Livestock and Homemaking Shows Scheduled Friday

The Homemaking Division of the Hico Annual Livestock Show promises to provide a variety of displays of talent and skills as the 5th Annual Show gets underway Friday, March 17, in the Hico Community Center. Art-handwork and foods exhibits will be open for public viewing after completion of the judging Friday morning. Clothing entries will be featured in a style show Friday afternoon at 3 o'clock in the high school auditorium.

Entries totaled 350 the first of the week, with girls participating from Stephenville, Lingleville, Huckabay, Dublin, Hamilton, Evant, Iredell, Walnut Springs and Hico. Chairman of the local event is Mrs. Marilyn Johanson, homemaking teacher.

First Phase of 'Shot' Program is Sunday

Hico Civic Club will launch an all-out Immunization Campaign for whooping cough, tetanus, measles, rubella, polio and diphtheria. First phase of the program will be Sunday, March 19 at the Community Center from 1 to 3 p.m. Other clinics will follow on April 23 and June 4 at the same place and time.

"All of these diseases can be prevented with effective immunization," stated Dr. B. C. Dayton, City Health Officer. The Civic Club is working in conjunction with the Texas Department of Public Health, and the program, for pre-school age children, is free.

Sunday's clinic will administer DTP-Td and Polio vaccines.

Parents must check what vaccines their children have received and the dates of the last doses in order for the clinic personnel to be able to determine the amount of doses needed by the child.

Judging of the swine division will kickoff the 25th annual Hico Livestock Show Friday at City Park, and advance entries indicate another large field in all divisions for the Silver Anniversary show.



MRS. BANE REVIEWS 'RED RIVER DUST' FOR THURSDAY MEETING OF REVIEW CLUB

The Review Club met March 9 in the home of Mrs. Wayne Rutledge, who served a dessert plate to the members and two guests, Mrs. Gertrude Boyd and Mrs. W. V. Bane, the guest speaker. Mrs. B. F. Thomas played background organ music.

Mrs. Bane, who is the wife of the Cleburne District Superintendent of the United Methodist Church and a former conference president of the WSCS, reviewed Evelyn Oppenheimer's "Red River Dust." Eugene Bowers collaborated with Miss Oppenheimer, providing useful records of Clarksville, the town whose history is recounted.

The speaker prefaced her remarks by saying "Every community, large or small, should keep records and should write a book about itself. The citizens of Clarksville kept voluminous records including letters, diaries and court records." The settlement was important, for it was the only safe spot to cross the dangerous Red River. It was the place to get necessary supplies, and law enforcement was based there. Malaria, which was highly contagious, was a serious problem then, but an early doctor explained how to control it and now Clarksville has no mosquitoes.

In 1840 Judge Hanson stopped in a saloon to fortify himself before holding court and was accosted by the town drunk, Charlie Rowan, to protest his last jail sentence. The first case in court was a divorce suit, which was an unusual occurrence in those days. In the heat of the ensuing argument the judge rested his hand in such a way that it stuck through a crack in the cabin walls. Recognizing the judge's ring, Rowan bit down on the hand and was arrested for simple assault. Unable to pay the \$28.42 fine, the drunk was sent back to jail.

At a preaching service on a very hot night, the minister was surprised by a direct hit from some flying object, which proved to be a damp "chaw" of tobacco. Men rushed out and seized the supposed culprit, who was later proved to chew a quite different brand of tobacco to that of the missile. Also it was demonstrated that the accused man had not been standing at the right angle to throw the wad through the window. Later a Hall boy confessed.

Slavery played a large part in this community. The planters coming to settle in Texas had to move their slaves overland and then return to get their families. In the meantime the negroes had to be cared for. This office was performed by people already settled there.

One interesting story concerns a slave named Priscilla, who had inherited the best qualities of both black and white races. Her story begins in Mississippi, where her owner, Charlie Harrison and David Handley were business partners. Finally the business was dissolved, but Mr. Harrison could not pay his share of the debts. At last Mr. Handley, enamored of Priscilla and desirous of gaining her, pressed payment of his partner's debt. Harrison, himself in love with Priscilla, secretly moved all his belongings to Texas. When Handley discovered Harrison's whereabouts, the two were living in Clarksville's Lone Star Hotel, where Priscilla also worked. Both men went to court. During the case Handley became seriously ill of malaria and came to the conclusion that Priscilla was not worth all this trouble. The case was then settled out of court. When Harrison died, Priscilla and their three children were set free. Priscilla, unable to make a living for them, went to court and asked to be given to a white family, the Johnsons. When the Johnsons died, Priscilla's children went to St. Louis and "passed."

A Female Academy was established in Clarksville where such subjects as philosophy, composition and astronomy were taught.

