## City Council Approves 'Mini' Media For Main Street

Hico Council members authorized Mayor O. L. Davis to proceed with plans to re-do Main Street with a "mini-center media" at their regular meeting Monday night, and the Mayor said that he would start the program to coincide with one that his company (Community Public Service) had planned to replace most of the existing lighting facilities with the modern vapor lights.

Instead of the first proposed plan of doing away with all parking in the center of Main, council members came up with a proposal that will see six small media strips placed down the center of Main, three to each block, with steel

double standard light fixtures placed in the center. The latest proposal will eliminate about two existing parking spaces.

In other business at the Monday meeting, Robert C. Kyle, representing the architect-engineering firm of B. L. Nelson and Associates, met with the council pertaining to their proposal to drill and equip an additional water well in the east part of town. Council members spent more than an hour in discussion of the program.

The council also discussed the city-owned lots on former railroad right-of-way; the remodeling program planned for the building next to City Hall, to house an attorney's office, one for the Justice of the Peace, and one for the night-watchman. The governing body is still securing figures and cost estimates.

City Secretary Bess Lackey informed the council members that less than \$1,200 remained on the unpaid tax roll, which is considerably less than last year at a comparable date.

Annual City Election was also ordered, to be held Saturday, April 1. Terms of Mayor Davis and Aldermen Ray Keller, W. C. Howard, and Roy Bates expire this year.

Final order of business was discussion of a use fee for the recently completed Community Center, and who had to pay for the use and who didn't. The council recommended a \$15 fee, with \$5 to be refunded when the Center was cleaned and left in an orderly fashion.

With no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

## Jerry Donaldson Submits Statement in Representative Race

To the people of District 34: I am taking this method of formally announcing my candidacy for state representative in District 34 in the May 6 Democratic Primary, having officially filed for the office with the Democratic chairmen in Hamilton, Bosque, Hill and Coryell counties.

At the outset, I want you to know that I am basing my campaign on dedication to integrity in public office and a belief in sound, responsible state government.

I realize that many issues and problems will confront the Texas Legislature in its next session, but I believe there are sensible solutions for all these problems. These solutions must be sought with resolute vigor and determination.

Among Texas' major needs, as I view them, are welfare reform, adoption of a revised penal code embodying necessary changes in the proposals presented at the last session of the legislature, and adoption of a strong, definite and effective ethics bill governing all state officials.

While the federal courts have decreed that our present system of ad valorem taxation to finance our

## House Candidate Webb Withdraws

Troy (Bud) Webb announced last week that he would not be a candidate for State Representative, District 34. In making the announcement, he issued the following statement:

"When I recently entered the race for the House of Representatives I did so out of a deeply held belief that Texas has reached a crisis in state government and that new and dedicated people would be required to meet this crisis. I felt that my education and experience would be an asset in doing what had to be done to reverse the situation in the House of Representatives.

"Before a person can be of service he must first be elected. I was aware that I would be running at a disadvantage because, although a legal resident, I had not lived in the district in four years. After having been back in the district and analyzing the situation, I have

determined that the obstacles to my election are too great. One of my opponents, the incumbent, is from the same county as I, and we would be attempting to draw initial support from the same people. My other opponent—well liked and well organized throughout a large portion of the district—would be running without opposition from within his home county, the largest in the district. Both of my opponents would be well financed.

"To overcome these obstacles would be extremely difficult and require financing which has not developed. Further, the time and effort would require that I terminate my association with the Lyndon B. Johnson School of Public Affairs which I feel I cannot afford to do. I am therefore declining to file for election. I want to thank all of my friends who have offered their advice, help and support."

"All human beings crave security," stated Mrs. Joe Gregg, faculty member at Hilltop, Gatesville State School for Boys, Born and reared in Hico. Mrs. Gregg told the story of her four years of teaching at the correctional institution during the February meeting of the Hico Parent-Teacher Association.

Reminding her audience that most people in Hico think a great

deal alike, she quickly pointed out that Hicoans were unaware of the other side of life—the side of life she works with daily.

Mrs. Gregg, the former Barbara Randalls and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. H. Randalls, Jr., was introduced by Principal Jimmie L. Ramage. She is a 1963 graduate of Hico High School and was graduated in 1967 from Tarleton State College. Mrs. Gregg's husband, Joe is also a member of State School Staff. They are parents of one son, Brock, age five.

"You do what you know" continued Mrs. Gregg. "When you live in a world of hate, filth, racial prejudice (See P-TA Meet on Page 4)

## Evant Takes Pair of Games From Locals To End Cage Season

Hico round ballers "hung 'em up" Friday night after absorbing two defeats from the Evant Elks.

