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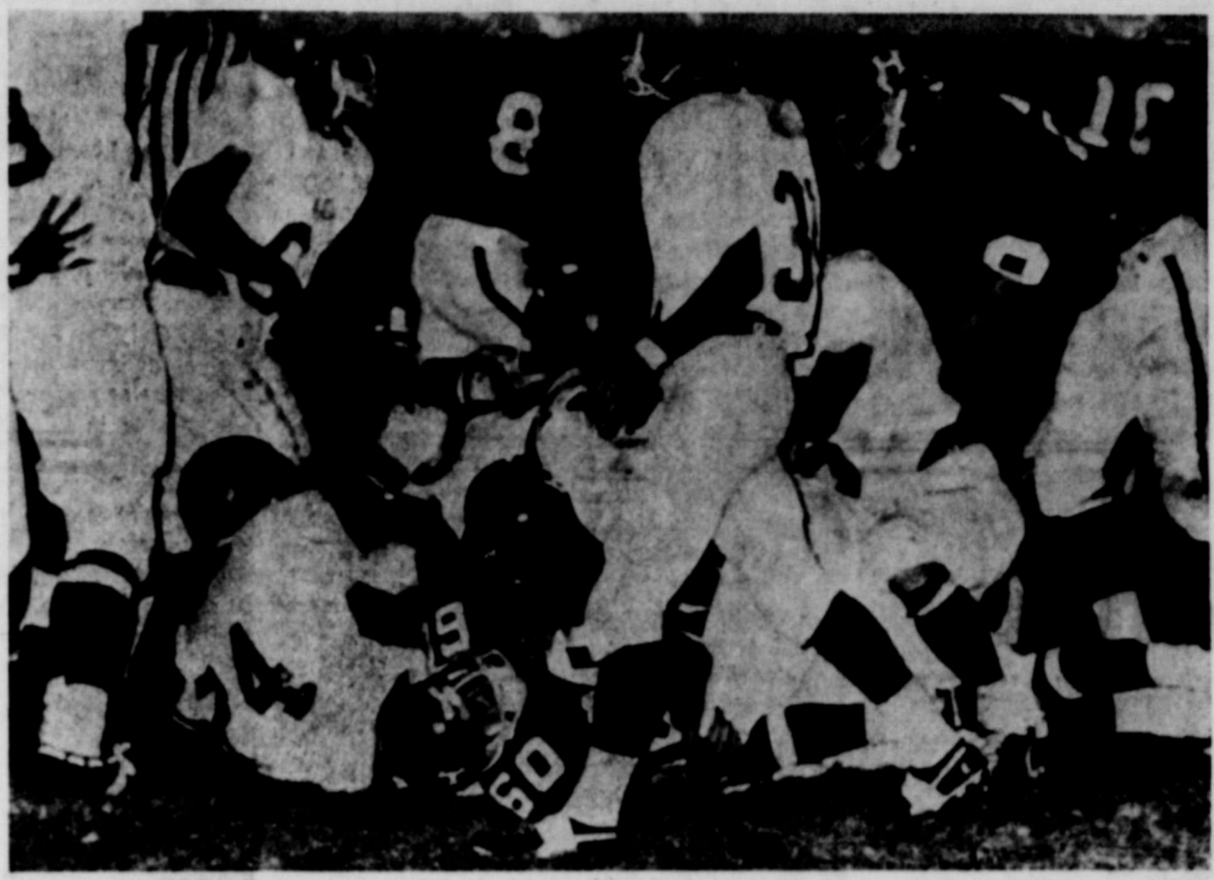

## Tigers Down Hamilton in Great Defensive Battle



### Goal Line Stand Proves to Be Turning Point in Contest

Hico's Tigers, seeking win No. 5, spotted Hamilton a 6-0 lead, and then roared back to score three TD's of their own and down the Bulldogs 20-6 in a grid thriller played last Friday night in Bulldog Country.

Actually, the final outcome wasn't decided until late in the fourth quarter, when the Tigers held off the Bulldogs on the one yard line with something over three minutes left in the game. The Bulldogs had moved to that point by recovering a Tiger fumble at the 20 with the score standing at 14-6 in favor of the Tigers.

The game was billed as a grid classic, and that's the way it was. A defensive struggle from the outset, Hico used two big plays to earn the victory, despite having a bad case of fumbitis. The Tigers bobbled the ball four times to the Bulldogs, one leading to the home team's only marker.

Hico received the opening kickoff, and a fine runback by Galen Lindsey put the Tigers in business with excellent field position at their own 42. Hico worked to the Bulldog 36 before relinquishing the ball on fourth down.

