Mrs. Mattie Segrest, Longtime Educator Buried Here May 27

Funeral services were held for Mattie B. Segrest, 90, at 2:30 p.m. Monday, May 27 in the First Methodist Church, conducted by Rev. Bennie McBryde and Eddie Malphrus. Interment was in the Hico Cemetery.

Mrs. Segrest was a lifelong resident of Hico, and a retired school teacher.

She was married to R. O. Segrest who was deceased in 1939. Mrs. Segrest was a member of the First Methodist Church.

She has two daughters, Mrs. Jennings of Arlington and Mrs. Lois Wilkes of Fort Worth. She has two sons, Victor Segrest of Dallas and Herman Segrest of Hico. She has seven grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Survivors as pallbearers were: Sandy Ogle, H. D. Ellis Randal, Tyrus King, and V. Meador.

Mrs. Segrest, who retired from teaching in 1952, pursued her education which lasted for 50 years. She began in 1903 when she was in the first class of 45 students at a school called Pleasant Hill in Hamilton. She taught two months at Inglewood community school. She taught one more year—just before marrying the late R. O. Segrest. The 50 years long education was not continuous, but it was 25 years as a mathematics teacher in Hico and 30 years of teaching in the local schools. At the time of her retirement in May 1952, Mrs. Segrest had 29 years and three months of teaching in Hico schools.

At the time she taught at Inglewood and the time she came to Hico, Mrs. Segrest taught a total of 50 years over a period of 70 years. In 1923 she had the opportunity to transfer to Hico, and she remained there for a term of three months

Miss Farrell gave tips on cooking methods for more tender and tasty dishes, and added garnishing touches to a roast she had prepared, making a very attractive meat dish. The two also answered many questions on the cooking, purchasing, and storing of meats.

Mr. Brooks stated that "Texas, as the No. 1 beef state, not only raises its own beef needs but furnishes a large percentage of the beef for most other states as well as shipping to some overseas ports."

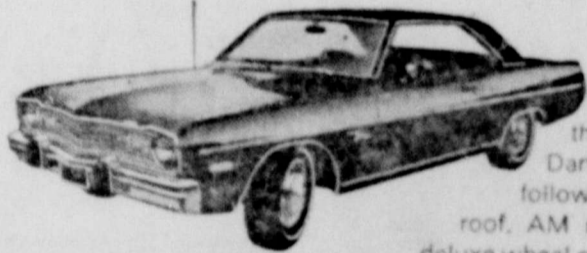

Re-cycle family clothes, and create new fashions while saving money.

Sewing notions, popular re-cycling tools, transforms old garments into style-conscious wearables. Examples include replacement pockets, zippers, new belt fasteners, trims and iron-on patches.

Some patches, especially designed for jeans, add new dimensions, promising teen approval.

With iron-on patches, follow directions carefully. Success requires the right pressure and heat, otherwise the patch will fall away after cleaning.

Other renovation techniques turn to sewing machines, and most now feature numerous stitch variations, valuable in creative mending.

Shrinks, those brief sweaters, are one current rage. Homeowners can create them simply by taking in side seams and hems of old sweaters.

Commercial sweater knits can be cut and sewn without raveling, hand knits can't.

Sew-on patches and appliques will cover stains or holes in re-cycled

garments. For a unified look, carry these new additions throughout the garment by adding contrasting pockets of the same fabric or color.

Decorative stitching, rick-rack, braid or contrasting band fabric cover that lengthening line on dresses, skirts or slacks.

In other re-cycling "face-lifts," appliques reinforce buttonholes, and decorative pulls replace plain zippers.

Extend pants wear life by reinforcing inside hems. For best protection, cut halfmoons, measuring about five inches by one inch deep, of heavy fabric and add to inside hems.

As for care of a re-cycled item, consider both garment and added trim or fabric. Both should be compatible, washable trims on washable garments.

For best results, pre-shrink trim before using, following the procedure normally used with the garment. This insures a re-cycled garment as attractive later as when first changed.

Once started, ideas and creativity just seem to flow.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS

By JOE ALLEN

That "white stuff" on your favorite rose bush or crepe myrtle might be powdery mildew.

Numerous shrubs and flowers are showing symptoms of powdery mildew. This mold first appears as whitish patches on leaves and then spreads over the entire leaf. Such surface growth produces thousands of fungal spores daily. Winds carry these spores long distances to infect other plants.

Products containing Benomyl, a relatively new systemic material, give some of the best controls. Other materials including Folpet, Phaltan and Actidione PM are effective. Unfortunately, not all fungicides will control powdery mildew. Check the label to see if the product contains one of the suggested materials.

Generally a spray schedule of every 10 to 14 days is required. Follow the directions on the label of each material used and handle it with care. After use, the container should be properly stored or disposed of if empty.

With recent rains, water may be standing in some locations on your premises. Such standing water makes an excellent place for raising mosquitoes.

Mosquitoes lay eggs wherever water will collect and stand for a week or longer. Young mosquitoes develop only in water and prefer polluted water for breeding.

If standing water on your premises cannot be eliminated, check it weekly for mosquito larvae. If any are found, apply an insecticide spray. A spray containing 5 percent lindane or 2 percent malathion may be used as well as kerosene or fuel oil.
