

We went to both East and West Columbia, a very old area of settlement dating back to Austin's "Old Three Hundred" Colony. In West Columbia we saw Governor Hogg's home which now is a part of a state park. It is an 1836 Plantation home. Out from Navasota we visited Washington-on-the-Brazos which was the site of the signing of the Texas Declaration of Independence. This is a lovely park with a new visitor center. There are plans to reconstruct the town as it was in the 1830's. Here was Barrington, home of Anson Jones, last president of the Republic. We visited Navasota which claims that La Salle was murdered nearby. It is also the home of Mance Lipscomb, negro blues singer and guitarist.

In Houston we visited NASA and the San Jacinto Battlefield. I retraced the battle and the positions of the armies. We visited the grave of Lorenzo de Zavala, first vice president of the Republic under Sam Houston. Part of the battlefield which was a marsh in 1836 is now under water as this area is sinking. 
