Free or Reduced Price Lunches The school has announced the continuation of a free or reduced price lunch policy for the Hico children unable to pay full price. Local school officials have adopted the scale as recommended by the State. Families falling within these scales are those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships and may apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children, They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home to each parent. Additional copies are available at the Superintendent's office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need, based on the income and number of persons in th family, and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Under provisions of the policy, the Superintendent and Principals of the school will review applica-

tions and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling, he may request for a hearing to appeal the decision. The Board of Trustees has been designated as the hearing officials. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy. The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. A complete copy of the policy is on file in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested person. Faculty Members.
