In high school, Coach Utley was a four-sport letterman, captain and outstanding athlete at Cabot. He played college ball at Ouachita State in Arkansas, where he was a three-sport letterman, captaining the football and basketball teams. Coach Utley has been very active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and attends many summer services which involves outstanding personalities and athletes throughout the U.S.
