



City Council Eyes Future and Present Needs for Hico

The engineering firm of W. F. Soules & Associates, Inc., of Waco, was retained Monday night by Hico City Council to start a comprehensive survey of existing water and sewer facilities here, and to make recommendations on future needs


Lynn R. Bettinger, Federal Program Coordinator, represented the engineering firm at the Council meeting.

Bettinger had previously made an inspection tour of facilities in Hico, and told Councilmen that "the present sewer plant has reached its capacity, and is totally inadequate. Additional water storage facilities are also needed," he added.

The representative outlined the steps to be taken to secure Federal funding for such a project as follows: 1. Estimate of total cost; 2. Engineering report that shows inadequacies and need for such improvements; and 3. All documents submitted to the Central Texas Council of Governments for preliminary approval.

Bettinger said that a time ele ment of between 18 and 24 months would be required for such a program to be approved.

In preliminary planning, Council authorized the firm to make cost estimates on extension of present sewer system to those areas that are not being served, a complete new sewage disposal plant, water storage and distribution, and pos-

sible added facilities at City Park. The engineer recommended that the sewage system be earmarked the first item of importance, and that planning should be for a duration of least 20 years growth expectation.

> Councilmen were unanimous in their approval of hiring the engineering firm.

> > Other Business.

In other business at the Monday meeting, Mayor O. L. Davis presented his recommendations on how the city might use funds received from Revenue Sharing.

The mayor outlined the following expenditure plans:

1. Streets (new paving and seal coating) \$4,500.00; 2. Maintenance of water and sewer facilities, \$4,000.00; 3. Park improvements, \$1,500.00; and 4. Maintenance at the water plant and constructing a chain link fence around the new water well in the Hillcrest Addition, \$1,500.00.

On motion by Ray Keller and a second by Bill Howard, the Council voted unanimously to adopt the mayor's recommendations.

In other discussion and action, W. R. Hampton gave a cost-estimate of \$1,800.00 for completion of the former railroad bridge leading to the western part of town, and was authorized to complete the job. Hampton was also authorized to place a barricade around a city business building that the Council deemed unsafe.

The Council accepted payment from Ray Keller for the building lot fronting on Highway 281, and released deeds to him.

Coming in for its usual share of discussion was the city dump and its use, with the possibility of securing more land in the area.

Questions & Answers By CHARLES E. BASS

week. **ENTRANSIST BURGENIGAB** Question: I notified the last office when I moved but I did not get my social security check this community. month. What am I susposed to do? Answer: Call your local social security office. This can easily be corrected by telephone. If you move again, notify both the Post Office and social security office. Question: I just turned 65 and applied for Medicare last week. I week now find that I will have to go to the hospital very soon. What will happen if I do not have my B. Grant Sunday. card before I am admitted? Answer: You will be covered just as if you had your card. If necessary, the hospital can call the social security office to verify your

Medicare coverage. Question: A young friend of mine suffered a stroke two years ago and is now receiving social security disability benefits. Suppose he tries to go back to work; will his benefits stop?

Answer: Not right away. Your friend can still get disability benefits for as long as a year while he tests his ability to work. If he finds he is able to work again, then his benefits will stop.

Question: My neighbor told me it was important to check on my earnings credited under social security. Is this true.

Answer: Yes, you should check your earnings record every two or three years. Call or write your social security office for a post card form to make your request. This is important because social security benefits are based on earnings and you could lose valuable benefits if your earnings record is not correct.

be established from seed. In each case, good seedbed preparation is essential.

For instance, the techniques for easy establishment of Coastal Bermuda does not work when planting seeded grass. Several factors are critical to enhance rapid growth of seeded grasses.

Start with a good seedbed. This means plowing the area several months before grasses are to be planted to permit the soil to settle and become firm. One or two rains will help settle the soil and tient at Harris Hospital following | dissolve clods and large soil particles.

Many of the new grasses contain 500,000 seed per pound. if planted in a rough seedbed these small seeds frequently fall between clods and too deep to to emerge above the soil.

Plant grass seed no more than one-half inch deep. In fact, planting the seed on top of the soil and using a roller or packer is satisfactory in most cases. Adjust grass

seed planters and drills h planting the pasture. A few utes devoted to equipment tenance and adjustment can the difference between a stand and unsatisfactory
