## More Land to Be Annexed to City

### 13.64 Acres to Be Developed in Jaggars Addition

One of the main items of business transacted at the regular City Council meeting Monday night was approval of a request for annexation of 13.64 acres of land into the City limits. The acreage is located in the new Jaggars Addition, and adjoins the previously annexed 4.74 acres. Council members passed the request on first reading, and the annexation move will require reading at two other regular meetings before the addition is officially brought into the City limits.

City Dads pointed out that since the original tract was annexed, five new homes have been completed in the addition, with another under construction. One new street has been cut and named. The original street, running north and south, was an extension of Pecan Street, and the new street, also running north and south, was named Jory St. The street running east and west was named Heath. Both were named for the two grandchildren of Fred Jaggars, developer of the addition.

The remainder of the Monday meeting was devoted to general business, when discussions were held on hiring a new City Marshal; initiating the trash hauling service; a session with a Christmas decorations firm out of Waco; bridge work and general street maintenance; and fire department equipment.

Mayor O. L. Davis noted that one application had been received for the City Marshall post, which is being vacated August 1 by Buck Shepherd. Other applications are expected.

As a last item of business, Mayor Davis called on the City Secretary to have a report available at the next meeting on all delinquent taxes, and also delinquent street paving assessments.

## Elvin Miears New County Tax Officer

R. Elvin Miears was appointed as the new tax assessor-collector of Hamilton County by the Commissioners Court when they met last Wednesday.

He replaces Mrs. Pearl Williams who resigned due to health reasons.

Mr. Miears had been deputy in the tax office since April, and began his official duties as of July 1.

Mrs. Williams agreed to remain in the office until State Auditors could check out the records on Thursday or Friday of this week.

In making the decision to appoint Mr. Miears, the commissioners considered the written applications of three other candidates for the job. Mrs. Linda Buffe, Mrs. Jane Easterling and Mrs. Viola Truss.

## Hospital Bonds Are Amortized

Indebtedness on Hico City Hospital was paid off last month, according to the annual audit conducted by Harold Prater of Fort Worth, and after paying the final bonds, the institution had an excess of approximately \$3,700.00.

This information and figures were revealed at the Monday night City Council meeting, when members reviewed the annual audit report from Prater's firm.

The local hospital, built by the citizens in 1947, was sold to the City of Hico in May of 1953 through a \$38,000.00 bond issue which passed by the count of 146 to 78.

## Frank Hanes Retires as Schoolman

(From the Hamilton Herald-News) Pottsville School Superintendent Frank Hanes announced his retirement this week after 36 years of service to area schools, the last nine in Pottsville.

Mr. Hanes was raised in Jonesboro and graduated from high school there as valedictorian of the class of 1925. He went to Meridian Junior College on a scholarship and had completed two years of college work at age 17. He began his administrative career as principal in Pleasant Valley in 1929. He spent three years there and three years in a similar position in Lanham before becoming superintendent in Maple, Coryell County.

In 1936 Hanes married Inez Jones.

He served nine years in Coryell County schools and continued his own schooling at the same time. Mr. Hanes attended Tarleton and

Texas Tech before receiving a B.A. degree from Daniel Baker College in 1948. In 1952 he received a Master's of Education degree from Baylor University. He has done additional work at Howard Payne.

Interspersed in his school career, Hanes also has four years as an industrial engineer with North American Aviation Corporation and four years of private business in Stamford to his credit.

To round out his 36 years as an administrator, he served 12 years as Superintendent of Schools at Fairy and the past nine years in the same capacity at Pottsville.

Mr. and Mrs. Hanes have a married daughter, Martha Drew, who lives in Irving. She and her husband have two children, Cindy, 12, and Greg, 4. The Hanes' son, Mike and his wife, Dabo live in Fort Worth with their daughter, Tanya, 5 months.

Mr. Hanes has been recognized by his peers many times for his service. He has twice been selected as "Superintendent of the Year" by a 17-county Cross Timbers area of the vocational agriculture department. He has served a term as president of the Coryell County Teacher's Association, and two terms as head of the Hamilton County Association. He has been a delegate to the State Teacher's Convention seven times. The Fairy and Pottsville FFA chapters named Hanes as an honorary member.

The greatest highlight in his life has been "putting the students first." His students remember that his motto throughout the years has been "I don't meet competition; I try to make it."

Country and Western music has always been a hobby with the Hanes family, and Mr. Hanes has played in numerous bands. He re-

lates that one of his rewarding teaching experiences came last summer when he and his wife were invited to go on tour as guests of some of his ex-students who are professional country musicians. The accomplished artists developed their interest in the field as they shared Mr. Hanes' enthusiasm while students under him.

The Pottsville school annual was dedicated to him with these words: "For what we are today and what we hope to become, we dedicate to Superintendent Frank Hanes in appreciation of the five years of progress for Pottsville School, the 1969 issue of the Pottsville Bobcat."

