School Wind-Down Begins Sunday With Baccalaureate

Last Day of School Is Thursday, May 24

The Hico Public Schools will close at 2:45 p.m. Thursday, May 24, with students returning for a short period Saturday, May 26, for their report cards. Buses will run at the regular time, but will stay at school only about 30 minutes.

After report cards are distributed, teachers will remain at school for their last day of in-service training. All bills owed the school by students must be paid before report cards are released, according to Supt. O. C. Cook. Parents are asked to check with the students to see if they have any school obligations.

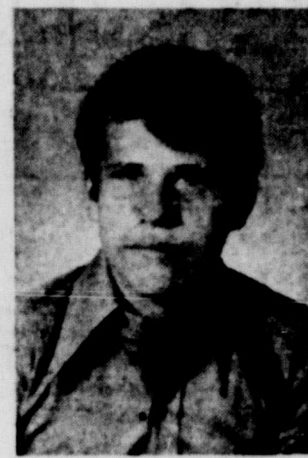
High School Commencement.

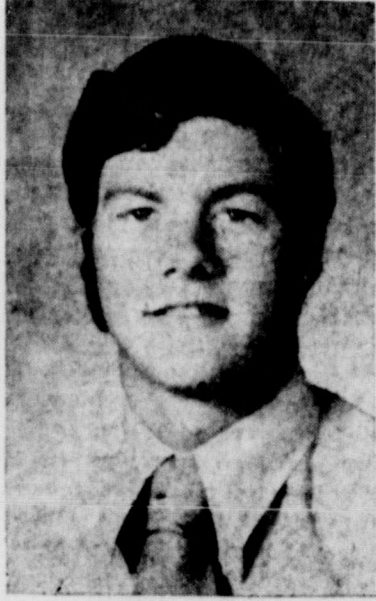

Water spouted about 30 feet in the air when an eight-inch water main broke on First Street about ten feet from the side entrance of Howard Drug.

Mr. Manford Leming, City Night-watchman, found the broken main and called W. R. Hampton, manager of the City Water Works. Mr. Hampton said it took around an hour and fifteen minutes to bring the water under control.

Howard Drug received water damage to the back of the business, and H & B Food Store also received some water in the rear of their building.
