Pollution is 'Old Hat' For Bosque Watershed Group

Pollution and other environmental items, as such, were headlines of the daily news to the people in the Upper Bosque River Watershed were work together to solve the problems by frequent flooding of the land South Forks of, and the River.

People in the watershed were facing heavy losses due to flood water. About \$233,000 of damages occurred each year. The annual losses to agriculture amounted to \$148,926, about \$28,450 to non-agriculture. The average dollar damaged by sediment was \$13,220, due to erosion was \$19,920, and losses amounted to \$22,889, approximately \$10,031 in damages occurred to roads, bridges and structures, and \$17,240 damages to properties. Indirect damages as interruption of both bus and rail traffic, losses sustained by businesses in the area, and relocation of persons and work, re-routing of bus and mail routes, and losses averaged about \$22,000 annually.

The people in the watershed either directly or indirectly, affected and many public meetings were held to develop solutions to the flooding problem. Strong interest evolved from meetings, and a Work Plan for the Upper Bosque Watershed was developed. This watershed work agreement between the Soil Conservation Districts; Bosque Water Control and Floodment District; and the Commissioners Courts of Hamilton, Erath and Stephens counties was signed in 1963.

of Stephenville and Hico are involved. Construction work was started in 1964, and to date over four million yards of soil have been moved. With this soil movement, 25 lakes covering 747 surface acres has been created, providing floodwater storage for over 45 thousand acre feet of water and sediment storage of about 10 thousand acre feet.

In addition to reducing flood hazards and trapping the big polluter, "sediment," the lakes are providing additional recreational and wildlife areas, water for livestock and for irrigated grasses. The land treatment measures applied on approximately 226 thousand acres of land is reducing sediment and controlling the erosion. When the Upper Bosque River Watershed Work Plan is complete, it is anticipated that the average annual dollar losses will be reduced to about \$34,503. Better living conditions and a sense of security are additional benefits to be derived from the program.

The individual landowners and operators have applied the land treatment measures with technical assistance provided by personnel of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the three Soil and Water Districts. Many of the landowners and operators received cost-share as-

sistance on the applied practices made available through the Agricultural Conservation Act (See "Watershed" Page 8)

ANTLERLESS DEER PERMIT ISSUANCE DATES RELEASED

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department has announced dates, times and locations for distribution of antlerless deer permits and special tags for either-sex deer hunting in the Possum Kingdom Regulatory District.

Permits will be issued for the portion of Hamilton County which lies east of Farm Road 1902, from the Erath County line on the north to Jonesboro on the south. Permits will be issued at the ratio of one for each 200 acres. The antlerless area is the same as past years.

Dates for issuance of the special permits in three immediate counties around Hico are:

Hamilton County, Tuesday, October 26, Courthouse.
Erath County, Wednesday and Thursday, Oct. 27 and 28, Stephenville Courthouse.

Bosque County, Nov. 3, 4 and 5, Courthouse, Meridian.

Landowners or their agents are asked to be present to receive their permits at these designated times.

Grid Classic Here Friday

Meridian Yellowjackets, defending district and bi-district champions, invades Tiger Stadium Friday night for what should be the grid classic of the year in this area.

Hico is rolling along undefeated, and the Jackets sport a respectable 4-2 record for the year, losing only to powers Crawford and Valley Mills.

Meridian downed the Tigers last year by a 20-0 count in a game that was supposed to be close, and the Jackets went on to stay undefeated in district play, won their bi-district game, and were barely defeated in regional action. Needless to say, the Jackets have their goal set to repeat as champions and advance into the playoffs.

The Tigers are expected to be at full strength for the first time since the Dublin game,

with both Galen Lindsey and Lee Ramage well again. Brian Jones, starting center for the Tigers, is expected to suit up for the first time since the season opener, and other members of the team are reportedly well and able.

Meridian will field the largest team that the locals have faced since the Dublin game, and can be expected to give an all-out effort in the district opener for both teams.

For the year, Meridian has won over Godley 36-0, Grandview 12-0, lost to Crawford 27-6, downed Abbott 28-0, lost to Valley Mills 33-6, and won their last outing 6-0 over Dawson.

Hico defeated Glen Rose 19-12, Dublin 12-0, Godley 28-6, Grandview 33-12, Rising Star 7-6, and Stephenville JV 34-18. Game time Friday is 7:30.

Former Hico Teacher, Mrs. Timmerman, Dies In Auto Accident

Mrs. Rose Timmerman, 56, of near Fairy, was injured fatally about 7:55 a.m. Tuesday in a three-vehicle accident about eight miles north of Hamilton on U.S. Highway 281 during a heavy rain-storm.