The visitors took both games, downing the girls 51-50 on a controversial call, and making the boys play catch-up all through the game to defeat the locals 85-72 in a high scoring affair.

In the girls game, Hico led most of the way, but a late splurge by the Elkettes narrowed the margin, and with five seconds remaining on the clock, Evant hit for two points to send them out front by the final count.

The controversy came when the Tigertettes took the ball with the five seconds remaining and hit for two points, only to have the basket nullified. Officials ruled that time had run out.

In the boys game, Evant outscored the locals in every quarter to cop the district championship with an unblemished 8-0 record. The loss dropped Hico to second place with a 6-2 record, both losses coming at the hands of the Elks.

Evant went out front 25-15 in the first quarter, stretched the margin to 46-32 at the half, were ahead 67-50 at the three-quarter mark, and made the final count read 85-72.

Hico's Benny Baley was high scorer in the game, pumping in 33 points. He was followed by Galen Lindsey with 16, Buddy Mayfield with 9, Danny Polk with 8, and Lee Ramage and J. D. Roberts with two points each.

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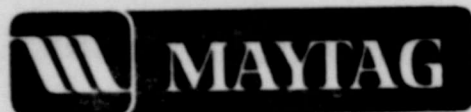
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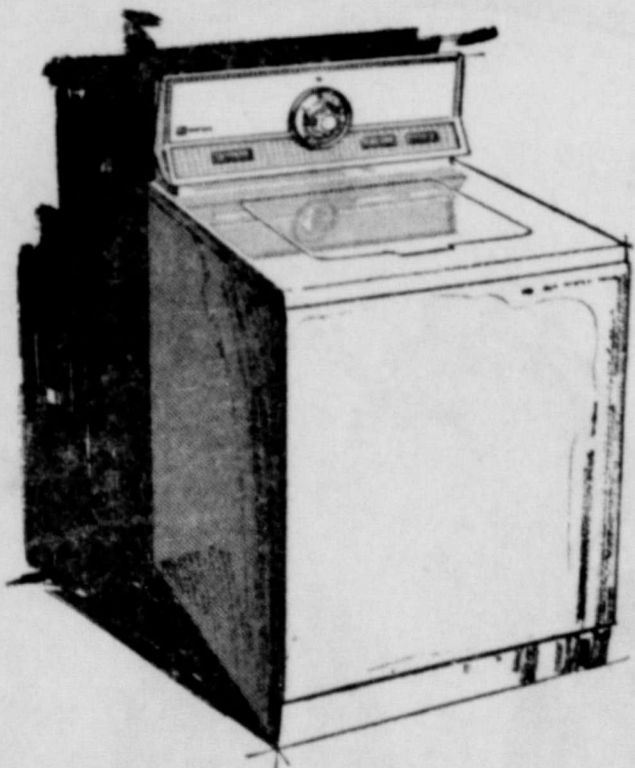
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**Fairy Community News**

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Eliminate costly rats and mice from your premises during the winter when biological conditions make a control program more effective.

The reproductive rate of rats is slower in winter, and a shortage of food makes them more likely

to take bait. Starving rats also die from diseases and hungry predators prey on them during colder periods. Cold weather drives rats indoors.

Every rat getting room and board on farms and in homes throughout the state is eating valuable food and causing damage. Rats also carry dangerous diseases which may infect both animals and man.

The primary species of harmful rats and mice in the state are the Norway rat, Alexandrian rat and the house mouse.

To permanently remove the threat of rats and mice from buildings, remove their food, shelter and water.

The rat's sources of food are spilled grain, livestock feed and pet food. Grain and feed sacks should be placed at least six inches off the floor to discourage rats from

nesting in them. Keep garbage and refuse in tightly covered metal containers. All food stored should be kept in rat proof buildings, rooms or containers.

Rats and mice seek shelter in implement storage areas and places that have dense weed growth. They like wood and trash piles and old sheds that aren't used often. Such places should be either cleaned or destroyed. Buildings that are used for storage of feed or grain should be rat-proofed by sealing all entrances except doors and windows with hardware cloth or metal flashing.

Fix any leaky faucets and other sources of water around grain storage areas. Eliminating the habitat is a good start in a rodent eradication program. However, bait stations should also be set up in all areas where rats are likely to roam. Baiting is only effective if most other sources of food have been eliminated and bait stations are continually supplied with bait.

There are three important steps to keep in mind if you have a rat and mouse problem. Control the food, water and shelter. Follow these steps and you will have the upper hand in the situation.
