School Bells Will Ring Monday

Faculty Complete, Large Enrollment Expected

Parents and friends are extended a special invitation to attend opening exercises of Hico Public Schools Monday morning, August 23 in the auditorium at 9 o'clock. After the general assembly students will complete registration and classes will be held until 2:45 p.m. Lunch will be served the first day.

School Plant Ready.

Personnel at the school have been busy getting buildings and grounds ready for the Monday opening. Clean-up and paint jobs have been in progress most of the summer. Some rooms have received a new coat of paint, and blinds and windows have been cleaned. The home-making building has also been repainted and repair was made on windows and screens. Floors in all buildings have been cleaned, waxed and polished. Playground equipment at the elementary building has a fresh coat of paint.

Pre-Registration.

High School registration will begin at 8 o'clock Friday morning, Aug. 20. The elementary students will register the first day of school.

New Students

Many new students are expected to be enrolled. Most of the Three Way High School students have transferred to Hico, and the school welcomes them.

School Annuals.

The new annuals will be issued Friday morning, Aug. 20. There are a few extra copies to be sold on a first come, first served basis. Students should bring their receipts with them.

Buses.

The buses will make their regular runs Monday. Drivers include Eugene Smith, head bus mechanic, Cecil Caraway, Charles Lively, Phil Thomas, Robert Seaton and Jon Bonner.

Lunch Prices.

Lunch prices will remain the same as last year. For grades one through five, 35c, grades six thru 12 40c, adults 45c. The price of extra milk will be 5c.

As the lunch room was breaking even at the close of the last school term, the school board felt they would not increase prices for lunches at this time. Officials stressed the importance of all students eating in the lunch room if possible for it is only through volume that the school will be able to maintain these prices. The lunch policy followed in previous years will be observed, that is, a student may eat in the lunch room, bring his lunch, or go home for lunch.

Students will be allowed to charge lunches only on a weekly basis. Parents are asked to make arrangements with the Superintendent's office to charge for longer periods than one week.

Free or Reduced Price Lunches

The school has announced the continuation of a free or reduced price lunch policy for the Hico children unable to pay full price. Local school officials have adopted the scale as recommended by the State. Families falling within these scales are those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships and may apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home to each parent. Additional copies are available at the Superintendent's office. Applications may be submitted any time during the school year. The form is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need, based on the income and number of persons in the family, and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under provisions of the policy, the Superintendent and Principals of the school will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling, he may request for a hearing to appeal the decision. The Board of Trustees has been designated as the hearing officials. Hearing procedures are outlined in the policy.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification of or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch. A complete copy of the policy is on file in the office of the Superintendent where it may be reviewed by any interested person.

'Lost Generation' Will Be Shown Here at First Baptist Church

"Lost Generation," the latest release from World Wide Pictures, will be shown Saturday, August 28, at First Baptist Church.

Filed in Eastmancolor, "Lost Generation" utilizes multiple screen images and a probing documentary style to investigate attitudes on dissent, violence, the mood of America, and the answers that can be found by this generation as they face the decisions of life. The opinions of both young and old, urban and rural, rich and poor, are brought to the screen as the camera focuses on people of various backgrounds throughout the nation. Location shots were filmed in Alaska, the Southern states, on the farms and in the small towns of mid-America, and in the dying Haight-Ashbury hippie district of San Francisco.

The feature-length film, which includes special appearances by Billy Graham, Art Linkletter, and Jack Webb, was described by one reviewer as a "moving film that calls on us to make a decision about how much we want to get involved in the troubles of our times. It is a relevant story that demands our immediate attention."

"Lost Generation" will be shown only once, at 8 p.m., with no admission, and the public is invited.

(ED NOTE: The following column will appear periodically as a means of informing—not harassing—local residents on new points of law, etc. It is intended to be both informative and helpful in advising of changes that are constantly being put into effect.)

"Do you know where your children are?" That question comes in loud and clear before the ten o'clock news each evening. It is a very good question, indeed.

School will start before you know it (Monday to be exact). That means you will know where your children attending school are. And they will be in very good hands. But let me remind you that when they are on the school bus they must be protected not only by the driver but all you folks driving your cars, pickups, trucks, etc.

When the school bus stops to pick up or let children out, whether coming or going, you STOP. We mean STOP! It won't take but a minute. Nobody, but nobody, is or should be in that big a hurry that they can't be concerned about their neighbor's own children.

A strong reminder for those who don't stop—there will be a \$40.00 fine plus \$2.50 State Tax. There will be no exceptions! We cannot have a Police Officer on duty all of the time checking whether you are observing this law or not. So the bus driver, or you as a concerned parent, can get the license plate number of a violator, and file a signed complaint against the offender in your Justice of the Peace Court. We will take it up from there.

Help promote and work for the safety for your children and grandchildren as they come and go to school.

There will be more on this subject later on.

High School Drop-Out Completes Degree Work

Hico AFB, Texas (Spl.)—There is a distance between a high school drop-out and a college degree, but this gap was bridged last year when Major Dennis E. Wooton of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Wooton of Dublin, formerly of Hico, received his master's degree in education from Our Lady of the Lake in San Antonio.

Major Wooton began his part-time studies at the college in 1970, and burned the midnight oil through the 1971 second semester which culminated in the award of his degree.

Major Wooton completed 36 semester hours in 18 months, doubling up on even-odd classes, and carrying a full load of Saturday morning sessions.

"It was a long trek," said the Major, "but it was well worth the effort."

Major Wooton, assigned duties as

director of material with the USAF Security Service's 6960th Support Group at Kelly AFB, attended Tolar High School, but "dropped out" in the tenth grade. He enlisted in the Army in 1953, and shortly after took his general educational development (GED) examinations and obtained his high school diploma with the 1953 graduating class of Tolar High.

When he had completed his three year tour with the Army he enrolled at Texas A&M, and received his bachelor's degree in industrial education in 1956.

Joining the USAF in 1960, he was commissioned a second lieutenant, and assigned to Chanute AFB, Ill. for duty as a supply officer. A re-

mote tour at Shemya AS, Alaska, followed. Major Wooton then was assigned to the USAF Security Service in mid-1963, serving as base equipment management officer at Goodfellow AFB, San Angelo.

An overseas tour with the 6957th Security Group, Shu Linkou AS, Formosa, preceded his present assignment. An assignment with the 6917th Security Group San Vito dei Normanni, Italy, is the next overseas site for the native Texan. He and his family will be moving in January.

Major Wooton is a brother of Mrs. Jerry Stringer of Hico.

Question: My 67-year-old husband recently had surgery for a slipped disc. He will soon be able to come home, but the doctor says he will need to use a wheel chair. Will

Medicare help pay for the wheel chair?

Answer: Yes. The medical insurance part of Medicare does help pay for the rental or purchase of such durable medical equipment as a wheel chair, when the equipment is prescribed by a doctor. Whether

your husband decides to purchase or rent the equipment, Medicare generally makes monthly payments and these payments are 80 percent of the reasonable rental charges.
