in the Act, and on any lawful ordinary and necessary capital expenditure. However, neither a State nor a unit of local government may use any portion of its revenue sharing payments to match funds for any federal program, nor use any portion in an activity or program which discriminates on the basis of race, color, national orig-

Fox went on to say "all recipient governments are required to publish reports of how their revenue sharing funds were used. Existing regulations require that such reports be published on or before March 1, 1974, for the use of the first entitlement check. Simplified reporting forms are being developed by the Office of Revenue Sharing for the 'end use' report re-
