Transaction Transfers Bank Stock

Floyd Clifton, President of First National Bank, revealed Wednesday morning that two local businessmen, W. C. Howard and Ellis Randals, had purchased the interest of Ransom Galloway and Jack Beeson of Spur in the local institution.

The transaction was effective Tuesday, May 23.

Both Howard and Randals are longtime Hico residents, and both have served on the board of directors of First National, with Howard being elected to the board earlier this year.

E. D. Brownlee of Brownwood and DeLeon is the other major stockholder in the bank, and retained his interest.

Randals is a lifetime resident of Hico and is cashier of the bank, Howard, a resident here since 1951, owns Howard Drug Co.

Clifton, Brownlee, Galloway and Beeson purchased controlling interest of the bank in August of 1971 from Mrs. Odie Petsick. Clifton has since served as president.

Lone Star Seeks Increase in Rates

Lone Star Gas Company this week officially asked the City of Hico to increase local residential and commercial natural gas rates by approximately 10 percent to enable the company to earn a reasonable rate of return on the fair value of properties used to serve the public.

The application for rate increase listed increased cost of buying gas, higher property and equipment costs, increased costs for employee compensation, higher interest rates on borrowed money and increased taxes as primary reasons for the income deficiency.

"In addition," stated C. D. Jennings, manager of the Hico distribution system, "Lone Star has a commitment to its customers to vigorously compete for supplies of natural gas to keep its reserves

in a favorable position. While other sections of the country are experiencing some shortages of natural gas, Lone Star has maintained favorable supplies. The gas cost adjustment portion of the application placed before the City Council will help Lone Star maintain its favorable gas supply position and assures customers of natural gas service for the future."

Approval of the company's application would increase the average monthly residential gas bill by approximately 64c according to company officials.

Lone Star serves about 650 customers in Hico.

This is the second rate increase asked in slightly more than two years by the gas company. City officials will take the request into consideration at their regular June meeting.

Hike Trail Opposition Meet Set

A citizen's meeting, particularly property owners of those opposed to the proposed Hiking and Biking Trail from Walnut Springs to Dublin will be held Saturday night, May 27, at 8 o'clock in the Hico High School Auditorium.

Purpose of the meeting will be to discuss rights of property owners and to organize and adopt strategies to oppose the Trail.

"The proposition of a hiking and biking trail from Walnut Springs to Dublin is a challenge to the rights of all property owners, to have and to hold in peaceful possession, their farms, ranches and homesteads," said a spokesman for the organizing group in urging all interested landowners and others to attend the meeting.

Compensation Due Ranchers For Livestock, Poultry Losses

Washington (Sp.)—The House Committee on Agriculture approved a bill (H.R. 15163) to compensate farmers and ranchers for the loss of livestock and poultry killed by coyotes and other predatory animals.

Introduced by Committee Chairman W. R. Bob Poage, D-Tex., and cosponsored by several other committee members, the bill directs the Secretary of Agriculture to make an indemnification payment in an amount equal to the fair market value of the lost livestock or poultry upon verification by a Department of Agriculture representative of such loss.

Before approving the measure, the Committee amended it to provide a 5-year limitation instead of the permanent authorization embodied in provisions as introduced. While no cost figures are included in the legislation, it has been variously estimated claims could run from \$10 million to \$50 million a

year. Testimony given the committee brought out that sheep and lamb losses to predatory animals in the United States in 1970 amounted to \$17 million. There are also appreciable annual calf losses. The coyote population has been reported increasing in recent years.

Passage of the legislation, Chairman Poage said, is warranted as a result of recent federal action

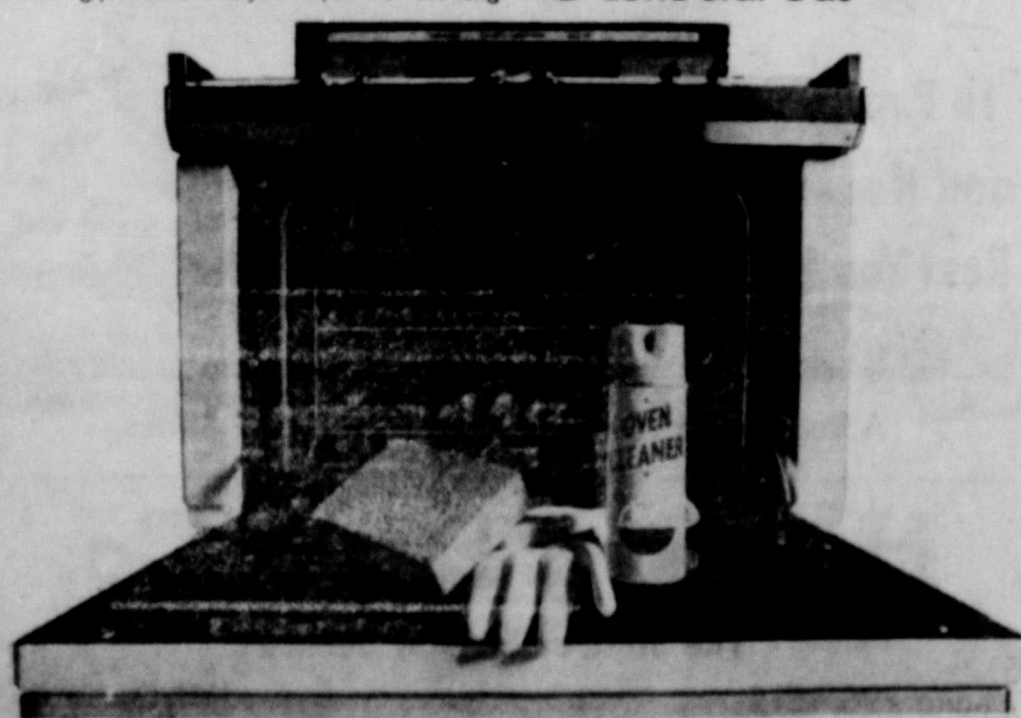
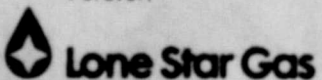

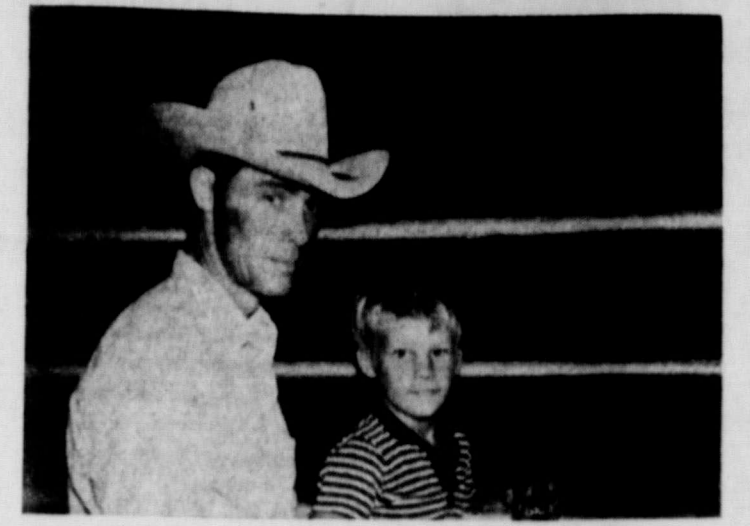
