School Opening Set Here August 23rd

Hico Public Schools will open for the 1971-72 term at 9 o'clock Monday morning, August 23. A general assembly will be held at this time in the High School Auditorium. An invitation is extended to parents and friends to attend the program. A full day's schedule of classes will follow the assembly. Lunch will be served the first day, and school will be dismissed at 2:45. Other information pertaining to the school opening was released this week by Supt. O. C. Cook.

Pre-Registration. High School registration will begin at 8 o'clock Friday morning, Aug. 20. The elementary students will register the first day of school.

Birth Certificates. All first grade students are required to have a birth certificate to present on the first day of school as proof of age. School attendance is compulsory through the age of 17.

T.B. Certificates.

All school personnel are required to have a certificate signed by a doctor showing that they have been examined for tuberculosis before Sept. 1. Also students in the first and seventh grades are to be examined for the disease, but they should wait for further notice before having the examination.

Immunization Law. Senate Bill No. 27 of the Texas Education Code is now in effect and requires that all children entering Texas elementary and secondary schools must be immunized against six diseases, namely diphtheria, tetanus, poliomyelitis, measles, rubella and smallpox. The law states that "The State Department of Health will provide the required immunizations in areas where no local provision exists to provide these services."

All students will be allowed to enter their respective school systems during the fall 1971 term, with the provision that their immunizations against at least one of the aforementioned diseases will have been started by January 1, 1972, and all completed as soon as medically feasible. Proof of immunizations or history of the disease will be required for school records.

In-Service Meeting. The Hico faculty will be attending in-service training sessions beginning Monday, Aug. 16, through Friday, Aug. 20.

One vacancy remains to be filled. Mr. Charles Erick resigned to take a position with an insurance company in Brownwood. A complete faculty list will be given next week.

Yeggs Hit School Ag Building

A break-in at the Hico School Agriculture Building sometime last week netted yeggs around \$1,000 in new equipment according to officials and investigating officers.

The robbery was discovered Tuesday afternoon of this week when Ag Teacher Harold Walker entered the building.

Included in the loot taken were two new electric welders, a new acetylene welder, skill saw, wood router, clippers, and numerous small hand tools. Also several electrical control demonstration boards were taken, along with other equipment.

Entry was gained to the building by prying open a door on the east side. Once inside the robbers forced a tool room door open.

Local and county officers were investigating the break-in at mid-week.

Racing Jones Boys Take National Motorcycle Title

J. D. Jones, Jr. and sons, DeWayne, 20, and Gary, 19, of Hacienda Heights, Calif. have just completed a winning circuit of motorcycle racing, competing in Los Angeles, Denver, Houston, Orlando, Florida, Columbia, Ohio, and Long Island, NY.

Concluding the racing circuit, Gary was named number one American racer for Trans-America Motocross Races. Other than Americans, riders participated from England, Germany, Czechoslovakia, Austria and Canada.

The Jones boys, coached by their father, race individually and are sponsored by Yamaha International of Japan, who furnish the motorcycles, pay all expenses and a salary besides their winnings.

After winning in the Orlando event, the boys picked up a \$3,000 check, and a \$6,000 check following the win in New York.

Gary was interviewed on TV in Florida, has appeared in a motion picture, and his picture appears on Yamaha billboards throughout the United States. Jones and his sons

have also appeared on the Wide World of Sports program.

Gary is now qualified for the international finals, which will be held next year in Europe.

The following article was taken from an interview appearing in the Orlando Evening Times:

Don Jones not only teaches, he coaches his sons how to behave. That is, how to behave on a motorcycle.

The boys do not go out and deliberately practice wildness on their wheels but they have been known to skid up and down a few hills, plunge head first into muddy creeks, vault sand dunes and climb mountains. They are not able to leap over high buildings in a single bounce, but the brothers, who look like the two nice guys next door, have done just about everything else superhumanly possible on their motorcycles.

They do anything they must do to win.

Interestingly, Don Jones, a former racer, coaches his sons just as he would any athlete. "I make 'em run, ride and swim," said the coach-father. "I feel if I can get them in shape we can win the series. They've got the superior motorcycles—or as good as the Europeans. Our kids can get out in front and lead the Europeans, but then they get pooped."

