All are starters except Keller and Wolfe.

The greatest tribute that one can give a group of kids like these is to be present for the final game, which should see the stands packed.

China Spring, a power in past years, was hit early in the season by the injury bug, and the team

is still suffering from those hurts. However, the Cougars still have the personnel to play a good game, and the Tigers won't find easy pickings against them.

Hico kicked off to Goldthwaite who fumbled and the Tigers recovered at the 17. Lindsey hit for three yards twice moving to the 11, Galen Christian moved another three to the eight, and Polk got the first down at the seven. Baley couldn't gain, Lindsey ran for two yards, and then scooted in from the five to set the stage for the onslaught. Kick was good and the Tigers owned a 7-0 lead with very little time lapsed in the game.

After the kickoff it was the same thing, with the Tigers recovering an Eagle fumble on their second offensive play at the 19. Hico wasted no time, as Baley hit Tony Mayfield for the 19 yards, upping the count to 14-0.

A Tiger fumble set the stage for Goldthwaite's only counter of the night. The Eagles pounced on the ball at the Tiger 27 and used only three plays for the marker, with fullback Larry Elliott rambling 22 yards to the end zone.

Hico started their next TD drive in the action-packed first quarter. Baley raced the kickoff back to the mid-field stripe, two consecu-

tive penalties against Goldthwaite moved the ball to the 30, and then it was grind-it-out, with the drive ending early in the second period. Polk scooted in from three yards on a pitchout.

Hico's next marker came on their next possession and it took only two plays to get in. Baley hit Tony Mayfield for 29 yards to the Eagle 45, and then threw to Galen Christian for the 45 yards and TD. Baley then passed to Buddy Mayfield for the two-point conversion, sending the Tigers to the dressing room at halftime with a 28-6 cushion. The

## AT COUNCIL—

## Trash Haul-Off Proposal Given

A major portion of the Monday night City Council meeting was devoted to hearing a proposal by an Irving man, Jerry Lucas, to contract with the city for pickup and disposal of all residential and business trash and garbage.

In a nutshell, Lucas' proposal was this: he would furnish all equipment and labor, make twice weekly pickups in the residential section, and collect from businesses as often as needed.

Under his proposal, fee for residential pickup would be \$2.75 per month, and businesses would be negotiated on an individual basis.

The fee would be billed by the city, who in turn would pay Lucas. Lucas also asked for a ten-year exclusive contract from the city.

No action was taken on the matter, with a study to be made on

the proposal just as soon as possible.

In other business, third reading of an ordinance to annex 4.74 acres of land into the city limits was passed on motion by Wayne Rutledge and seconded by Bill Howard.

A report from the State Health Dept., making several recommendations for the city to carry out, was also heard. The Mayor and Council noted that most of the recommendations were being carried out.

In other discussion, the Council authorized moving a fire plug from in front of a residence; insurance on the city office building and fire hall was discussed; and a report was heard from W. R. Hampton on the necessity of purchasing a new sewage pump.

## Deer Season Starts Saturday; Game Plentiful and Fat

Every nook and cranny in Hico is expected to be crammed full of deer hunters converge on the area for opening of the whitetail season Saturday morning.

The opening, latest in history due to changes in the law, is expected to be one of the best ever, with deer more plentiful than ever before, and in excellent condition. Rainfall at the proper time sent browse growth on the upswing, and trips to the field have revealed that the deer are fat and becoming very "sassy."

The opening and the annual rut should arrive at about the same time, insuring hunter success.

For the first time in history, Hamilton County falls under the "either sex" law. Under these conditions, a hunter may kill two deer

—a buck and a doe, two bucks, or two does. Previously, in certain areas of the county, a hunter could kill two bucks and one doe.

Game Management officials urged all sportsmen to be very careful about tagging deer this year, and reminded them if they harvested two doe, they had to use the bonus tag plus a permit on one, and a buck tag and permit on the other. Under no circumstances should they use the mule deer tag. The law will be rigidly enforced.

Officials also pointed out that if one hunter gives another a portion of a deer carcass, the recipient must have a note from the other showing time and place of kill, and verifying that the meat had been given to the hunter in possession.

Added Incentive. Jackson's Superette and Blair's

Hardware are again offering free deer rifles for trophy bucks killed in this area.

Jackson's will give their rifle for the best trophy, which will be determined by measuring the widest point inside the horns and for uniformity. In case of a tie, number of points of one inch or over will be considered. Horns sawed off the carcass will be disqualified. Area is described as being a 20-mile radius of Hico. Measurements must be made at Jackson's.

In Blair's contest, weight will be the deciding factor. All deer must be weighed at the hardware store, and the contest is limited to deer killed in a 20-mile radius of Hico.

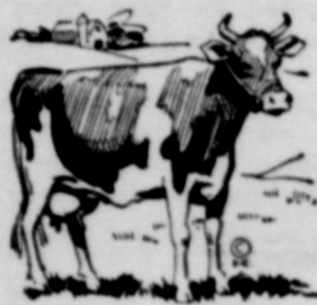

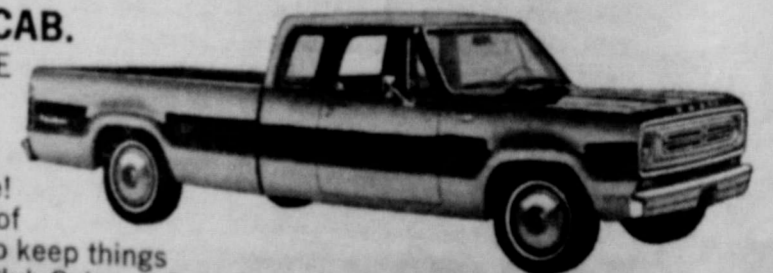

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

## COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

Colder weather can't come soon enough for most Texas livestock producers. A change to cold weather would be a big help in slowing screwworm outbreaks across the state.

But until a hard freeze comes—and it may be weeks away in our area—checking animals and treating all wounds is still as important as ever.

Approved screwworm remedies are available as dusts, smears and aerosols. Coumaphos and ronnel water sprays are also effective in protecting wounds against screwworm infestation and in killing worms in infested wounds.

The importance of checking animals regularly cannot be over-emphasized. Each and every type of wound should be treated because one drop of blood will attract a screwworm. All punctures such as those made by ear tags or biting insects such as ticks, should be treated.

Livestock producers should avoid performing any surgical operations on animals until after cold weather arrives. Castration, dehorning and other similar operations are an open invitation for the screwworm fly.

As long as screwworm flies remain active, livestock producers must keep their guard up. This is no time to relax and wait for cold weather. It will come in due time.
