

# Write-In Candidate for Sheriff Adds Spice to Tuesday Election

Write-in ballot faces local Tuesday when they go to elect a President, other officials. The Tuesday election is a write-in campaign for County Sheriff. L. Mahan, who resides in Erant, is the write-in candidate. He is an experienced law official, having served as Sheriff of Mills County for 20 months. He is opposing incumbent L. Young, who was re-elected to the Sheriff's post in May Primary. The election is up the gigantic ballot

is the Presidential race, where the Nixon-Agnew ticket is opposed by McGovern-Shriver. Also on the ballot is a Socialist Party for President, with Linda Jenness and Andrew Pulley as candidates. Biggest races on a state level are those for U.S. Senator and Governor. Democrat Barefoot Sanders is opposing incumbent Republican John Tower for the Senate seat, and Democratic nominee Dolph Briscoe is opposed by Republican Henry Grover. Flores Amaya is the Senate candidate under the Raza Unida Party, and Tom Leonard is the Socialist Party nominee. Raza Unida Party candidate for Governor is Ramsey Muniz, and Socialist Party is represented by

Deborah Leonard. Lt. Gov. Democratic nominee Bill Hobby does not have a Republican candidate, but he does have one from each of the other two parties. One of the strongest contested races in the state is that for State Treasurer, where Democrat Jesse James is getting big pressure from Republican Maurice Angly, Jr. Another race creating interest in the two major parties is that for Railroad Commissioner, where Democrat Byron Tunnell is opposed by Jim Segrest. Only other opposed race in state politics is that for the place on the State Board of Education, Dist. 11, where Glen L. Smith is opposed by John W. Garibay, Republican.

**Amendments.** Fourteen Constitutional Amendments will either be approved or turned down by state voters. The amendments, in the order that they appear on the ballot, are:  
1. Salary increase to \$8,400 per annum for members of the Senate and House of Representatives.  
2. Abolishing the Lamar County Hospital District.  
3. Requiring commissioners courts in all counties to compensate all justices of the peace on a salary basis.  
4. Providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes convening of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of

submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution.  
5. Allowing certain tax exemptions to disabled veterans, their surviving spouses and minor children, and surviving spouses and minor children of members of the armed forces who lose their life while on active duty.  
6. Providing that various political subdivisions may exempt not less than \$3,000 of the value of residence homesteads of all persons 65 years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions.  
7. Provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed or national origin.

8. Provide a four-year term of office for Governor, Lt. Gov., Attorney General, Comptroller, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers.  
9. Provide that directors of soil and water conservation districts are not disqualified from holding or being compensated for more than one office.  
10. Revising provisions on the time and method of proposing amendments to the state constitution and the time and method of publishing notice of amendments.  
11. Provide a salary of \$22,500 for the Lt. Governor and the Speaker of the House.  
12. Permitting State employees,

who are not State officers, to serve as members of governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns or other local agencies without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument.  
13. Setting a 6-percent weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling.  
14. Allow a county to reduce its permanent school fund and distribute the money to its independent and common school districts on a per scholastic basis.

## Tiger Match at Glen Rose Is Feature District Contest

It's show-down time in District 1A-11 this week, as the high-flying Hico Tigers journey over to Somervell County to take on their counterparts, the Glen Rose Tigers in the feature battle which could be "for all the marbles."

The two teams are the most successful in the district, with Hico owning an unblemished 7-0 season mark, and Glen Rose right behind with a 6-1 record. In league action, the two teams are both undefeated, and up for grabs in the game is undisputed leadership in the loop.

While Hico was breezing through seven opponents, Glen Rose stumbled only once, losing a real close battle to state-ranked Aledo. At that time, Aledo was rocking along rated number 5 in the state, and they are still undefeated.

Glen Rose shows victories over Millsap, Grandview, Cedar Hill, Itasca, China Spring and Goldthwaite. Only Goldthwaite pressed the Tigers, losing 7-6 in last Friday's game.

