Although most social security beneficiaries are older people, about one in every four is under age 60, and one in every eight is under 18. These under age 18 beneficiaries receive benefits because a working father or mother is retired, or disabled, or has died. Nearly all of the beneficiaries between age 18 and up to 22 are getting student benefits under a provision in the social security law that permits the continuation, or resumption, of benefits if the child is attending

school full time. Calvert points out that a relative

Social security disability payments are made to persons who become

disabled for work at any age. As little as one and one-half years of work is required in the case of workers who become disabled before age 24. The amount of work needed increases up to five years out of the last ten years at the time of disability occurs.
