Everything Ready For Stock Show

Fashion Show Set Thursday; Exhibits Friday

The Homemaking Division of the Annual Hico Livestock Show promises to provide a variety of displays of talent and skills as the annual event gets underway Thursday evening with the clothing fashion show. "Swinging Into Spring," theme for the evening show will begin at 7 o'clock in the High School Auditorium.

Art-Handwork and Foods exhibits will be displayed in the Community Center Friday, March 16. The exhibits will be open for public viewing after completion of the judging Friday morning. The Community Center will remain open until 4 o'clock at which time exhibits may be picked up.

Hico High School students will sell their baked goods in order to help pay expenses of the Stock Show. "Purchasers will be given a numbered stub which will correspond with the number on the baked product and will present their stub when claiming the baked goods after the show," said Marilyn Johnson, co-chairman of the event.

Miss Kay Jackson, Hamilton Public School teacher, and a member of the Hico Young Homemakers, will commentate the fashion show Thursday evening. Miss Dana Roberson will provide background music for the affair. Fashion show judges will be Mr. and Mrs. Ronnie Nowlin of De Leon. Mr. Nowlin is Fashion Coordinator for Smith's Dept. Store.

Clothing construction judges will be Mrs. Mary W. Mayo, Home Economist, Community Public Service Co., Mrs. Ann Laughlin, Home Economist, Lone Star Gas Co., Miss Cheryl Fuller and Miss Rita Roberson, Home Economics students from Tarleton State College.

Mrs. Dan Bell will be in charge of the art-handwork division. Judges for this event will include Mrs. H. V. Hedges and Mrs. Marvin Marshall.

Foods division judges will be Mrs. H. E. McCullough, Mrs. W. F. Hafer, Mrs. Harry Hudson, Mrs. E. H. Randals, Jr., Mrs. Paul Verdugo and Mrs. Charles Ochojski.

Judging Starts At 9:00 O'clock In City Park

Judging of the swine division will kickoff the 26th annual Hico Livestock Show Friday at City Park, and advance entries indicate another large field in all divisions for the popular show.

Harold Walker, local FFA advisor, said that Dick Vestal of Baird would judge livestock, and Joel Hillin of Tarleton State College, would judge dairy animals. Both are competent in their respective fields, according to Walker. This will be the first time for Vestal to judge here, but Hillin has served here before.

Following the swine judging, goats will take the ring at 10 a.m., followed by the sheep division at 11 o'clock.

After a break for lunch, dairy cattle will be placed beginning at 1:30, with the beef division following at 3 p.m. The popular dog show will also be judged around 3 p.m.

In addition to several hundred dollars in prize money and ribbons, special showmanship trophies will be awarded in each division to a junior exhibitor doing the best job of grooming and showing his en-

ty. Ring judges will make the decision on winners following each classification.

Local Science Fair Winners Revealed

Students at Hico High displayed their science projects at the annual Science Fair held during Public School week under the leadership of Mrs. Brummett, students selected assembled projects which were displayed in the science laboratory at Tarleton State College pro-

fessors, Dr. Lamar Johanson and Dr. Thomas Hinkson, and three senior science students, Reta Foreman, Pat Thomas and Richard Wolfe, judged the projects.

James Horton was first place winner in the Senior division, with "Money, a Carrier of Diseases"; Bryan Jones was second, who phased out waves and the wave property of Interferences; Linda Walker, third with "Effects of Fertilizers on Plants"; and Galen Lindsey and Benny Baley were awarded fourth places. Lindsey had a temperature inversion apparatus and Baley a seismograph.

In the Junior Division, Brian Dayton and Jamie Putty were awarded first places. Dayton had an electrostatic precipitator and Putty showed oil spills and absorbents. Second places went to Newt Farrar, who showed astrological photography, Deborah Autry, the balance of nature, and Sylvia Dayton, making use of carbon dioxide.

Third place winners were Billy Howard with an electric arc heater, Dale Walker's project showed the killing of micro-organisms, and Jeff Huggins showed an electric generator. Fourth places went to Nancy Hicks, whose project showed optical illusions, and to Monti McCormick, who showed nutritional requirements of guinea pigs.