On the other side of the ledger, Hico has won over Grandview, Early High of Brownwood, Whitney, De Leon, Hamilton, Valley Mills and Dublin.

Glen Rose holds the upper hand in previous games, with Hico winning only once in recent years.

That was a 12-0 verdict last year. In other games, Glen Rose has spanked the locals easily.

Hico will not go into the contest at full strength, as stellar running back Danny Polk suffered cracked ribs in last week's game, and will be slowed considerably. Polk had perhaps his best game of the season against Dublin last week, and is also one of the defensive leaders. Starting tackle Bryan Jones

is still nursing a bad arm, and guard Jim Turner has missed practices this week with severe muscle spasms. Other team members are reportedly in good shape.

Glen Rose uses a lot of offensive sets, and they have a man to make them go in Keith Rhodes, 170-pound tailback. Their other personnel are solid performers, and will give the Tigers their most stern test of the year.

## Roland Forgy, 51, Dies at Richardson

Friends here were shocked last week to learn of the death of Roland (Roline) Forgy, 51, of Richardson, formerly of Hico. Forgy, son of Mrs. George Golightly of Hamilton, was a longtime resident here, and former employee of the News Review.

Mr. Forgy passed away Saturday, Oct. 21 at Morton Hospital in Richardson. Funeral services were held Monday in Restland Funerals Home in Richardson, with burial Tuesday in San Antonio.

Mr. Forgy, who had wide experience as a newspaperman, was a physicist with Texas Instruments at the time of his death, holding the title of Manager, Corporate Graphic Arts Services with TI.

Leukemia, Roland passed away after a short illness with pneumonia.

The leukemia illness wasn't known by anyone other than his wife, Charlotte, as he had sworn her to secrecy as to his eventual end. He was that type of person, never wanting to bother anyone, especially his loved ones, with his ailments.

Forgy was more commonly known here as "Roline" but when he continually received mail as "Miss," he received a court order to change his name to Roland.

He was a faithful employee at the News Review until the start of World War II. After four years in the Air Force, he returned to Hico for two years, working at the

## Tigers Lash Lions 40-16 to Go 7-0

"Loud" you heard echoing the seams of Tiger Stadium Friday night was the proud undefeated Dublin Lions as they hit the turf for the first time this season.

Administering the spanking was the awesome band of Hico Tigers, who took the ball and marched over the visitors to the 466 yards total offense in a 45-15 win.

The first half was close, in fact so close that Dublin had the edge in statistical departments and led at the half.

The Tigers bounced back in the third quarter, scoring twice, to cut the count to 32-8 with only 10 minutes left in the game, and let Dublin have another TD scoring one themselves for a 40-16 margin.

John started the first scoring drive in the first quarter, being at their own 15. The drive on the first play of the second quarter, with Galen Lindsey leading from the six. His kick good, and the Tigers led 7-0.

John went ahead in the game when John Hodgess intercepted a pass at the 35. They used but 10 plays to go the 35 steps, with Lindsey going the final yard. He had the big gainer in the

drive, scampering 32 yards to the Tiger 3. The Tigers were penalized on the point-after attempt, and Dublin went for two from the 1 1/2 to make the margin 8-7 at halftime.

Shortly after the second half kick-

off, Bob Lefevre got his first of two fumble recoveries for the night at the Lion 27. Five plays later and Benny Baley hit Buddy Mayfield with a 15-yard scoring strike. Lindsey's kick was good, and the Tigers led 14-8.

