Two New Faculty Members Hired

School Board, in a special Monday night, approved a number of federal programs as outlined by Superintendent O. C. Walker. In addition to the school participate in the teaching center.

She has the Elementary, Kindergarten and Special Education certification, which allows the school to place her in any of those areas of specialization.

Mr. and Mrs. Brown have two children, a daughter five years old and a son 17 months. They live in Stephenville where he is employed by the Soil Conservation Service. They plan to move to a location nearer Hico.

Local Gasoline Situation Termed 'Stable' By Dealers

There's no gasoline shortage in Hico—yet.

But there is a strong possibility of a shortage developing here, as elsewhere over the state and nation.

Hico's three consignees, Horace Ross, Texaco Inc., Jim Jameson, Mobil Oil Co., and Grady Hooper, Gulf Oil Corp., all expressed their opinion that they would be able to take care of most of their outlets.

Jameson said that quotas to his station outlets were firm, being set at the same gallonage they received during June, July and August of last year. However, he said that he did have one outlet, at

Carlton, that might be hurt since the station was not in continuous operation at this time last year.

Ross said that he felt all of his stations would be able to meet the crisis, even if he had to "rob Peter to pay Paul."

Hooper voiced a similar opinion as the other two dealers, that, in all probability he would be able to supply all of his outlets. However, he said that one of his dealers, Doyle O'Neal, ran out of their competitive brand, Gulfane, last month, and would probably do so again this month. Hooper said that his quota was cut ten percent per quarter.

Willard Leach, Texaco dealer at the intersection of Highways 220 and 6, said that he felt that gas supplies would be sufficient to keep his business open.

Orville Ogle at Ogle Bros. was less optimistic last week, but said Friday that it looked as if they could get through the month without running out of gas.

Everyone approached had one firm belief: If you're going to take a trip, plan it toward the first of the month. Dealers get new quotas then, and the danger of getting stranded in some far-off place will be less.

A premier field is set for the first Annual Bluebonnet Country Club Partnership Golf Tournament, slated Saturday and Sunday at the local links.

Floyd Clifton, tourney chairman, said this week that more than 60 two-man teams would start action at 8:30 Saturday morning. Second and third flight teams will get off to a shotgun start at 8:30, with the first and championship flights hitting the tees at 1:30. The same starting times will be in effect Sunday.

All teams will be paired Friday night prior to the Saturday start,

and scores of both days will be used to determine winners.

A barbecue dinner will be served all contestants and their wives Saturday night. Additional tickets may be purchased for other members of the families, and non-participants in the tournament.

Building Program Needed For New Kindergarten

The local school board, in a rather lengthy called session, adopted and approved a number of programs that will have a significant impact on the Hico school system and its patrons in the coming years.

Perhaps most important effect is implementation of the Kindergarten School Program.

The 63rd Legislature approved House Bill 787 and the Governor signed the bill last week. The bill provides that school districts shall offer a half day Kindergarten program for eligible educationally handicapped children who are at least five years of age and under six years of age as of Sept. 1.

Where a district so elects, the program for educationally handicapped children may be offered for a full day for 180 days of instruction and attendance counted on a full day basis for the purpose of average daily attendance in the Foundation School Program.

School districts shall operate Kindergarten programs for five-year-old non-educationally handicapped children who are at least five years of age and under six as of Sept. 1, either on a half day basis for a full school year or on a full day basis for one half year for Foundation School Program attendance purposes. Where desired districts may operate the program for non-educationally handicapped children on a full day basis for the entire year. In such cases the individual child would earn one half day of Foundation School Program attendance for each day present. The local district would provide the funds for additional half-day instruction.

The net effect to the Hico district is first staffing the position with a possibility that a part of the salary be paid from local funds.

New Facilities Needed.

Every classroom is now being utilized with the gain in students which moved the school into Class A category for the first time last year. The program will require additional facilities.

It was the consensus of the board members that at least two classrooms should be added since new State requirements in Special Education will most likely involve an additional classroom facility. The board authorized Mr. Harold Walker, superintendent-elect to make a survey of prospective Kindergarten students, survey building needs, and report to the board at its next meeting.

Mr. Walker has requested that all parents of children who will be five years of age and under six on Sept. 1 to call the school giving this information, along with telephone numbers and an address for correspondence with regard to this new program.

Revaluation Needed.

The trustees, in view of the additional requirement of immediate implementation of this program and construction costs, debt service on present buildings, and the need for re-roofing and maintenance of some of the existing buildings, along with the steadily rising costs of operation, cited the need for them (the board) to make some changes with regard to school taxes. The board will ask the equalization board to value property more nearly in line with the assessment of 25 percent of actual value.

Values of rural, city and utilities would all receive the same treatment as to the percent of actual value.

The expected value to be set on range land is \$25.00 per acre. Cultivated or improved pasture would be valued at \$35.00 per acre, and irrigated cropland or improved pasture land at \$45.00 per acre. The equalization board is asked to carry this same relative value rate on personal and city property.

"The Hico district has been able to keep school costs well below state average in the past, and expects to continue to do so," Mr. Walker emphasized. "The operation of a quality school in line with the new requirements imposed by the State make this revaluation necessary, and the understanding of the public in support of their school is much needed," the Superintendent concluded.

AN ORDINANCE

Granting to O. F. King and wife, Leona, the right, privilege and authority to pick up garbage in the City of Hico upon the terms and conditions herein stated, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HICO, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That for and in consideration hereinafter mentioned, the right, privilege, and authority is hereby granted to O. F. King and wife, Leona, to operate and maintain a garbage pickup service on the streets, alleys, and public ways of the City of Hico, for the purpose of furnishing to the citizens of the City of Hico a garbage pickup service in order to maintain the public health standards.

SECTION 2: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will be in full charge of the dump grounds and will keep the gate to the dump grounds locked at all times, except on Wednesdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at which time, O. F. King, and wife, Leona, will open said dump grounds to the public for public dumping, and on said Wednesdays, O. F. King will supervise all dumping and be responsible for any and all dumping.

SECTION 3: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will furnish their own equipment, which is to be adequate for the performance of the work which they have agreed to undertake.

SECTION 4: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will pick up the garbage in every section of Hico, excluding the business area, at least one (1) time a week.

SECTION 5: That O. F. King and wife, Leona, will only pick up that garbage which is placed in the designated areas, and which is placed in sturdy plastic bags.

SECTION 6: That the City will supply dumping holes for O. F. King and wife to place said garbage in, and the City will use their own means to cover said holes.

SECTION 7: That this contract for the pickup of garbage is for one (1) year, with an option for O. F. King and wife, to renew said

contract each year for four (4) years, after the expiration of the first year contingent on O. F. King and wife performing their contracted duties in a businesslike way to the satisfaction of the City of Hico; and should they fail to perform their duties as agreed, then their services may be terminated by the City of Hico, giving O. F. King and wife two (2) weeks' notice.

SECTION 8: That O. F. King and

wife's compensation for the above described services will be based on a set sum for each residential water meter. O. F. King and wife will receive two dollars (\$2.00) per residential water meter each month, to be paid on the first day of every month. Each citizen of the City of Hico with a residential water meter shall bear the two dollar (\$2.00) charge for the garbage pickup service which they are being furnished.

SECTION 9: The above-described services to be performed by O. F. King and wife, Leona, shall begin on or about August 1, 1973.