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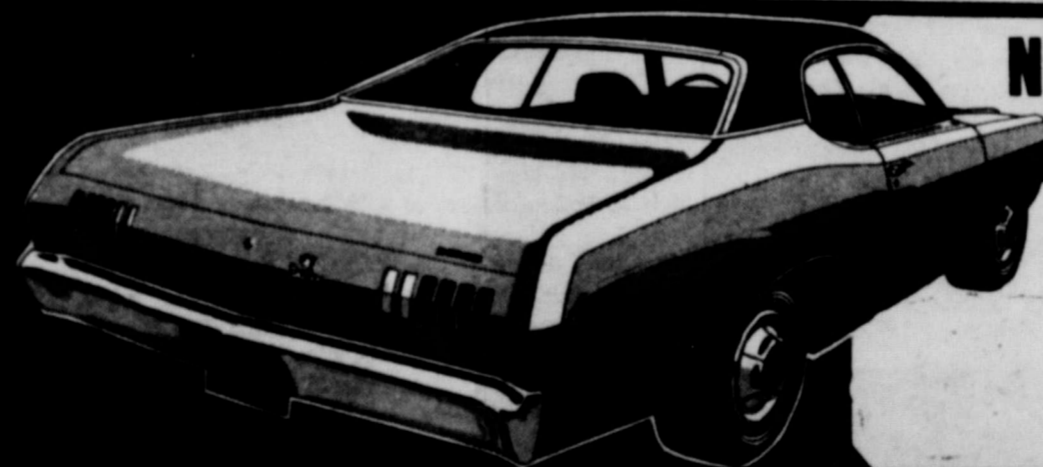


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Fairy Community News

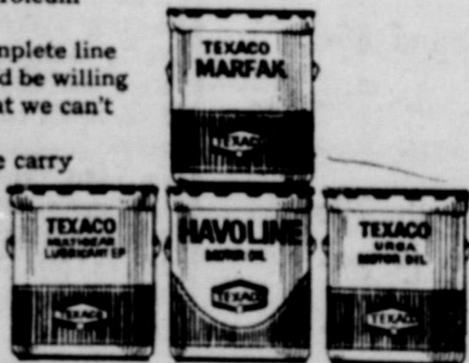

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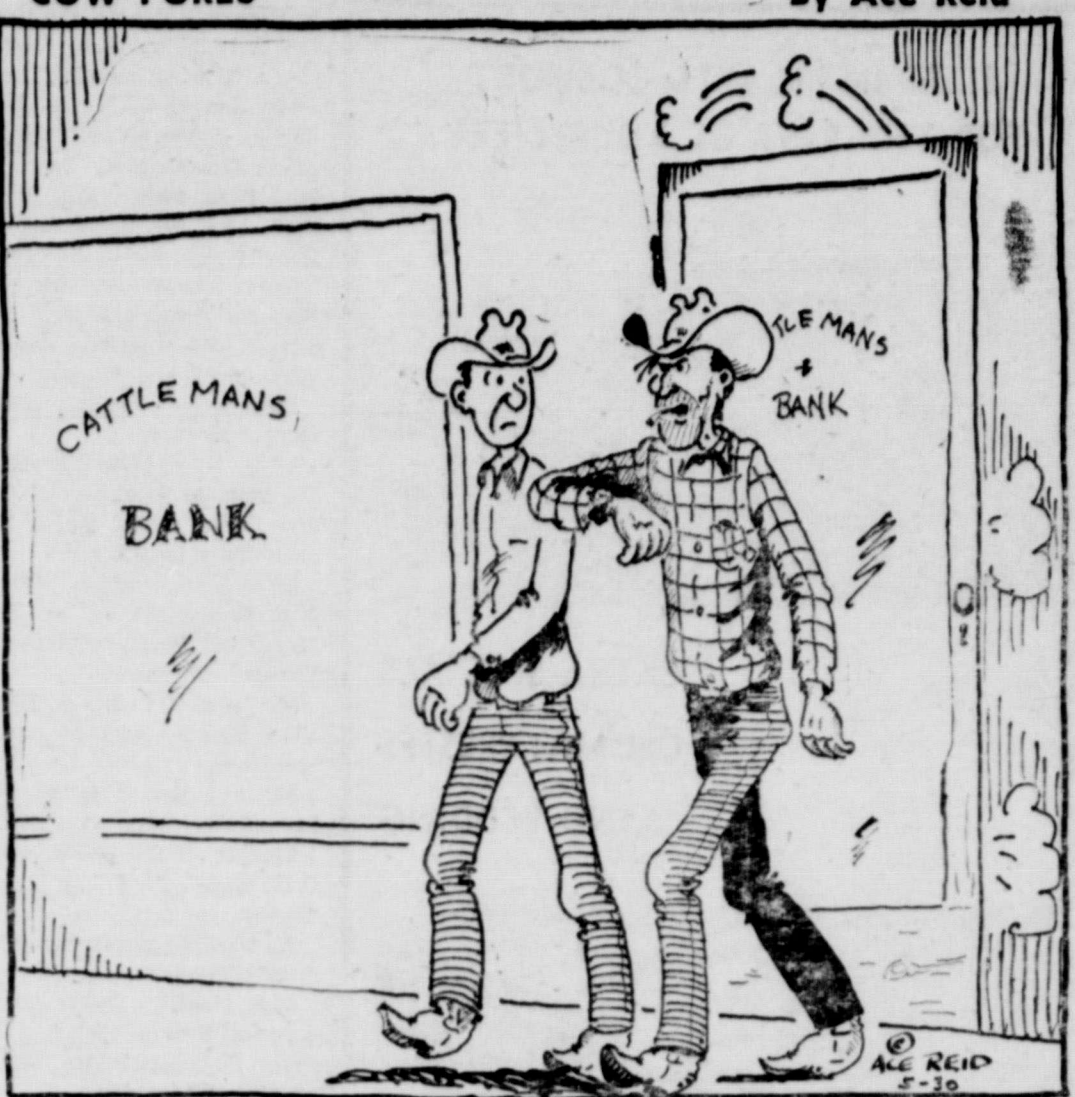

