One new program was added to the local curriculum this year, Home Economics Cooperative Education, under the supervision of Mrs. Marilynn Johanson.

These classes afford Juniors and Seniors both on-the-job and classroom education in a variety of occupations. Practical work experience is provided the student through parttime employment at cooperating businesses within the city. The course is set up for one or two years and carries two credits each year. Students receive pay comparable to that paid beginning workers in the same occupation.

Mrs. Johanson is responsible for selection and placement of students and will correlate their classroom and practical education. An advisory committee will be set up to assist Mrs. Johanson.




