Influenza Threat Seen By Health Officials

State Public Health officials have issued warnings of the most real threat of an Asian influenza outbreak in several years, according to City Health Officer Dr. B. C. Dayton. Dr. Dayton has suggested that people with chronic illnesses such as diabetes, heart condition, etc., and those people who are associated with mass gatherings, such as school teachers, should take influenza vaccine before October. The Health Department said that the expected outbreak could be the most severe ever, and urged everyone to take every precautionary measure to ward off the disease.

Hicoans Among Dairymen Attending Chicago Confab

While thousands of Chicagoans were exiting the city last weekend for the last three-day holiday of the summer season, approximately 40,000 representatives of the Associated Milk Producers, Inc. took over Chicago in a record-setting annual meeting Friday to Sunday, Sept. 3-5. Among this group were around 40 Hicoans. The 118 air charter flights engaged in bringing the AMPI members was the largest civilian air armada in the nation's history, according to a spokesman for Eastern Airlines who had the bulk of the flights. Hico dairymen and their families went by bus to the air terminals, some to San Antonio and others to Dallas. Once in Chicago, those attending moved from their hotels to and from McCormick Place, the convention center, by charter bus. President Richard Nixon was the foremost distinguished speaker at the meeting when he spoke to 25,000 persons at a banquet Friday night. The banquet was followed by a general session. The Saturday morning breakfast was held at 15 different hotels, and featured 20 Senators and Representatives as speakers. A business session followed the breakfast at McCormick Place, where Paul Harvey, TV news commentator, spoke. Saturday afternoon was spent with the group involving themselves in various kinds of entertainment. Some took boat rides, some bus tours, others went shopping, and horse races proved exciting for still others. No planned entertainment was provided for the families Saturday evening, but needless to say the Convention City was wearing its biggest "host" hat and activities were everywhere for the group to enjoy. Sundry morning found the dairy people packing their bags, boarding the buses back to the air terminals and then back to their farms and ranches, all reporting a wonderful trip.
