and Friday. The days in between will allow the local business time to process forms from the previous days.

Mr. Howard also said that his firm would continue to take emergency prescriptions, day or night, as has been the policy in the past.

The local druggist said that while efforts were being made to cut down on some of the paper work involved, about 30 minutes (per prescription) was required to handle a single prescription. Howard said that about 30 percent of his daily prescriptions were of the vendor type, which required one person fulltime to handle the paper work.

Sept. 23: DTP and Td, or first polio vaccine.

Oct. 21: Second shot of DTP or Td, and vaccines for rubella and rubeola (measles).

Nov. 18: Third DPT or Td and second polio. Also any other shots missed on previous dates.

The Health Department official and Dr. B. C. Dayton will be in charge of the local phase of the program.




