Longtime Educators Will Be Cited For Community Service

The 87th Annual Old Settlers Reunion, will herald the major summer event for Hicoans and visitors from far and near as the traditional parade opens the four-day event Wednesday, July 25. The Hico celebration holds the distinction of being the oldest homecoming event in the State.

"School Days of Hico," the theme chosen for this year's parade and Reunion, will honor Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Cook. The Cooks retired at conclusion of the school year with a combined total of 85 years of public school teaching over the State—the past 23 years in Hico. Mr. Cook served as superintendent of the local schools and Mrs. Cook, an elementary teacher, was the third grade teacher at Hico.

"It is the feeling of the City of Hico and the Civic Club that no two people have done more to provide a growing interest in the community and have held the welfare of the youth of Hico as the number one objective in their lives," said Parade Marshal Louise Blair. "Mr. and Mrs. Cook have given unselfishly of their time and talents for the betterment of the community," continued Miss Blair.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Cook have maintained an active interest in the community throughout the years. When a challenge was set forth to Hicoans the Cooks were readily available to lend a helping hand. An active Civic Club member, Mr. Cook has served as an officer, chaired committees for the club, parked cars at City Park and served soda-pop during Reunion time.

Past president of the Hico Review Club, Mrs. Cook remembers each decorated car or float her club has made for the Reunion Parade and she has served as chairman of the Miss Reunion Contest, an annual event for the celebration. Members of the First United Methodist Church, they have assumed various leadership capacities for their church. Mrs. Cook is currently serving as choir director, and Mr. Cook, a Sunday School teacher, has served as Sunday School Superintendent.

Activities for the Reunion will get underway at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday with ceremonies preceding the parade to honor the Cooks. The Cooks will be featured guests on the reviewing stand. Present faculty members and former members who have taught at Hico during Mr. Cook's administration will be invited to join the honored guests in a special reserved section.

Master of Ceremonies for the event will be Supt. Harold D. Walker, who succeeded Mr. Cook upon his retirement.

Parade Entries.

Miss Blair said this week that several invitations had been sent to neighboring towns for parade entries, and the response has been very favorable thus far. However, she said that no confirmation had been received from Fort Hood officials on their entries. Hood usually provides a color guard, a military band, and several other entries, and Miss Blair said she expected to hear from them shortly.

Local parade entries are also expected to be numerous, and Miss Blair said she anticipated another successful event to open the Reunion.





'Choppers' Flying Low Over Hico

Fort Hood (Spl.)—The commander, 1st Sqdn., 9th Cal., 1st Cav. Div. at Fort Hood announced last week his unit's plans to conduct low level "nap of the earth" helicopter training over areas of Central Texas. The training started the latter part of June, and will continue into September.

Nap of the earth flying is normally conducted at altitudes of not more than 50 feet, and will-for training-involve flights of two or three aircraft.

Four air routes have been outlined, and they are provided herein for residents of the area over whose property they might occur. Unless

an emergency arises, no landings will be made except on the property of persons who have already agreed to the use of their land for such operations.

The western-most route encompasses the eastern tip of Mills County, and includes the northern sector of Lampasas County, the southern portion of Hamilton County and the extreme eastern tip of Coryell County.

The second programmed route Anderson Mountain (just north of Copperas Cove) as its southern-most point, then extends northward to a point north of Highway 84 northwest of Gatesville.

A third route runs from a point north of Highway 84, west of Gatesville to Highway 6 east of Hico. The route crosses Highways 36 and 22. The western limit of the route

is just west of Highway 201, north of the city of Hamilton. The route traverses, on a north-south axis, much of Coryell County, and the southwest portion of Bosque County.

The southern tip of the eastern-most route is Bread Tray Mountain, southeast of Gatesville and North Ft. Hood, across Highway 84 east of Gatesville to just north of the Coryell-Bosque county line. Nearly all of this route is in Coryell County.

The unit spokesman stressed that the purpose of these flights was to further train their aviators and crews in nap of the earth flying in both day and night conditions. Individual training flights or their routes will not be announced.

The spokesman further stressed that there would be absolutely no "buzzing" of any homes or other populated areas, or of livestock.
