Tigers Continue to Roll With 44-6 Victory Over Whitney; Still Untested

ly." Alexander alerted Hico Constable Buck Shepherd, who put a stop on the car just inside the city limits. After making a routine check, Shepherd discovered the operator of the vehicle had no driver's license, and brought the four to Peace Justice Paul Verduzco's office for further interrogation. A call to the Wichita Falls Police Department revealed that all four of the occupants had previous records, two for drug possession, and the driver of the car was currently on two year's probation for possession and burglary.

Shortly after being in contact with the police department, Shepherd received a call from a narcotics agent in Wichita Falls, who tipped the local officer on where the weed might be found. The agent said that the driver of the car had been known to transport marijuana in a spare tire. Shepherd had the tire dismounted and found several plastic bags of marijuana. He said that the weed wasn't weighed, but the tire was completely full.

The four suspects were carried to Hamilton by Shepherd and Alexander and charged with possession, then lodged in County jail where they remained Wednesday morning. A check of records failed to reveal any previous charge of marijuana possession in Hamilton County.

Constable Shepherd said that further checking revealed that the accused had been stopped by officers four times from the time they left Laredo until they got to Hamilton County, but were released each time.

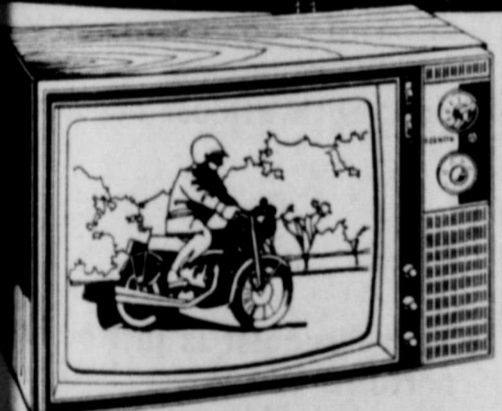

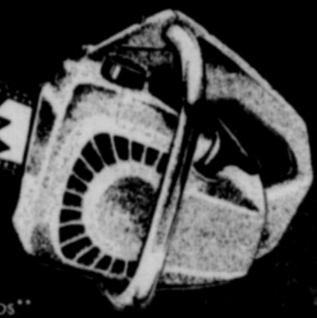

PROGRAM ON NATIONAL PARKS IS
PRESENTED AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING

The Hico Review Club met Thursday, Oct. 21 at the home of Mrs. L. F. Bonner for its regularly scheduled meeting.

Members answered roll call by describing "A Scenic Spot I Remember."

Mrs. Bryan Angell presided at the business meeting when various club projects were discussed and announcements were made.

Topic for the afternoon program was "The National Parks—America's Gift to Herself," and the information presented was compiled by Mrs. J. E. Lincoln. Because Mrs. Lincoln was ill, the paper was presented by Mrs. B. C. Dayton, program chairman.

This year, 1972, marks the centennial celebration of the National Park System. The week of Sept. 18-21, representatives of 90 nations met in Yellowstone, Grand Teton National Parks to commemorate the signing of the Park Bill by President Grant in March, 1872.

This act of Congress which established the National Park System is said to have been one of the most "important historic events in the affairs of the nation" and was the "springboard" for other nations to preserve sections within their countries. The preservation of the forests of Europe, the Veldt of Africa, the jungles of Asia and South America, and the Outback of Australia are the results of the creation of Yellowstone National Park.

The National Parks of the U.S. contain endless variety and scope from the top of Mt. McKinley, over 20,000 feet high, to a river 360 feet below the earth's surface in Mammoth Cave, and from dry Death Valley to Buck Reef in the Virgin Islands where rivers are guided through grottos and coral formations under water.

Haleakala National Park on the island of Maui in Hawaii offers us scenery in an extinct volcano crater where exotic plants grow that exist no place else on earth, and Hawaii Volcanoes National Park on the island of Hawaii offers an impressive view of active volcanism.

Parks worthy to mention on the mainland include Everglades Park in Florida where many trails are accessible only by foot or boat, the Grand Tetons where a winter feeding ground for the nation's largest elk herd is in nearby Jackson Hole; Yosemite which has the nation's highest waterfall and three groves of giant Sequoia.

The list goes on and on—Canyon Lands and Rainbow Bridge of Utah

and Arizona, Navajo National Monument and Mesa Verde, Grand Canyon, Crater Lake, Bryce and Zion Canyons, Big Bend, the Smokey Mountains, Mt. Ranier and the most unusual Devil's Tower.

The future of the parks is not so bright as the past has been as we face the decisions of whether to allow private vehicles to continue to pollute. Man is the worst enemy of the parks. He is destructive and careless with his trash. If these beauty spots had to be closed away from the public life would become drab indeed.

powder has many advantages among them the fact that it weighs less and space because 80 percent of the water is removed. It's economically good and it's easy to transport, and pack, even to distant areas. powder can be preserved for long periods of time without refrigeration, and this makes it

convenient for hikers, campers, explorers and the military. High protein juices are flavorful and the fish protein concentrate is an odorless powder with 80 percent protein. Milk protein powder contains 29 percent protein.

Powdered fruit juices as such, aren't new to the market place. During and after World War II, powdered fruit juices were developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Western Utilization Research Laboratory. At that time, however, some of the products lacked in flavor.

Since that time researchers further developed and fortified fruits and vegetables with flavor, protein and vitamins. Also, in the past decade, the fruit juice industry has

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Winter pastures can be extremely important in supplying nutrients for cattle this year, and an early planting date will boost production and help to maximize profits.

The declining temperatures and shorter daylight hours that become more apparent each day closer to winter means less favorable conditions each day you delay planting. High rates of fertilization and adequate amounts of good quality seed are essential to successful forage production in winter pasture programs.

High rates of fertilization encourage deep root systems, early growth and high quality forage. Soil tests are recommended to determine fertilizer.

Another requirement in winter pastures is a properly prepared seedbed, one that is clean, firm and fertile.

Army worms and other insects may become a problem in early planted pastures, but they can be safely and economically controlled with insecticides; so the advantages of early planting far outweigh the threat of insects.

Winter pastures can provide necessary vitamins and minerals to improve nutritional conditions of cows suffering from the prolonged drought. The cool-season crops are most profitably used when grazed by animals with high market value such as dairy cows and stocker calves, but they can be successfully used with cow-calf operations. Besides supplying nutrients, the pastures stimulate milk flow and encourage heaviest weaning weights.
