Champion Chess of Havana, 1925 Robert Fischer, the young player of Brooklyn, is now the Champion Chess of the world since he defeated Boris Spassky, the great

Fischer is the first American player that has won this crown. The Russians have held it since 1948 when Alekhine defeated Capablanca. President Richard Nixon has invited Fischer to take dinner with him and his family in the

Fischer is only 29 years old. He is a real genius like Andersom, Morphy and the late Cuban champion of the world, J. R. Capablanca. He began to play chess when he was a little boy under the teaching of Jack Collins. He is a pride for America. His father, like Spassky's,

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


FIREMEN ANSWER CALLS
