P-TAGroup Hear Brownwood Educator; Elect New Officers

Hicoans observed Texas Public School Week Monday evening during the regular Parent-Teacher Association meeting. Hosts for the occasion were Masonic Lodge members from the Hico area.

Dr. Guy D. Newman, Chancellor, Howard Payne College in Brownwood, was featured speaker for the evening. Members of the second grade class presented "Bambi" for the room program. Mrs. Avo Rutledge directed the students.

Dr. Newman, a thirty-second degree Mason, was introduced by Robert Jackson, a member of the Hico Lodge. Dr. Newman discussed the three great bastions that are necessary in order for America to survive—the home must be preserved; the church must be preserved; and the school must be preserved.

"Americans have been blessed by God," explained the speaker as he reminded his audience of the numerous privileges, luxuries, and life styles Americans are accustomed to. In speaking of America as a great nation, Dr. Newman noted that the United States has helped more people throughout the world than all other nations combined.

"Hico teachers are to be commended," stated the Brownwood speaker, and "Hico people should realize just how lucky they are to live in a rural community where the burdens and turmoil of city life are not at their backdoor." The college educator concluded that the greatest need of today's schools is to have mature teachers who love and care for their students as if the students were their very own children.

Hillin of Tarleton State College were named this week to judge livestock divisions at the 26th Annual Hico Livestock Show, scheduled next Friday, March 16 at City Park. Harold Walker, local FFA Advisor, made the announcement Monday.

He has judged many shows over the area and is well qualified to place the livestock and comment on their placement.

Hillin, Assistant Professor of Dairy Science at Tarleton State was reared on a livestock farm in Rusk County, and holds B.S. and M.S. degrees from Texas A&M. He served as Assistant County Agent at Carthage for two years and was Dairy Specialist in herd management and DHIA records with the Texas Extension Specialist Program from 1961-67. He is a member of American Dairy Science Association and Dairy Shrine Club, and is an approved judge of dairy cattle for Holstein, Jersey, Brown

and Guernseys, as recognized by the dairy breed associations.

Entries Coming In.

Livestock entries are already being received following mailing of catalogs to agriculture departments, 4-H supervisors, and individual exhibitors who regularly participate in the Hico Show.

"If weather conditions are good, a large crowd is expected, and some major show winners are expected to have their breeding cattle groomed for the show," commented Walker.

Competition is expected to be keen with indications that Polled Hereford cattle will be well represented.

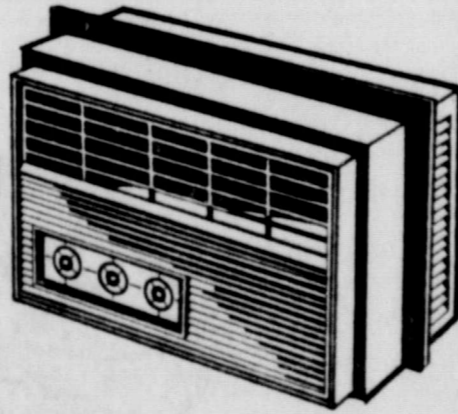

"Yes. You would be hurt!"

Few businesses are tied as closely to the
community and its future as the telephone

the telephone company must expand
continually. Otherwise, it could not offer
telephone service to new or expanding
business in the area, or to the new residents
who would be attracted to those new jobs.

The equipment necessary to meet that
demand cannot be bought with subscriber
dollars. That money is sufficient only to pay
the operational expenses of the company,
to pay for the wear and tear of equipment
already in service, and to provide a return
to the investors whose dollars purchased the
equipment initially.

New plant and equipment needed to meet
growth demands must, therefore, be bought
with new investor dollars.

In order to attract those new investor dollars,
the company must have two things going
for it: (1) A record of providing an adequate
return to the investor, and (2) the likelihood
that such a record can be continued. If
either of these is missing or even questionable,
the investor will put his money to work
somewhere else.

