The game will start at 7:30, and the largest crowd of the year is expected to be on hand. In other district games, Glen Rose is at Goldthwaite, and Valley Mills hosts China Springs.

Antlerless Permits to Be Issued

Austin (Spl.)—The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department reminds landowners or their agents to obtain their antlerless deer tags on permits in time for the upcoming deer season, which opens Nov. 18.

Permits are issued in limited quantities based on over-population of deer, carrying capacity of the land and in ratio to the proportion of land having surplus deer.

Special tags are used where either sex hunts are approved.

There are no limitations on the number of tags a landowner may obtain since the hunts are designed to allow full landowner control of harvest.

The tags and permits may be obtained at the following area locations:

Hamilton County: Friday, Nov. 3 at the Courthouse.
Bosque County: Wednesday and Thursday, Nov. 1-2 at the Courthouse in Meridian.

Erath County: November 9-10 at the Courthouse in Stephenville.

Somervell County: November 8 at the Courthouse in Glen Rose.

Voter Registration Law is Explained

There is much confusion of the new voter registration law. Many think they are not registered. According to Senate Bill 51, passed last year, a voter is now permanently registered as long as he continues to reside in the same county and votes at least every three years.

The new law means that everyone who voted in the party primaries in May are already registered to vote here for the next three years. Even if you didn't vote in May and do vote November

7, you are still registered for the next three years.

Anyone who voted in a state-wide election this year is automatically re-registered for three years.

A voter who has not filled out a registration form can do so at any time but he must register 30 days prior to an election to be eligible to vote.

If a person fails to vote for three consecutive years, his name is pulled from the voter registration file and he is required to register again to be eligible to vote.

Hico's lightweight Tigers squared off against heavyweight Valley Mills last Friday night, and when the firing was over, the Tigers had notched their sixth win of the season, 32-6.

The victory was satisfying, to say the least, because a Hico team had never defeated the Eagles.

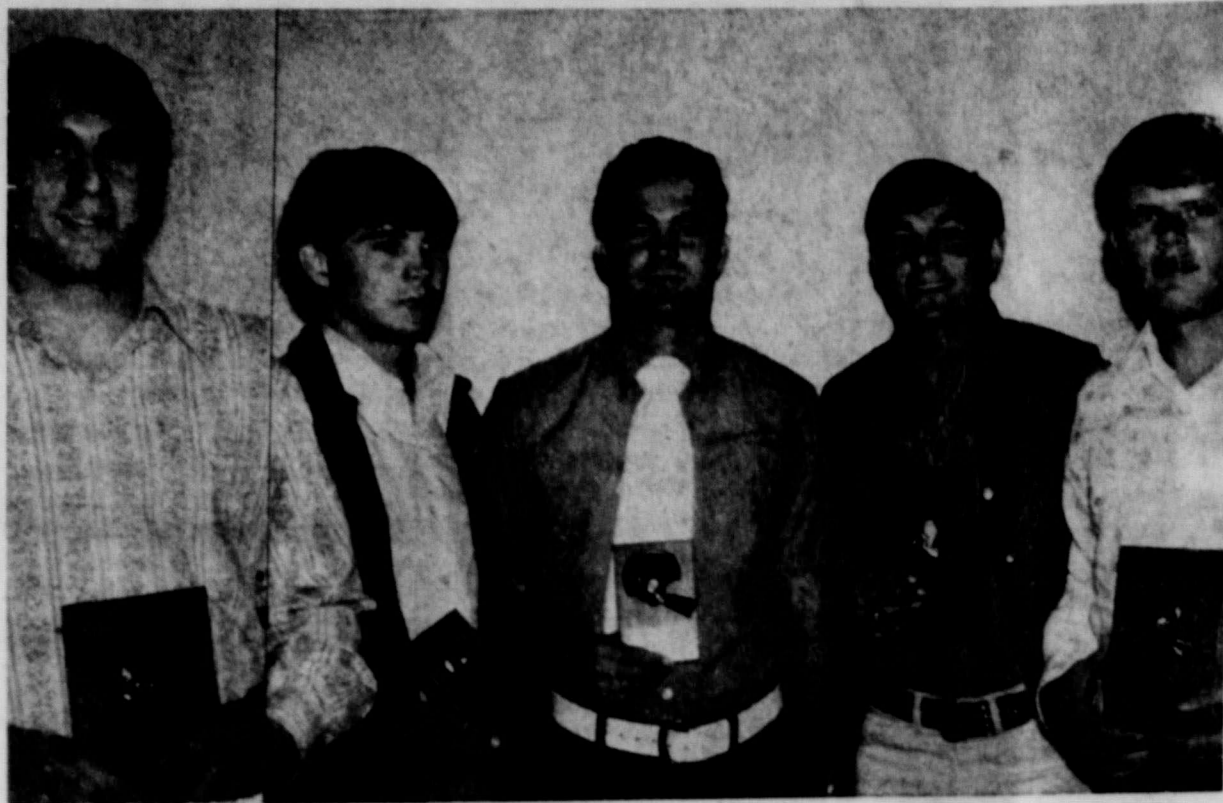
The Eagles mustered a drive of their own on the ensuing kickoff, but the drive was killed at the Tiger 26.

