





### INCORPORATION OF AN ORDINANCE 'HE

These provisions (Sections 8 (1) 8 (2) a, b, and c, and 8 (3) a and b, do hereby incorporate and become a part of the Ordinance dated June 4. 1973, granting to O. F. King and wife, Leona, the right, privi lege and authority to pick up garbage in the City of Hico upon the terms and conditions herein stated, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HICO. TEXAS

SECTION 8 (1) All sanitation service charges and fees shall be billed through the accounting and billing mechanisms of the department of water utilities in a manner which will show each customer's fees and charges separately from the water bill. The charges and fees herein established and authorized shall be billed to the party in whose name the water service con nection is taken where the premises are served with water and-or sewer and shall be billed to the party in control of the premises at other locations, and if this fact cannot be ascertained, the bill shall be directed to the record owner of such premises. The party who is so billed and to whom and-or for whom the services are made available shall be indebted to the city for said services and shall be obligated to make payment

SECTION 8 (2) In addition to all other legal remedies available for the collection of a debt, the foilowing actions and remedies are authorized for delinquent payment of the charges herein authorized:

bill will become delinquent ten (10)

days after it is rendered.

(a) The sanitation services may refuse to pick up and dispose of the garbage and rubbish (or trash) at the delinquent location; (b) The water and-or sewer serv-

ice, if any, serving the delinquent premises in question may be shut off and terminated. (c) After January 1, 1974.

charge of ten percent (10%) of the total net bill shall be added in the event of delinquency.

SECTION 8 (3) All collection by the water utilities department shall be applied first to the water utilities charges, and the customer shall be deemed to have paid such water utilities charges first in the event any question should arise as to how outstanding balances should be composed and applied.

partment customers to be billed hereunder shall be automatically placed in the billing for sanitation services charges, regardless of whether or not a written contract exists between the city and such customers. (b) All present water utilities

guaranty deposits upon termination of sanitary service and-or water service may be applied to any amounts due either for sanitation services charges or fees of water utilities bills The above described provisions