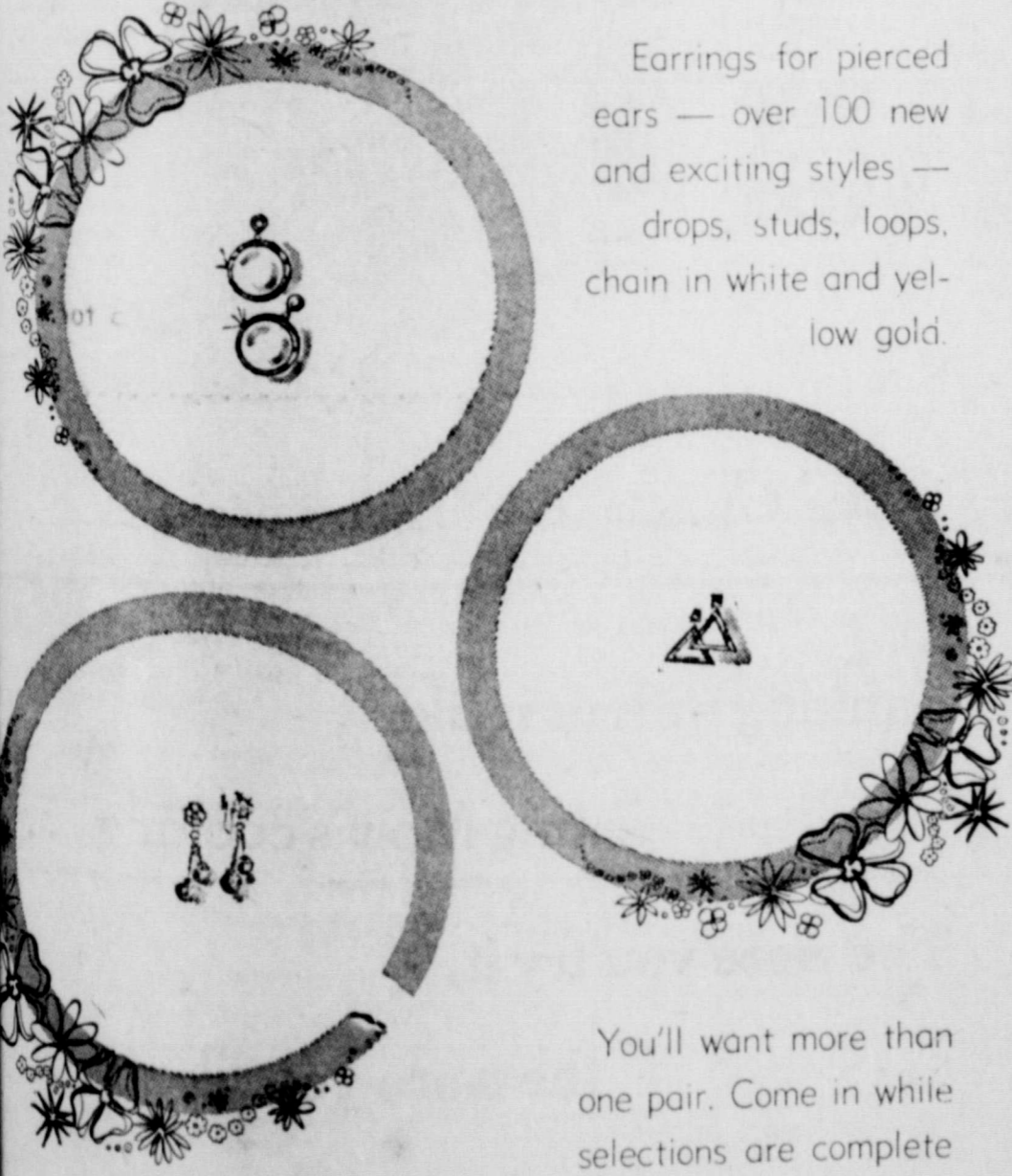
At that point, telephone service would begin
to stagnate. There would be no new lines
for new customers. Because of inflation,
there would be insufficient money to even
replace worn out equipment that had been
depreciated on the basis of original cost.
Instead of expanding, the telephone system
would be contracting.

And, as it contracted, the community that
relied on it would contract, too.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

Home gardeners complain each year about root knot nematodes in their tomatoes, okra, beans and other vegetable crops. These microscopic worms may be the reason for sickly plants that do not respond to fertilizer or water. Nematode presence can be recognized by galls and knots on plant roots.

If nematodes have been a problem in the past, treat your garden this spring before planting.

The most widely used chemical for nematode control contains dibromochloropropane (DBCP). It is available at nurseries and farm supply stores.

No special equipment is necessary for treating home gardens. Liquid materials can be applied with a quart fruit jar with a ten-penny nail hole punched on each side so the liquid will pour evenly. Pour the proper amount of fumigant diluted with water into each 100 feet or open furrow at least 6 inches deep.

Granular DBCP can be sprinkled by hand into the open furrow, but be sure to wear rubber gloves.

For row treatment, place the fumigant in a 6-inch deep furrow directly under seed rows or transplant rows.

Broadcast treatment can be made by opening a 6-inch deep furrow using a hoe, spade or other implement. Furrows should be no more than 12 inches apart from center to center. A broadcast treatment is much more effective than row treatment; more fumigant and expense is involved.

Whether using the liquid or granular material, cover the treated furrows immediately to seal the fumigant into the soil. This can be done by dragging a weighted board over the treated area. Then sprinkle the soil lightly with water.