GRANDMOTHER'S HANDICRAFTS WERE DISPLAYED AT REVIEW CLUB MEETING

Mrs. Paul Verduzco was hostess to members of the Hico Review Club last week, and served her guests refreshments following a St. Patrick's Day theme.

At the business session members elected Mrs. Edgar Bulloch as their delegate to the Capitol District Convention. She is to be accompanied to the April convention by Mrs. W. F. Hafer, who is a member of the district board.

The afternoon's program featured "Grandmother's Handicraft in Vogue Today."

Mrs. Verduzco traced the history of quilt-making in America which began in Colonial times when there was no material available to make coverings. Thrifty wives took scraps of worn-out clothing and sewed them together to make patchwork quilts. The string quilt was an adaption of the patchwork quilt.

The next type of quilt that evolved was the hit-or-miss pattern that had uniform size and shape pieces but no definite pattern. This gave way to organized patterns such as the Stamp Quilt, the Sawtooth and the Log Cabin patterns.

A Friendship Quilt that was made in 1836 had the maker's names embroidered into the pieces and Mrs. Verduzco showed examples of the Star, the Lone Star or Shining Star and Flower Basket patterns.

Applied or Laid quilts came in later as women developed more complicated patterns and became more adept at their needlework and quilting was treated more as an art. Beautiful examples of this type were shown in the Dutch Girl, Dresden Plate, Shining Star, Wild Rose, Rising Sun and Tree of Life patterns.

The most recently made quilt exhibited was made of double-knit patches sewn together on a machine with the zig-zag stitch.

Mrs. Verduzco stated that all of the quilts on exhibit were loaned by citizens of the Hico area and members were grateful for the opportunity to view the beautiful

works of art.

Mrs. J. C. Braune discussed and demonstrated the ancient art of macrame or knot-tying. She stated that the name evolved from an Arabic term naming a type of headress. Because the head covering had knotted fringe the term finally came to refer to the knotting itself.

Mrs. Braune exhibited a belt purse that had belonged to a relative of Mrs. J. W. Fahey and was made in the 1800's. She also exhibited modern articles made by herself and others which include wall hangings, belts, purses, and necklaces.

Mrs. Braune had an exhibit which showed the basic knots used in macrame. These included the lark's head knot, the square knot, the half-hitch, and the Josephine knot. She also stated that many types of cord could be used for tying, including fishing cord, nylon cord, rug yarn, small rope, and hemp string. She encouraged members to try making articles on their own.

Mrs. B. C. Dayton's discussion and exhibit featured a method for making sand candles. She explained how damp, packed sand either on a beach or in a box or can could serve as a mold for making unique and beautiful candles. She explained the process to be used, showed materials and exhibited several candles and showed illustrations of other candles of this type.

Mrs. Byford presented a most interesting and informative workshop program on "Flower Arranging to Conform to Flower Show Schedule." She said there are no set rules today in flower arranging, rather a leaning more toward creativity and beauty with emphasis on plant material. All top awards in a show have to have 3 or 4 entries in each class schedule to count. These may have accessories if desired in the conventional or modern design.

In making arrangements do not use junk and never artificial flowers. All driftwood, dried plants, flowers and weathered wood used in arrangements should be clean. She thinks everyone has creative ability and can make common plants, etc. into uncommon decorative pieces.

Mrs. Byford had on display five beautiful arrangements using driftwood, dried plants with flowers in bloom now, such as the peach, plum, forsythia, japonica, hyacinth, jonquils and narcissus. She pointed out the arrangements that were conventional in design putting emphasis on line, massed line, or mass arrangement to create depth by using proper plant material and colors. Other arrangements were more modern in design of a free

style and form with irregular, curved, flowing lines that did not conform to any set geometric pattern, just her desire to create something beautiful.

Mrs. Bishop made three unusual arrangements, one using dried cedar root, garlic flowers with dried magnolia leaves, showing simple lines, another with all fresh flowers and the last with japonica flowers. She told the club paraffin wax used in containers is very good to hold arrangements in place.

Mrs. Byford then judged the arrangements made by each member present. She very graciously answered many questions asked by the members. She also invited everyone to attend their flower show April 26 at First Methodist Church in Clifton.