Hamilton was able to gain but 8 yards on three stabs, and punted to the Tigers' Walter Lucas, who mis-handled the ball resulting in a Bulldog recovery at the Tiger 23. After a three-yard gain, Hamilton's super star Jessie Kirkland took the pitch and swept to the left for 20 yards and the TD. Kick was wide, and the Bulldogs led 6-0.

Hico was unable to move on the next series, and punted to the Bulldogs at the 32. It was the same story for Hamilton, who in turn kicked to the Tigers at the 27.

From the 27, Danny Polk picked up a couple of yards to the 29, and then it happened! Galen Christian took off down the right side of the field, out-raced the defensive man, and Benny Baley hit him with a perfect pass at about the Bulldog 40, and the speedy flanker raced to the end zone for six points. The play covered 71 yards, and after Lindsey's kick, Hico was out front to stay 7-6.

Hamilton put the kickoff in play at their own 36, and on first down freshman Mike Schrank took off on a 47-yard scamper to the Tiger 17, with Jan Christian making a great save. The Bulldogs gained one to the 16, Hico's Danny Kennedy broke through on the next play to nail the runner for a 6-yard loss back to the 22. A 2-yard gain and a fourth down incompleated pass stopped the drive with only seven seconds left in the first quarter.

The second period went scoreless, with Hico threatening once. After taking over on their own 20 late in the first quarter, Hico moved to the Bulldog 23 in the second period, only to see a fumble wipe out the threat.

Hamilton recovered the bobble at the 25, and after three plays netted only six yards, punted to the Tigers at the 40. On the very first play a Tiger bobble handed the ball back to the Bulldogs at the Tiger 36. After four stabs, the Bulldogs relinquished the ball at the Tiger 29.

Hico moved out to the 44 and a fourth down gamble failed to pay, with the Bulldogs taking over at that point with 2:08 left in the first half. Again the Tiger defense arose to the occasion, and the half ended with the Bulldogs at the 38, and Hico owning a 7-6 lead.

Hamilton received the second half kickoff and a fine runback to the 39 was rubbed out by a per-

## Mrs. Blair Named to High Extension Service Position

College Station (Spl.)—Mrs. Vivian H. Blair of Sherman was appointed family life education specialist-aging with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, Dr. John E. Hutchison, director, made the announcement.

Headquartered at College Station, Mrs. Blair will work with county Extension agents and county committees on aging throughout the state in developing programs and activities with senior citizens.

The Extension home economics specialist served as Grayson County Extension agent for three years before accepting the new position.

Mrs. Blair's work in Grayson County included work with the total county Extension staff to reach adults and youth of all socio-economic levels.

One of her responsibilities as a county Extension agent was to assist with the in-service training of new Extension agents. She also worked with the Expanded Nutrition Program and conducted an on-going home economics program in the county. Mrs. Blair also served as county Extension agent in Hamilton, Williamson and McLennan counties.

Her service in McLennan County included programs for senior citizens, according to Mrs. Florence W. Low, assistant director for home economics.

"In Waco, Mrs. Blair worked closely with the Governor's Committee on Aging and the county committee in the development of programs for this audience," Mrs. Low noted.

The specialist in aging is a graduate of Texas Woman's University with a B.S. degree in home economics education. She did additional study at Texas A&M University, Baylor University and the University of Texas.

In addition to Extension work she taught home economics in the Morgan Mill and White Deer school systems.

The specialist is a member of the Texas and American Home Economics Associations and Altrusa Club.

### Carl King Re-Elected Zone 4 Director For Soil District

Carl King of Fairy was re-elected as a Hamilton-Coryell Soil and Water Conservation District Director for Zone 4 last week. King will serve another five years. He has been a district director for 15 years and is the board chairman at present time.

The election was held in the First Methodist Church at Fairy. Joe Allen, Hamilton County Agent, was elected chairman of the convention, Bomer Harris secretary, and Ben Gleason tally clerk. There were 26 people in attendance and 22 of them were qualified voters. A qualified voter must own agricultural land within the sub-division where the election is being held. He must live in a county all or any part of which is in the Soil and Water District.

George Krupala, FHA Supervisor for Hamilton County, gave a talk on planning, funding and establishing a rural community water system for Fairy, South Hico and Carlton. He said it would probably take three wells to furnish the water needed for this area.

The FHA and local citizens have established a successful system like this at Jonesboro. People at Pottsville and Indian Gap have indicated that they are interested in a similar project.

## Review Club Tours Stephenville Museum

Members of the Hico Review Club went to Stephenville last Thursday, Oct. 5 to tour the Historical House Museum.

Still at its original location on East Washington St., the house is Victorian style, native stone with gingerbread trim and was built in 1869 by J. D. Berry.