Dublin went to sleep on the ensuing kickoff, allowing the Tigers to cover the free ball at the Lion 42. Hico went to the three yard line in two plays, and a fumble killed the threat right at the goal. (Continued on Page 8)

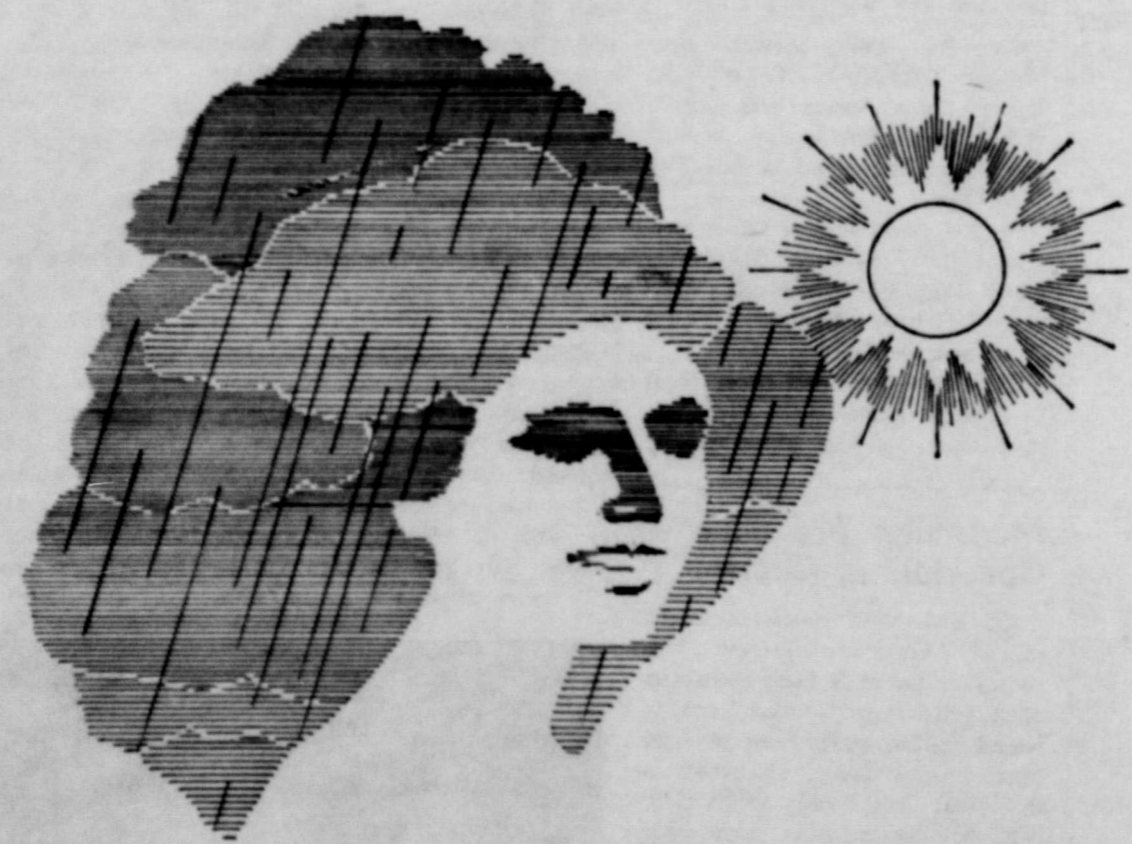

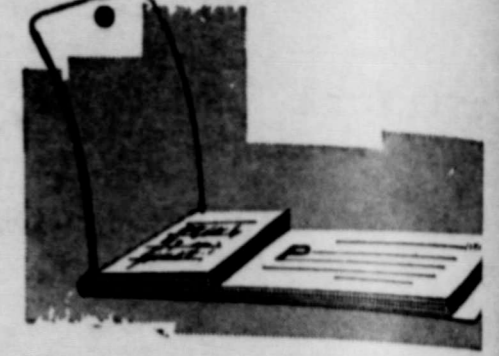

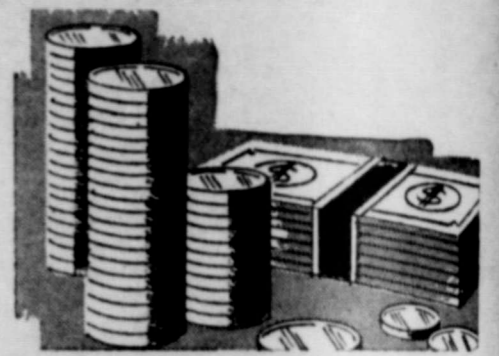

## 'AMERICAN ETHNIC GROUPS IN TEXAS' WAS PROGRAM TOPIC AT REVIEW CLUB

Hico Review Club met Oct. 19 at the home of Mrs. Wayne Rutledge. In keeping with the theme for the day's program, the hostess served refreshments with an ethnic flavor, including Czechoslovakian Kolaches and Russian spiced tea.