The couple is redoing a house in Lanham where they plan to enjoy retirement. Mr. Hanes wants to do some fishing, and Mrs. Hanes adds exuberantly that they hope to travel as soon as his health permits.

**WHAT IS THE RATE OF RETURN?**

Regardless of the method used, the purpose is the same: To insure the customer that he will pay the lowest rate possible consistent with sound service.

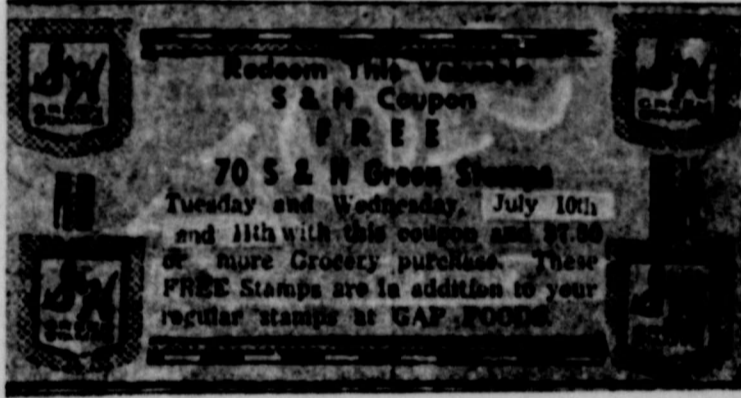
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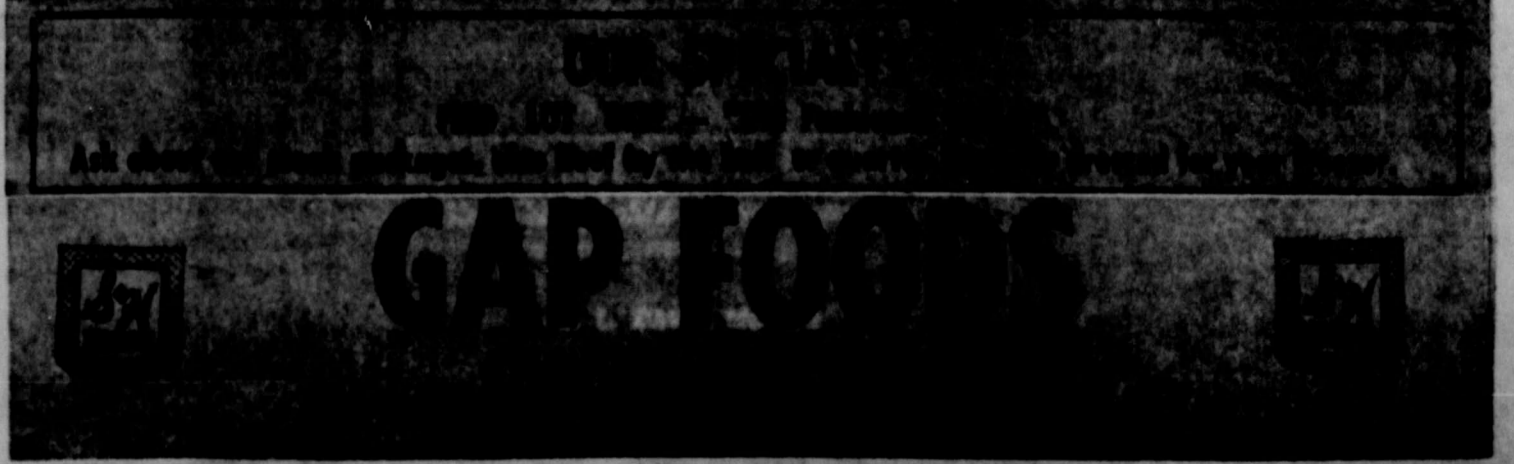

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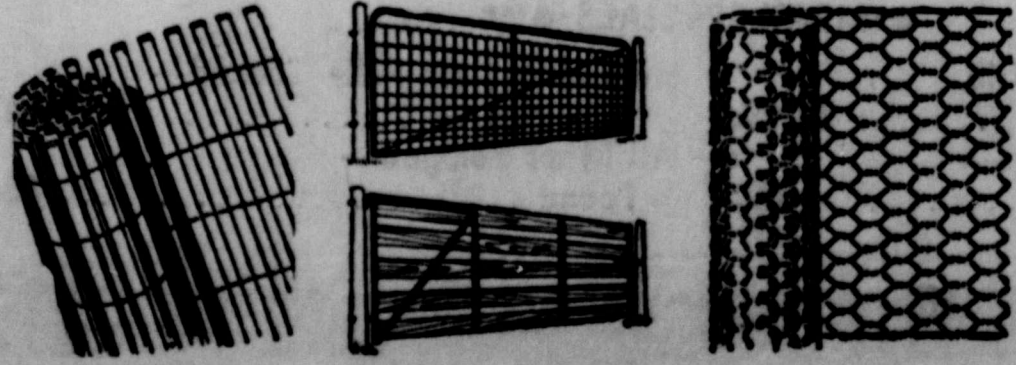