The house opens into a hallway with a room to left and right on the first and second floors. The downstairs rooms are furnished as parlors of the period would have been and pieces of the original hand-cut gingerbread trim are on view. Interesting calendar paintings are on the walls and one of the rooms has a large scroll-type painting that was done by a former Stephenville lady. A charcoal painting that won a first place ribbon at the State Fair many years ago is also on display. The original fireplace and mantels are in the parlor rooms.

Between the front two rooms and the kitchen, which was at one time set away from the main house, is a shed room which serves as a display spot for geological specimens and other museum items which are not like home furnishings. The small kitchen contains a wood stove and very old furnishings of the period.

Up the stairs and above the two parlors are two bedrooms. One contains a large bed, dresser and chiffoniere. Many items of clothing and bedding are on display here. The other bedroom is done as a nursery with a wicker cradle that was donated by Mrs. J. C. Terrell Sr. of Stephenville. It is interesting to note that all the Terrell grandchildren have slept in the cradle as infants. Tiny children's chairs, play dishes and doll furnishings are on display in the room and also a "drummer's sample" cast iron wood heater perfect in every detail but very small in size.

Many individuals have donated items to the museum and some items are on loan from the Fort Worth Museum. Review Club members said that the area was very fortunate to have such a museum. Guides for the group on their tour were Mrs. Bryan Angell, who is at the museum during its regular opening hours, and Mrs. J. Louis Evans of Stephenville.

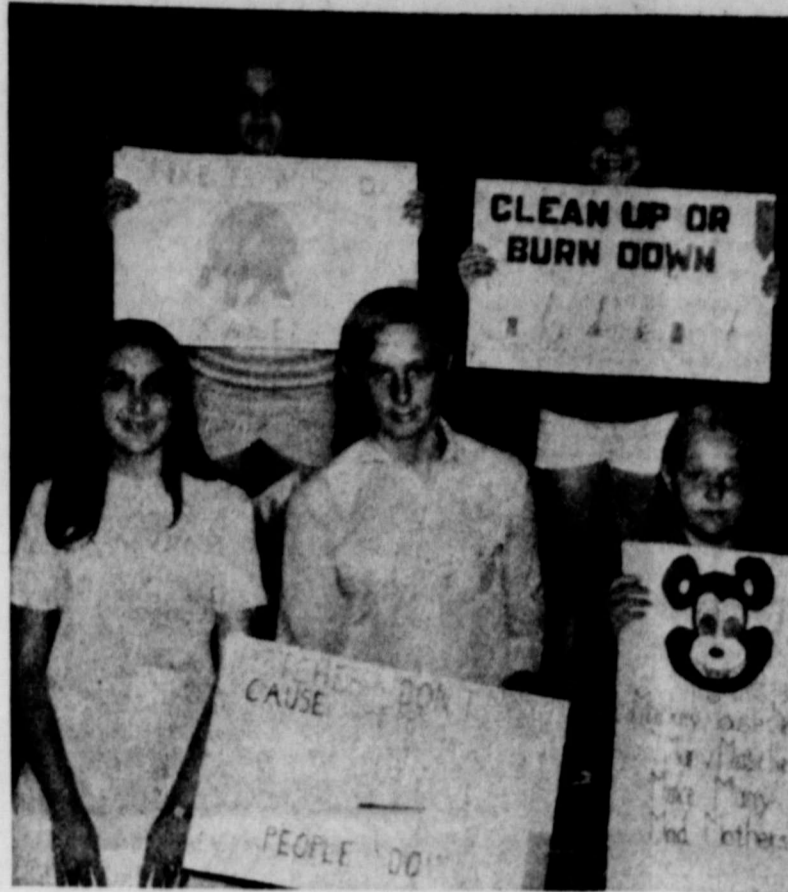

Make-your-own kabobs are fun and a time-saving outdoor meal. Gather the food and let each member or guest assemble and grill his own meal-on-a-stick.

Kabobs are made by alternating chunks of food on long metal skewers or hardwood sticks. Don't overcrowd the meat and vegetables—allowing some room between each chunk to promote faster and more even cooking.

Before grilling, season the ingredients with salt and pepper and brush with butter or barbecue sauce.

For best results, use foods that cook in about the same length of time. To do this, some vegetables should be partially cooked beforehand. Or put each vegetable on a separate skewer and grill until done. To serve, slip the food from the skewer onto a plate or hot roll.

Kabobs offer numerous combinations of meats and vegetables. Some interesting ones the agent recommended include beef cubes, mushrooms, ham cubes, and small whole onions; chicken livers or meatballs wrapped in bacon; steak.

Mix first five ingredients and form into small meat balls, lightly roll in flour and brown in small amount of Crisco or oil. Place in a casserole dish or pan. Dilute mushroom soup with two-thirds can of water and pour over meatballs. Cover with foil and cook for 25 minutes in a 350-degree oven, uncover and cook about 10 or 15 minutes more.