a penalty moved the ball back to the 35, an incomplete pass went for naught, and then Bailey hit Buddy Mayfield, who was all alone, for 35 yards and the TD. Point try was no good and the Tigers led 13-0.

The first half ended with Mayfield intercepting a pass on the last play. The Eagles came out with a lot of fire in the second half, moving to the 43, but Hico all but iced the game on the next play. Lindsey ran under an Eagle pass at his own 48, and set sail for a 52-yard return that made the score 19-0.

However, it still wasn't over, as the Eagles took the kickoff and used but three plays to dent the end zone. Quarterback Charles Hinton broke free for 41 yards to the Tiger 31, a two-yard gain placed the ball at the 29, and Hinton hit Ronnie Wiley for the final 29 steps and TD, making the count 19-6.

The Tigers, with their margin cut to 13 points, came roaring back, and on the sixth play after the kickoff, Bailey hit Lindsey with a 36-yard strike to end any doubts as to who would be the winner.

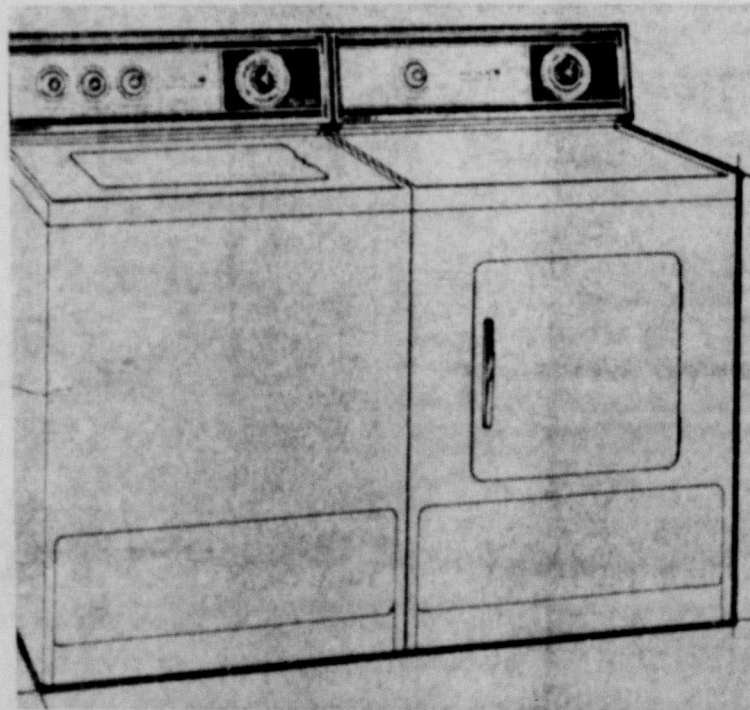