Plans for the Tasting Tea and Bazaar were completed in the business meeting, presided over by Mrs. Bryan Angell.

Mrs. Angell also brought the program for the day. Her topic was "American Ethnic Groups in Texas." She began by stating that Texas presents a rich sampling of the melting pot that the United States represents.

When the Spaniards first came to Texas there were nearly 30 Indian tribes living in the area. Now there are only about 2,750 Indians in the State. In 1820 there were only a few thousand white inhabitants in Texas. After that time settlers came from other states and then immigrants from Europe came in rapidly for various reasons. By 1900 the population of Texas had grown to 3,048,710.

The Negro population in Texas grew because, after much dissension, the state was admitted to the union as a slave state. They came in as servants and farm workers. In 1940 there were 924,391 Negroes in Texas, the largest single group outside white.

The Czech people have contributed much to this country and state as farmers and workers in mills. They are a religious people who love fairs, feasts, and all important days. The Czechs settled in and around the town of West.

The Poles have had a strong influence as an ethnic group. The first permanent Polish settlement was in Panna Maria, Karnes County, Texas. The settlers arrived near Christmas, 1854. By 1929 when the 75th anniversary of Panna Maria was celebrated the number of 100 original families had dwindled to four. The community had only about 150 families dwelling there in 1950 but there is great interest locally in historical Panna Maria.

The great potato famine of Ireland that lasted from 1845-1850 was a major cause for a mass immigration from that country. They were farmers in Ireland but because they were not familiar with U.S. methods they became a city people and were employed at road-building, canal projects and building railroads.

Poverty and hard times were the basic reasons for Scottish immigration. There is a Scottish society of Texas and the Scots of Austin and the Highland Games are held annually on the McLennan County College Campus.

Texas has a bit of Alsace in Castroville. This group came to Texas in 1843 after securing a land grant from President Sam Houston. In 1850 Castroville was the 12th largest town in Texas but progress passed it by and today it is only a tourist stopover on Highway 90.

The French, Belgians and Swiss arrived in Texas around 1855 to colonize a spot near Dallas that was called La Reunion. They set up what was to be an ideal community peopled by musicians, artists, philosophers, tradesmen, engineers, and idealists. There were only a handful of practical farmers. A year after Dallas was incorporated many Le Reunion residents began to move there and many of these old family names are to be found in the Dallas phone directory.

After the revolution of Texas came, many persons of Spanish and Mexican descent did not remain loyal to the Mexican government. They formed the nucleus of families of Latin descent who are old families in Texas.

The period between 1820 and 1840 was the time when most immigrants to Texas were Germans, a thrifty, neat and hard-working group. They made a success of their settlements New Braunfels, Fredericksburg and Nordheim are all typical German towns. The custom of building fires on mountains around Fredericksburg at Eastertime comes from an early day when the Indians built fires on neighboring mountains and the children were told that it was the work of the Easter bunny to

calm their fears.

The Bosque territory of Texas was selected as a permanent home by several pioneer families from Norway around 1850. A recent edition of the Texas Almanac points to the area around Clifton as a "distinctive community, the principal Norwegian-descent center of the State." An annual Norwegian celebration is the Cranfills Gap Lute Fisk.

The intermingling of physical and personality characteristics of these races and around 15 more have made the Texan what he is. Many of the customs are continued and are considered as being Texan or American.

The day's program concluded with a medley of ethnic airs sung by Mmes. Cook, Dayton and Braune with Mrs. Rutledge accompanying on the organ.