Although it was quite easy to get a doctor's license in that day, most of the doctors were legitimate. In 1834 a northern medical company, the Comstock Co., approached a Clarksville physician, Dr. Elliott, to be the sole representative of their drugs. When he received his consignment, he discovered in town another display of the same medicines. Dr. Elliott brought suit and secured a lawyer, who passed a copy of "Uncle Tom's Cabin" to each jurymen. The jury declared in favor of the doctor, as

no self-respecting Southern jury would vote favorably for a Northern company.

During the Civil War a Mr. Bowers was away in the Confederate Army, his wife and children each wrote him a letter on Christmas Day. As paper was quite scarce in the South, the letters were all written on one page. Mr. Bowers carried it in his pocket all through the war and, when he came home, pasted it in his diary. The ink is still bright.

The Bowers decided to have a bridge raising on their place. A variety of entertainment was planned: a fish fry, a political speaking, a baptizing and two unscheduled fist fights resulted. The Rev. Lennox called for sinners to repent as he stood on a cliff above the river. Stepping back as he spoke, he fell into the river, but, undeterred, continued to call for repentance.

An English family named Monkhouse came from England to Roland, a few miles from Clarksville and set up a pub. A second Mrs. John Monkhouse also came from England, seeking her husband and father of her eight children. After taking a job in Clarksville, she discovered the whereabouts of her husband and learned he had four children by his second wife. She never went the few miles to Roland to confront her husband. When Mr. Monkhouse died, he left his property to his second wife.

By 1890 there were 1,588 people in Clarksville, and the town decided it was time to buy a fire engine and man it with volunteers. When the engine arrived the firemen, desirous to demonstrate, set fire to a stack of boxes. Pranksters then went out to set fire to some piles of old lumber. About 2 a.m. a big hotel caught fire. The exhausted firemen saw the need for a more efficient engine, and the town and saved to get a bigger engine and to pay firemen.

Kite Flying Season Brings Pointers From Local CPS Manager

"No metal" is the key for safety in kite flying—meaning "no metal in the kite, no metal in the kite string, and no metal in the air (in the form of electric wires) near where the kite is being flown."

This is the advice offered to kite-fliers—young and old—by O. L. Davis, Hico manager for Community Public Service Company.

Other safety tips: keep the kite string dry and don't fly your kite on rainy days, avoid busy streets and highways, and stay away from TV antennae.

"If your kite does get snagged on a power line," Davis stressed, "don't try to climb up and get it down. Call the CPS office for help."

The kite-flying safety rules are being publicized in posters for school bulletin boards, and in newspaper ads, both sponsored by the power company.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Horse owners are urged to "get the jump" on VEE (Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis) by vaccinating their animals as soon as possible. Horses, mules and donkeys that should be vaccinated include (1) unvaccinated animals that have recently moved into the state, (2) foals vaccinated under six months of age, (3) foals born since last year's vaccination drive, and (4) animals that were overlooked and never vaccinated. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian at the owner's expense.

Soil test your garden and buy your fertilizer while the weather is still cold. Fertilizing without a soil test is a gamble.

Store the recommended amounts in the basement or storeroom until spring weather comes around. Then you'll be ready to plant your garden.

Soil testing will also show the presence of nematodes in the soil. These areas should be treated as soon as possible.

Soil sample boxes and questionnaires may be picked up at the county extension office. Instructions on taking samples are also available.

Former Fairy Man Develops New Irrigation System

Drip, drip, drip . . . goes the new irrigation system designed by Leon New, area extension irrigation engineer at Lubbock.

This method of slow delivery irrigation is hailed as holding considerable promise for maximizing net returns per acre-inch of water pumped, especially on high-value crops.

Permanent stationary irrigation systems of this type are capable of maintaining soil moisture more uniformly near an optimum level, and at the same time, more acres normally can be irrigated with a given amount of water.

Ray Stuart, manager of Sun Acres west of Lubbock is cooperating with associate Lubbock County Ag-

ent Tom Hemphill in an investigation of a completely automatic drip irrigation system in one of his 16 tomato greenhouses at Sun Acres.

It requires 20 to 30 minutes to irrigate each house through use of manually controlled valves. By contrast, the new drip system designed by New has required only periodic performance checks in more than eight weeks of operation.

Dr. Roland Roberts, extension vegetable specialist, believes the more uniformly optimum soil moisture level maintained by the drip system, coupled with new virus-resistant hybrids, can boost greenhouse tomato yields 35 to 50 percent. The system also permits a drier soil surface, which aids in preventing fungus diseases, which often plague green house tomatoes.

The drip system uses nylon water emitters which, New says, "also have given increased promise to satisfactory performance of sub-surface irrigation in the area."

In the Sun Acre system, emitters are spaced 34 inches apart and apply 1.5 gallons per hour each when in operation. The emitters are pressed into a line of half-inch polyethylene pipe. The pipe is on the soil surface at the base of the plants in each 36-inch row. Irrigation is triggered by a soil moisture sensing instrument located in the plant root zone.

The drip system pipe and other water distribution material cost about \$25 more per house than the perforated hose system used in conventional operations. "But it should last two to three times as long, and will especially pay if production can be increased," says New.