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By BILL McCUTCHEON

Mosquitos are a big problem now and I would urge all homeowners to join the fight against these pests. In addition to being a nuisance they transmit many diseases to humans and animals, including VEE.

Mosquitos can't hatch unless they are in water, so all standing water should be eliminated. Mosquitos frequently breed in commonly overlooked containers such as old tires, tin cans, jars, tubs, bird baths, unused fishponds, evaporative coolers, or even on a flat roof where water accumulates. Such areas should be carefully eliminated. Standing puddles can be treated with household insecticides or a small quantity of kerosene or diesel fuel, but avoid treating animals drinking water or utensils.

I suggest spraying shrubbery, eaves of houses and around windows and doors with malathion to help control hiding mosquitos and prevent them from entering homes. If there are places around your home where mosquitos breed, you may be raising the very mosquito which could bite you or your horse to transmit VEE.

On the Home Range

Sew excitingly for fall, sew with leather. Buckskins, suedes and chamois skins are readily available in a variety of colors. And, great new patterns have been planned for leather sewing.

First, make a trial muslin. Remember leather garments cannot be altered; stitching marks remain when threads are removed. To begin working with the leather, convert each pattern half into a full pattern, then lay the pattern pieces in one direction on the skin underside. Tape pattern pieces to the skin and cut with sharp shears. Necessary markings can be transferred using wax, chalk or ball point pen.

When ready to stitch, hold seams in place with paper clips or cellophane tape. Core spun or silk thread makes a stronger seam. Adjust the machine for 7 to 10 stitches per inch, and loosen the thread tension. Use a size 16 leather needle. Thread ends should be tied, rather than backstitched, to avoid marring the leather. Stay seams to keep the leather from stretching. Open seams, apply rubber cement to the underside and pound the seams flat with wooden mallet.

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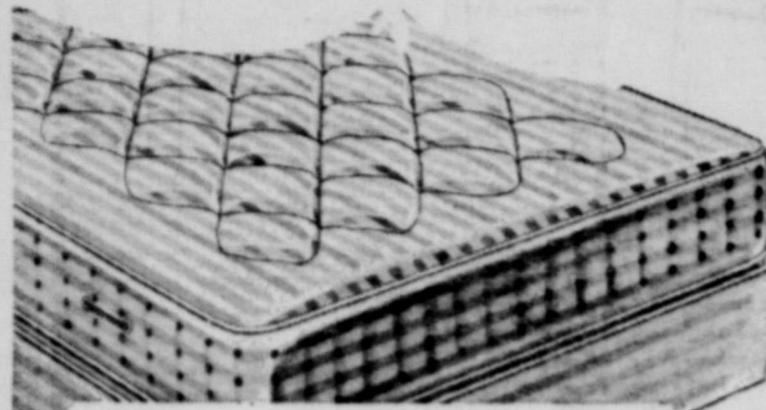

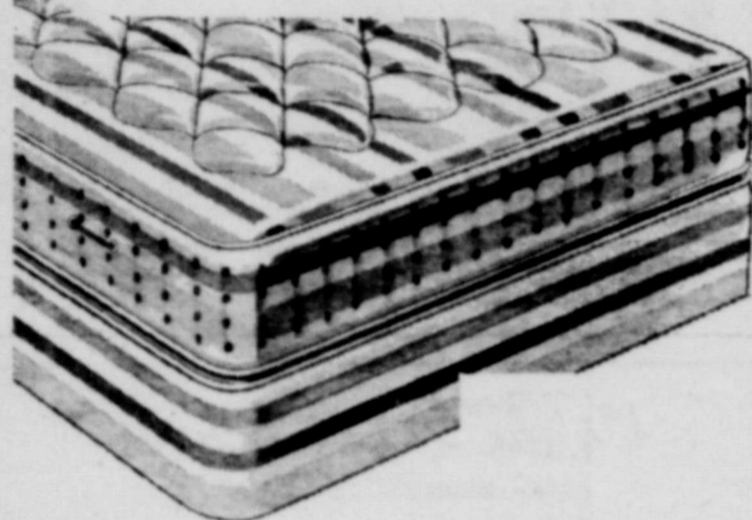
