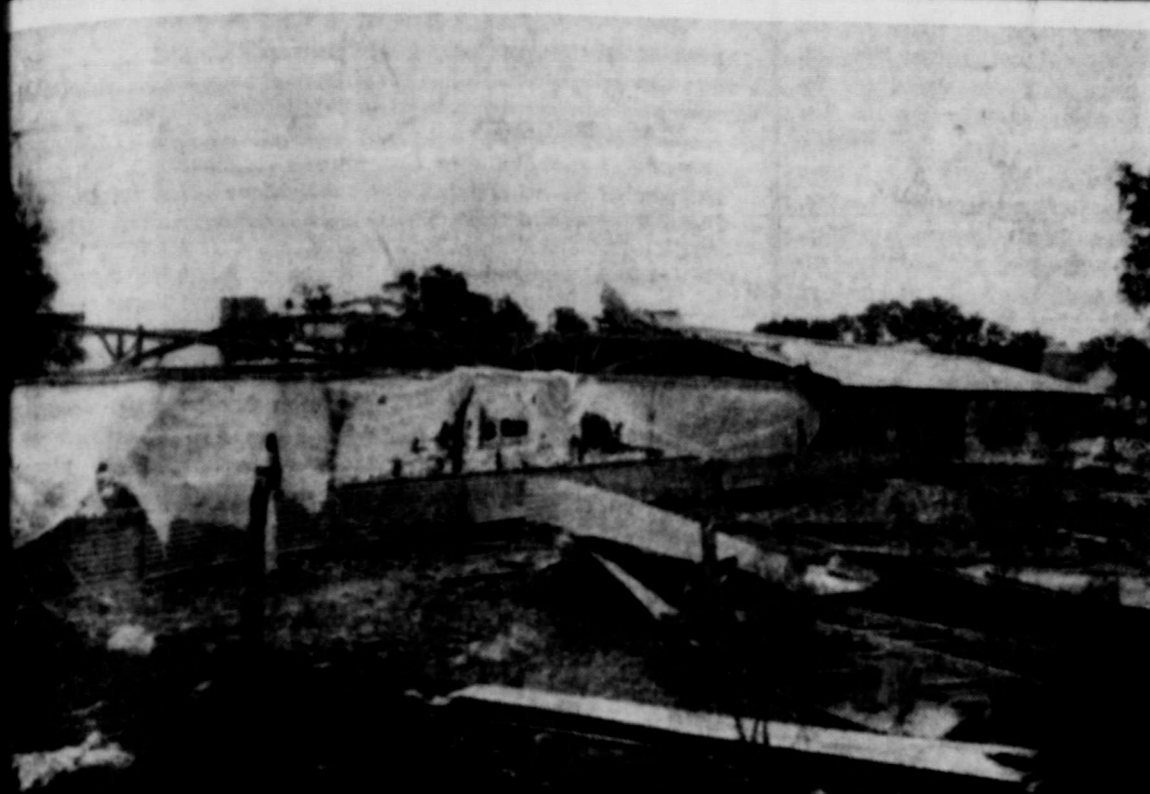

Questions & Answers

Question: I've been hearing that the cost of Medicare has gone up. I'm confused as they still hold the same premium out of my checks. Will it be more?

Answer: Yes, the Medicare premium amount has been increased and officially announced. However, the increase takes place July 1, 1971, so this is still some time off. The new amount will be \$5.60 per month. This is up 30c over the present amount which is \$5.30 per month. Congress is also considering changes in the law which would eliminate the payment of any premium by the individual.

Question: My mother died last month. She had Medicare, but she was not eligible for cash payments because she never worked under social security. Will social security help pay her funeral expenses?

Answer: No. Social Security makes a lump sum death payment only if the deceased person had worked long enough on a job covered by social security.