Mrs. Timmerman was dead on arrival at Hamilton General Hospital.

Mrs. Timmerman was a teacher at Gatesville, and formerly taught in the Hico schools.

Highway patrolman R. W. Green said her auto and a stock trailer being towed by a pickup collided, then veered into the path of a tractor-trailer.

She is survived by her husband, Lester Timmerman, and many other relatives.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday at Riley Funeral Chapel in Hamilton, with burial in Oakwood Cemetery.

Tigers Prep For District Opener With 34-18 Victory

Hico spotted the Stephenville Junior Varsity six points last Thursday night and then came roaring back behind the two and three-touchdown performances by Danny Polk and Galen Christian to post a 34-18 win. The Tigers built a 28-6 halftime lead, stretched the margin to 34-6 early in the fourth quarter, and then gave up two counters to the visitors in the final stanza to win their sixth game in succession.

A Tiger fumble on the first play of the game gave Stephenville excellent field position at the Hico 15, and they used six plays to post a short-lived 6-0 lead.

Hico stormed back on their third possession, going 50 yards in five plays for the first marker. Galen Christian scored the TD, racing 35 yards on an end-around play. The TD was Christian's first of three for the night. Galen Lindsey kicked the extra point and the Tigers were off and running.

Danny Polk got into the act on the Tigers' next possession, sprinting 44 yards to the end zone on the

second play of the series. Again Lindsey's kick was true, upping the margin to 14-6.

Sen. Word---Man Without a Home

J. P. Word of Meridian, who has represented the 12th Senatorial District in Austin since 1962, found himself without a home last week after Senate re-districting placed Bosque County in a district that runs from that county to the Oklahoma State line on the north, and which would force Word to seek re-election against Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells.

However, Word said that he didn't know right now whether he would run or not.

Word's new district is made up of the following counties: Montague, Cooke, Young, Jack, Wise, Decatur, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Parker, Eastland, Erath, Hood, Johnson, Comanche, Bosque and Hill.

The new district which encompasses several of the counties previously served by Senator Word,

Voter Registration Underway

Mrs. Pearl B. Williams, County Tax Assessor-Collector, said this week that residents were returning voter registration applications to her office incorrectly filled out, or they had failed to sign them.

Registration forms were sent to taxpayers with the current statements, but Mrs. Williams said that errors in completing the forms were delaying issuing the permanent registration certificate.

She urged that all persons completing the forms to be sure and sign them in the proper place. If a person is registering for himself

or another family member who is over 21 years of age, they should sign the form on the far right hand space provided for the signature. If they are completing a registration form for an under-21 year of age person, then they should sign the form in both the center and far right hand spaces.

A new year-round voter registration law went into effect for Texans on Oct. 1.

The major provisions in the new law are noted:

Voters can register at any time (except for a temporary cutoff 31

days before each election.) Registration is good for three years, and is automatically renewed by participation in an election during that period. The old registration period was Oct. 1-January 31.

Eighteen to 21-year olds may register and are eligible to vote in local, state and federal elections under a new constitutional amendment.

Voters must have resided in the state a year and in a county for six months to qualify for local election participation.



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

Questions & Answers

Question: When a girl marries, does she need to get a new social security card?
Answer: Yes. Her name changes and her employer must report wages under the name and number of her card. Therefore, she should get a new card that will show her new name, even though the number will remain the same.

Question: I only employ two people on my farm. Am I required to report their earnings under social security?
Answer: This depends. If you pay an employee as much as \$150 or if he works on any part of 20 days on a time basis during a calendar year you are required to report his earnings to Internal Revenue. This is true regardless of the number of employees you have.



