

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

### Social Security

Questions & Answers By CHARLES E. BASS

Question: I received social se curity checks until I became 18. If I return to school in September, can I receive benefits again on the record of my deceased father?

Answer: If you are under age 22, unmarried and a full-time student in an approved school, you would again be eligible to receive student benefits. You will need to file a new application.

Question: I receive monthly social security survivors benefits for my daughter who was just 16. She is planning to get married. Will she continue to get benefits until she's 18 even after she gets mar-

Answer: No. Her monthly social security benefits will stop the month before she marries. should notify the social security administration as soon as you know the exact date of her marriage.

Question: I am a single woman in my late thirties. As the result of an accident, I have been severely disabled since I was 10 and have never worked under social security. My father, who was my sole support died recently. Can I collect monthly social security benefits as his dependent?

Answer: Since you were disabled before 18 and have been unable to work since that time, you might be eligible to get monthly survivors benefits. Call any social security office as soon as possible.

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