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

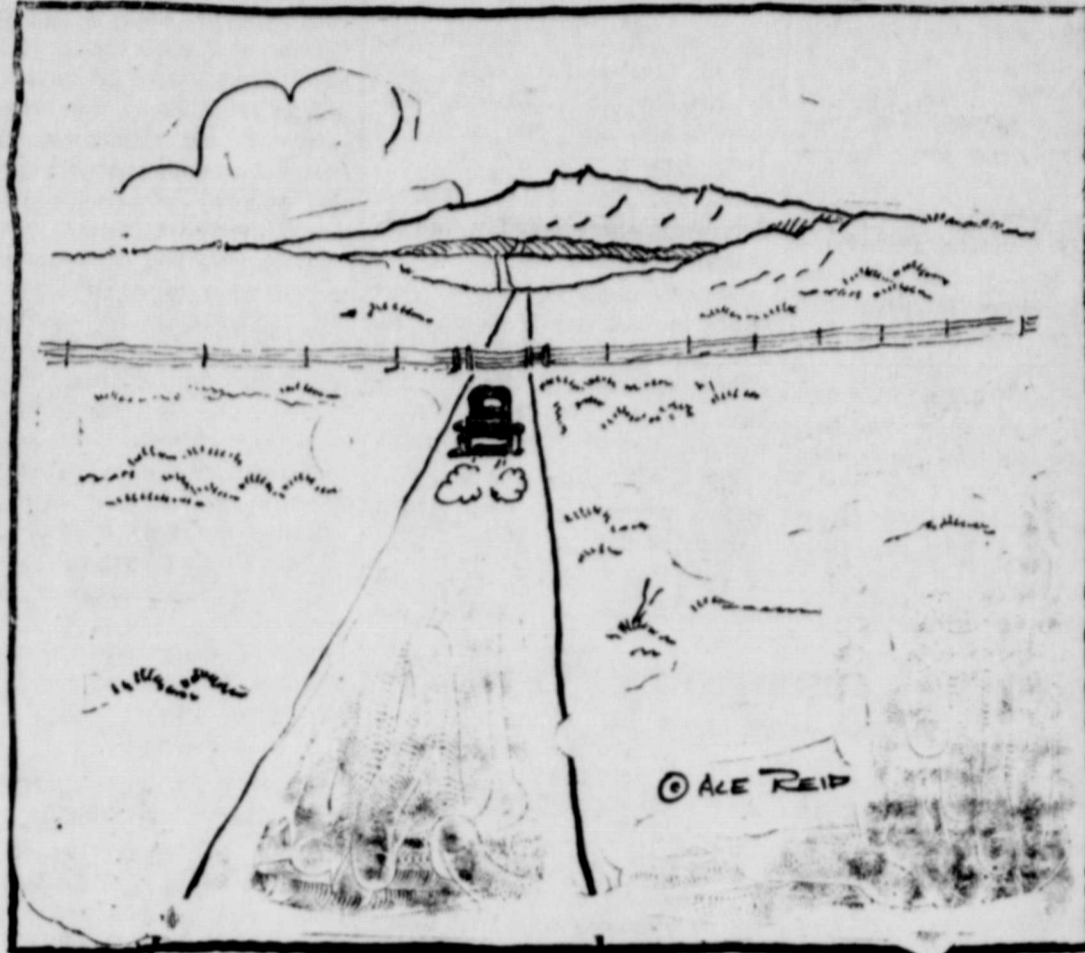

cultural Conservation Program, Rural Environmental Assistance Program, the Great Plains Conservation Program, and applicable soil and water conservation loans made available from the Farm and Home Administration and other lending agencies.

Each of the three Commissioners Courts and the North Bosque Water Control and Improvement District have worked with individuals and groups in obtaining the necessary easements and right-of-ways. Each year the commissioners, in conjunction with SCS personnel and directors of the Water District, make an inspection of each dam to see that proper management is being carried out and that the structure is functioning as planned. Further, directors of the respective Soil and Water Conservation Districts have encouraged farmers and ranchers to become district cooperators and apply needed soil and water conservation practices on their land.

The Extension Service has assisted with the educational phase of the program. The local civic organizations and many others have cooperated and worked together in solving the problem.

Fall brings many things, and one of these is heavy infestation of lice on cattle. Hamilton County farmers and ranchers should not wait until their cattle are heavily infested before spraying.

Treating cattle for lice now is effective because of mild weather, shorter hair on cattle and smaller lice population. The low population found now is the source of this winter's population.

Louse control should not be put off until cattle are infested. By winter the cattle have suffered greatly, and a heavy population of lice is more difficult to control than a light one.

The key point in effective lice control is to make thorough applications. If one animal or even a part of an animal is not treated, the lice could be a source of re-infestation for the herd.

Dipping is the most thorough way to treat cattle, but sprays are effective if applied with special attention to the brisket and flanks. The entire body should be wet to the skin. High water pressure and a course stream is best for penetrating the hair. Spray at close range and treat only a few cattle at a time.

Before buying insecticide for spraying cattle, read the label on the container completely. Pay particular attention to warnings and restrictions listed on the label and check on waiting periods, especially if cattle may go to slaughter.

There are many insecticides suitable for louse control.
